





There Has Been A Death In The Family

The Carolina Arts family that is. No person has died but I'm in mourning anyway.

Sometime in July of this year I went to make a blog post at *Carolina Arts Unleashed* and the login page gave me an "access denied" message. Sometimes password pages get like that, then I go through a process to reset the defaults, but this time it still denied me access to the login page.

The next day I told Linda, my better half - especially when it comes to computer stuff, what was happening, but she was too wrapped up in getting ads ready for that upcoming August 2014 issue.

When she had time she tried a few of her tricks, but nothing changed. A few days later she contacted our server that maintains our website to see if they could do anything.

Within days of this taking place I switched over to one of our other blogs and started posting what would usually go on Carolina Arts Unleashed on our blog Carolina Arts News.

When Linda finally talked with one of the tech people at our server, they said our access passwords were changed. They suggested a few things to do, but when we got back access - the front page of Carolina Arts Unleashed had gone back to the Wordpress default. So we had access, but all our info was not there, which was funny as I could do searches and get different blog posts on the Internet.

At this point, we had access and could make new post, but we would have to rebuild the front page, which was no easy task as the blog was eight years old and I had made over 2000 posts. We just didn't understand why we couldn't get back

to that old front page. The good thing is we had a backup at our server - that why people could still see all those posts by doing a search on the Internet.

Apparently we had been hacked as far as changing the passwords on that login page. I have said plenty of things that some people would prefer wasn't available on the Internet for anyone to see as long as the internet was there.

Did I mention Wordpress was the blog host we were using? We use Wordpress for all our blogs, but the difference with Carolina Arts Unleashed - we were using our own memory space off our website. This allows us to have Google ads on our site, ads we get paid for. It isn't much, but it pays for the cost of our website hosting server.

I just keep posting at *Carolina Arts* News and Linda was waiting for a slower time to do the rebuilding.

After our October issue was launched, Linda contacted our server again with questions she had - after finding some tips about our problem on the Internet.

We don't usually make much contact with our server - mostly only when something happens that Linda can't fix. One problem we have found over the years is that it's like Russian Roulette as to what kind of tech person you might get when you call. It might be someone who has been there for years or someone who just started. Each one has their own set of knowledge and experience. Some just don't seem to know what they are talking about and they give you some tech - yada yada, yada. Some fix things right away and others seem to have to go ask someone else what we are asking about. Usually the problem gets fixed - sometimes in a few minutes - sometimes in a few hours.

This time our luck was not so good

- before we knew it, they had erased our backup while they were "fixing" our problem

It took a few days to realize what had happened. When I searched the Internet for some subject or blog entry I knew was there, we got a no longer there message. Eight years of posts were gone - in the

blink of an eye. That was eight years of posts I made about art trips, commentary about art issues, funny little side stories about non-art related things, thousands of images, and links on other people's websites. Once that backup was dumped it wiped out

every link anyone made to some blog post they liked or was mentioned in it. It's like it all never happened. Do I blame that tech person at Word-

press? Do I blame the person who hacked our login page? Do I blame ourselves for not having a backup of our own? Yes! I blame the people who invented the Internet. I blame the people who invented blogging. I blame anyone connected with social media.

I have a backup of every issue we printed, so that if I wanted to go back and see what was said about an issue or when an exhibit took place and who was in it - I can do that, but I couldn't even look anywhere to see what was lost.

I was still on the fence about starting Carolina Arts Unleashed again from scratch, starting a new blog or just to keep posting everything at Carolina Arts News - and then I had a meeting with our Blog Guru Zelda Ravenel. Within five minutes of telling her the story of what happened she showed me a picture of the front page of Carolina Arts Unleashed and proceeded to show me old posts from as far back as 2008. A few of the last posts I made were gone and a few images were missing (we have a backup of our images), but it was all there - all was not lost.

What I was looking at was an archive site called the Wayback Machine, which has over 435 billion web pages saved over time. I guess we were lucky that Carolina Arts is a fairly active website.

Unfortunately, we can't just make a

copy of what the Wayback Machine saved and use it - every entry will have to be relaunched, which will take some time. Search engines will once again have to rebuild the blog's presence on the Internet, but eventually Carolina Arts Unleashed will return - thanks to our Blog Guru -Zelda Ravenel. Some of you who had made links to individual blog entries will once again be able to restore those links.

As Duckworth's art challenges viewers to free their minds of the constant to-do lists and daily thoughts in order to embrace calmness or contemplation, the exhibition includes a physical space for viewer reflection and thought.

The artist states: "I believe that art/creativity is an essential component of human nature. Art inspires people to access their imagination, and imagination is the fuel that propels dreams and purpose in order to realize true human potential, and reveal our authentic self. Exterior guides often assist this sort of inner revelation; I believe that my artwork can function as a guide. My creative process is a personal exploration that mirrors my meditation practice and both are healing and self-transformative, and the result (my 'art') can resonate with others like a tuning fork-and either awaken this seed within, or simply affirm that we're not alone in our searching.'

the human condition. Jumaadi's imagination is full of poetic wanderings that manifest through his various media.

Jumaadi has exhibited extensively in Australia, Indonesia, Asia, and Europe, but this will be his first exhibition in the United States. He was recently selected to participate in the Moscow Biennale in Russia. His residency and exhibition are supported in part by the Quattlebaum Artist-in-Residence Endowment and the E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation.

A largely unknown work from 1962, Diurnes is a box decorated with color lithographs by Picasso containing 30 original photograms made by a then-young unknown photographer, André Villers, under Picasso's instigation to "play with" some paper cutouts he had done for his grandchildren shortly after Matisse's death, in 1954. One thousand boxes were produced by Berggruen in Paris in 1962, with lithographs of the photograms, along with an 18-page poetic script by Jacques Prévert.

Each image is precisely numbered and titled in its own paper folder. On top of the 30 images is a separately bound, beautifully printed, 18-page poetic, script-like text written by one of Picasso's closest friends, the French poet, film writer (Les Enfants du Paradis his signal achievement), prolific song writer, and collage artist Jacques Prévert. The text presents readers with a set of characters and dialogues relating to the

Art: Nineteenth-Century "Poets in Paint" in 2004. In 2005, having seen several unusual "Picasso photo-collages" hanging in the small Musee de Photographie in the southern French town of Mougins (the final home of Picasso and Jacqueline), Johnson began a search for more of these "strange works," finding some discussion of the photograms in Anne Baldasarri's landmark publication of Picasso and Photography.

The Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art at the College of Charleston provides a multidisciplinary laboratory for the production, presentation, interpretation, and dissemination of ideas by innovative visual artists from around the world. As a noncollecting museum, we create meaningful interactions between adventurous artists and diverse communities within a context that emphasizes the historical, social, and cultural importance of the art of our time.





She currently resides in Goose Creek, SC, and teaches Drawing, Design, and Color & Composition courses at Trident Technical College. 

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on Nov. 7, from 5-8pm. The exhibition offers a rich selection from the wide-ranging work of Oshibana artist Mila Garro. Her work is based on the universal interest in preserving the fleeting beauty of nature and in the long tradition of Japanese Oshibana.

Garro is a visual artist who uses the pressed flowers leaves, moss, grass, seeds, birch bark and more as her palette. The subtle color of the petals, the texture of the plant, and the shape of a leaf or a grass are building blocks of her botanic mosaics. She blends these elements so skillfully, layer by layer, that from a distance a new image emerges. Viewers only see the landscape, the garden, the figure. Only a closer look reveals all details

Oshibana is the Japanese art of making pictures with pressed dry flowers and plants. In Japanese, Oshibana means "pressed flowers". It dates as an art form back to 16th century. During the early Victorian era, as Japanese exchanges with Europe increased, the art became fashionable in both England and America.

Typically the creation of an Oshibana artwork, requires several time-consuming steps. In the early phases, one's skill and experience in the collection, selection, and preservation of the plant materials are what set apart an apprentice from a master. Once the botanical elements are properly preserved, the artist can use them to create a floral design. After preservation, the dry materials are carefully arranged into a multi-layered mosaic on an acid free background mat. Then the finished artwork is vacuum-sealed under a layer of




archival-quality museum glass. Needless to say, the process is not a simple one. Most important, however, it is the artist's creativity that makes a great piece of Oshibana artwork.

Garro began arranging pressed flowers as a personal hobby. Her work has been exhibited in the "2011 Philadelphia International Flower Show", the "2011 Exhibition of Creation in Japan", as well as the "2012 & 2013 Korean Competition", and she has received multiple awards in several international shows and exhibitions.

Her works are in collections in Virginia, West Virginia, Washington, DC, North Carolina, Georgia, Arkansas, and France. Blackwell-Chapman has exhibited annuall since 1993 in juried and non-juried shows in North Carolina, and has been a member of the artists' collective. Artworks Gallerv in Winston-Salem since 1992.

Wendell Myers' paintings are abstract landscapes. Within the language of landscape, he uses motion, light, color and energy to evoke an emotional state, to create a sense of mystery. He is very interested in improvisation, paints spontaneously, letting the painting take him where it will go. Myers begins by applying color to the canvas, studies what happens and then responds with more color or texture. Watch, react, paint some more, respond. Myers' work is a lot like jazz; listening, reacting and playing simultaneously. His goal is not to totally control what emerges, but to influence it; to allow, to a degree, the paint to do what it will. Often, in music or art, it is the unexpected result which is the most expressive and most enjoyable.

Myers went to art school in Milwaukee in the '70s, earning a BFA from the Peck School of the Arts. He went to medical continued above on next column to the right

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school in Winston-Salem in the '80s, and completed specialty training in Diagnostic Radiology in the '90s. He has practiced medicine in the area for 20 years, but returned to his artistic roots several years ago, painting abstract landscapes in acrylics. Myers continues to practice medicine as a faculty member at Wake Forest School of Medicine, where he specializes in breast imaging, and is one of the newest members of Artworks Gallery.

Ben Perini, born in Brooklyn, NY, grew up among the great museums of New York City - which he visited often from an early age. His first educational art experience was at age eight, attending the Saturday art classes at the Brooklyn Museum. Over the years he has studied many inspirational artists and he has created art ever since, as a professional illustrator and a fine artist.





The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, will present What You See Is What You See: American Abstraction After 1950, on view from Nov. 28 through Mar. 8, 2015.

This exhibition considers the four phases of Color Field painting from the 1950s through the 1980s. Beginning in the late 1950s, art critic Clement Greenberg noted a tendency toward all-over color - or Color Field - in the works of several of the First Generation Abstract Expressionists such as Rothko and Clyfford Still. Greenberg included Color Field painting as part of post-painterly abstraction, a movement away from the bold gestural brushstrokes of early Abstract Expressionism.

Hans Hofmann was an Abstract Expressionist and noted teacher and is regarded as one of the first theorists of Color Field painting. Two other artists who were influential in color theory and practice are Josef Albers and Ilya Bolotowsky. Both artists taught at Black Mountain College and studied there with artists such as Kenneth Noland. Many artists, including George Bireline and Maud Gatewood, spent time in New York City in the 1950s as part of the second generation of Abstract Expressionists.

Helen Frankenthaler looked at Color

1950s and developed Stained Color Field painting. She diluted her paints and poured onto canvases lying on a floor or table. Where Stained Color Field painting reflects an evolution of Abstract Expressionism, there are at least two additional color field schools that can be viewed as a rebellion against the Abstract Expressionists - Hard Edged Abstraction and Optical Art.

Hard Edged Abstraction includes paintings where fields of a single color are sharply divided. Optical Art, Op Art or Optical Perception Art developed in the 1960s. The term first appeared in print in Time magazine in October 1964 in response to Julian Stanczak's show "Optical Paintings" at the Martha Jackson Gallery. Hard Edged Abstraction and Op Art emphasized a more mechanical approach to painting, and Op Art reintroduced the illusion of depth into painting. Op Art on occasion would include illusion of movement and could fool the eye into seeing colors that were not present.

A reception will be held on Nov. 1, from 6-9pm. A short lecture will be given during the opening at 7pm by Volker Frank, PhD from UNCA who teaches Latin American Studies.

The exhibition was made possible by a grant from the North Carolina Humanities Council, a statewide nonprofit and affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The Jose Guadalupe Posada's limited dition prints on display are print from the original plates. Sixty-Two prints are imited edition 944 of 1500, print in 1960 at the Museum of Graphic Arts in Mexico City. Twenty-Three other limited prints are from the Instituto Nacional de Bellas Artes print in 1943.

There will also be several original prints on display from the collection of the Courtyard Gallery of the Flood Fine Arts Center.

Posada, the father of Mexican printmaking, born in Aquascalientes, Mexico in 1852. In 1868, he was apprenticed to a local printmaker and publisher, Jose Trinidad Pedroza, who specialized in lithography, Posada's first prints are in this medium. In 1872 Pedroza opened a second shop in the city of Leon and left Posada in charge of it. Posada bought the shop in 1876 but moved to Mexico City in 1888 to perfect his art and escape the politicians who were now back in power in his home city and upset with Posada's satires of them.

In Mexico City, Posada found recogni tion as chief artist for Antonio Vanegas Arroyo, a prominent publisher of illustrated broadsides, gazettes, songbooks,

chapbooks and other popular forms of illustrated literature. All of Posada's now famous prints were produced for his publisher, Arroyo, and he continued to work closely with him until his death in 1913.

Posada's prints cover an amazing range of imagery. National events, disasters, miracles, abnormalities, executions, illustrations to popular songs, broadsheets, protests to modern machines, and political protests cover a large portion of his artistic oeuvre. But by far his best known work in the United States remain the Mexican Revolution images and these 'Calaveras' that have permanently been placed at the summit of Mexican artistic expression.

By means of the Calaveras (Spanish for skulls or skeletons), Posada was able to mime practically every human folly. Posada is to Mexico what Daumier, Goya and Hogarth are to their countries. To this day, any print in Mexico is referred to as a "Posada." Masters of the succeeding generations, such as Rivera and Orozco, were deeply influenced and indebted to Posada's art.

This exhibition of Jose Guadalupe Posada's work contains examples of almost all of his different subjects and genres.



She completed a residency at the prestigious Banff Centre in Alberta, Canada, the Wollmagazin studio complex in Kaiserslautern, Germany, and several other places. In 2012, Gregg was one of three finalists for the 701 CCA Prize for South Carolina artists 40 years and younger, organized by 701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC. Gregg usually works in series to explore personal and social themes of identity, consumption, ancient culture and fantasy.

Leo Twiggs hails from Orangeburg, SC A batik artist, Twiggs is considered by many to be the "dean of South Carolina arts." For some four decades Twiggs has been among his home state's most prominent figures in the arts, foremost as an artist, but also as an arts educator and administrator, and a member of many arts and culture-related boards committees and commissions.

Twiggs is considered nationally as the pioneer in using batik as a modern art medium. His career retrospective, organized by the Georgia Museum of Art, traveled extensively from 2004 through 2006, including to the Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, where it opened during the Spoleto Festival in May 2004. Twiggs also was selected for the South Carolina State Museum's 1999 millennium exhibition 100 Years, 100 Artists.

Twiggs has had some 70 solo shows. His largest solo exhibition was *Civil/Uncivil*: The Art Of Leo Twiggs at the City Gallery at Waterfront Park in Charleston, SC, in 2011, curated by Wim Roefs. Twiggs has shown at New York City's Studio Museum in Harlem, the Schenectady Museum in New York state, the Georgia Museum of Art, the Palazzo Venezia in Rome, Italy, the Delta Fine Art Center in Winston Salem, NC, the Herbert F. Johnson Museum at Cornell University, Ithaca, NY, the Mississippi Mu-

seum of Art, the American Crafts Museum in New York, all prominent South Carolina museums and elsewhere.

In 2003 Twiggs was inducted into the National Black College Alumni Hall of Fame. In 1980, he became the first visual artist to receive South Carolina's Gover nor's Award for the Arts, the Verner Award. Formerly a distinguished professor of art and executive director of the I.P. Stanback Museum and Planetarium at SC State University in Orangeburg, SC, Twiggs is a SC State professor emeritus and distinguished artist-in-residence at Claffin University.

Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, Celebrates the 100th **Anniversary of the Panama Canal**

The Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte NC, will present Connecting the World: The Panama Canal at 100, on view from Nov. 1 through Feb. 1, 2015.

The exhibition, organized by the Mint is timed to coincide with the centennial of the opening of the Panama Canal in 1914, will feature a stunning selection of more than 50 works of art drawn from important collections across the country, fascinating historical ephemera, and two exciting new commissions created especially for the occasion by the internationally-renowned contemporary artist Mel Chin and the award-winning author Anthony Doerr.

"The Mint is proud to be able to share this remarkable project with our community. The theme of international connectivity that underpins this exhibition is perfectly aligned with a number of initiatives already underway as Charlotte positions itself as a truly global city," said Dr. Kathleen V. Jameson, President and CEO of the Mint.

Panama Canal at 100 was organized by the museum's Senior Curator of American, Modern, and Contemporary Art, Dr. Jonathan Stuhlman. Wells Fargo is lead sponsor of the exhibition, which will be bilingual with exhibition texts in both English and Spanish. Stuhlman drew his inspiration for the show from a painting by Alson Skinner Clark depicting the excavation of the canal that has been on long term loan to the museum since 2010. This is the first exhibition of its kind to bring together a broad sampling of art related to the canal and to situate this art in a historical perspective.

"I have long been fascinated by the way in which the bright colors, delicate brushwork, and elegant frame of Clark's painting contrast so strikingly with the actuality of the gritty, extraordinarily difficult conditions under which the canal was actually created," says Stuhlman.

"The centennial of the canal's opening provided a perfect opportunity to not only examine Clark's paintings more closely, but to look at both how they fit into a historical context and to think about how the canal has impacted the world over the century that it has been operational.

This year marks not only the centennial of the opening of the canal, but also a moment at which the canal is poised to expand to double its previous capacity. An international multibillion-dollar project to widen and deepen the canal is expected to be completed by 2016. Meanwhile, the exhibition's home city, Charlotte, is opening a state-of-the-art Intermodal Transfer Facility at Charlotte/Douglas International Airport, giving it the ability to manage efficiently the increased flow of goods and establishing the region as a major center for global trade and commerce. The exhibition's opening will coincide with the US Commercial Service's Discover Global Markets: The Americas 2014 Conference to be held in Charlotte. Jonathan D. Farrar, US Ambassador to Panama, is scheduled to attend.

The construction and opening of the canal were of tremendous global interest and importance in the early 20th century, earning it the nickname "The Eighth Wonder of the World" and inspiring a major international exposition in 1915. Photographs of the canal, disseminated via popular magazines, postcards, stereoscopic views, and even playing cards, kept an eager American audience up to date with the latest developments in its construction. These types of objects will be interspersed with the paintings and prints that make up the main body of the show. As the canal neared completion, three highly-regarded American artists, printmaker Joseph Pennel and painters Jonas Lie and Alson Skinner Clark, seized the opportunity to document this monumental undertaking, traveling to Panama to work on site. Each created a remarkable body of work that captures the scale, activity, and dynamism of the site. Panama Canal at 100 marks the first time that works from these three series have ever been brought together and presented to the public.

a number of paintings by key 19th century American artists who had worked in South America, including Frederic Church and Martin Johnson Heade. It will also feature paintings by such early 20th century artists as Julien Alden Weir, Ernest Lawson, and George Bellows, each of whom took innovative new approaches to examining the American landscape, painting scenes that included factories and urban development in the popular styles of their day. Together these two groups of paintings will provide a rich context for the subsequent paintings and prints by Pennell, Clark, and Lie.

New commissions join exhibition with support from Elizabeth Firestone Graham Foundation and Knight Foundation

This centennial year provides a perfect opportunity to both reconsider these historic works of art and to reflect upon the legacy of the canal itself. In conjunction with the exhibition, the Mint has commissioned a major new work of art, an installation titled SEA to SEE by Mel Chin, made possible with major support from The John S. and James L. Knight Foundation. The Mint has also commissioned a new short story by author Anthony Doerr, entitled "The Fever Dreams of William Crawford Gorgas," and will publish it in the exhibition catalogue thanks to major support from the Elizabeth Firestone Graham Foundation.


Chin, who is based in Burnsville, NC, and is a former Artist-in-Residence at McColl Center for Art + Innovation, is currently in the process of fabricating SEA to SEE. The immersive environment will allow visitors to pass between two monumental plate-glass hemispheres representing the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, mimicking the passage of people and goods through the canal. These hemispheres, whose gridded structure evokes both the latitude and longitude lines of a globe and the structure of the massive lock gates of the canal, will come alive through two reverse-projected films that will feature imagery derived from historical data pertaining to each ocean.

The installation will be documented on the museum's website, (www.mintmuseum org), with video and other digital content. Chin, known for his varied and prolific career including his "Safehouse" project drawing attention to lead poisoning in Nev Orleans, was recently described in The New *York Times* as an artist who "has spent 40 years obliterating boundaries between science, education, politics and, perhaps most pointedly, people.'

For his writing, Anthony Doerr has been awarded four O. Henry Prizes, the Rome Prize, a Guggenheim Fellowship, and the Story Prize, among others. His most recent book, the full length novel "All the Light We Cannot See," was released this May to widespread acclaim and remains near the top of The New York Times Best Sellers list. The short story that Doerr has crafted for this exhibition immerses viewers in a richly crafted narrative that follows the fascinating life of William Crawford Gorgas, an American doctor whose journey eventually led him to Panama to battle malaria and yellow fever.

Panama Canal at 100 is accompanied by a fully illustrated catalogue containing an essay by Stuhlman, the new work of fiction by Doerr, and photographs, sketches, and an interview related to Chin's commission. continued above on next column to the right









The Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture in Charlotte, NC, is presenting A Love Supreme: Robert Mars featuring Jay West, on view through Dec. 15, 2014.

The exhibit highlights a series of portraits of African-American icons that include Martin Luther King, Jr., Muhammad Ali, Lena Horne - Mars and West collaborated on this piece - John Coltrane and Michael Jackson.

King is the key figure in the series, for he dared to publicly dream of a better future for African Americans, one where his "four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the of their character." Portrayed with a photographic realism, these icons are shown at the height of their fame and in the glory of their youth.

Robert Mars' artwork chronicles an evolving fascination with the Golden Age of American popular culture and celebrates the icons of the 1950's and 60's by taking inspiration from this culture long past. Through the application of a rich color palette and tongue-in-cheek attitude, Mars' paintings evoke a vintage quality of design and pay homage to the idealized age of growth and hopefulness that was prevalent in the USA at the end of the Depression. This was a time before the internet and mobile technology, where information was not instantly available to millions and there was no such thing as instant internet celebrities, and instead people lived with the myth of the unique, untouchable and unforgettable personalities of Marilyn Monroe, Elizabeth Taylor, James Dean, Audrey Hepburn and Elvis Presley. By merging his own concept of person-

al idols with those of mainstream culture,

Mars is able to focus his work on a deeper analysis of the Golden Age of American personalities. As an artist, he has always been fascinated with 1950's and 60's culture, and his early work reflects many of the architectural and mechanical icons from this era. Muscle cars, motels, logos and hulking monuments to the "modern" feeling of the time permeate his early canvases. More recently however, Mars' artwork has shifted toward the culture of celebrity and he is amazingly attuned to the fact that these instantly recognizable and larger-than-life personalities continue to resonate with contemporary American culture

A graduate of Parsons School of Design in New York, Mars begins the creative process by preparing his surface with multiple layers of brown paper in order to define the edges and delineate the background planes of color. He then alternates layers of paint and vintage paper ephemera, sanding away portions continued on Page 32

of the layers as he works, revealing the desired portions of under painting with the overall intention to provide the viewer with a muted window into America's past. Chronicling this fascination with 1950's and 60's iconography, Mars has produced a body of artwork from his studio in New York that celebrates the commonplace objects and icons of an America long past in a thoroughly modern and exquisitely constructed manner.

Mars' eye for a distinct facet of American history is impeccable and his ability to manipulate the color and wordplay of vintage printed material has earned him reference with the likes of Andy Warhol, Robert Rauschenberg, and Richard Diebenkorn among other masters from the School of Pop. Mars' artwork is exhibited worldwide including museum collections in Munich, Tokyo, Amsterdam, London, Boston, New York, Los Angeles, Laguna Beach, Paris, Aspen and Naples. His artwork was also selected for the Absolut Vodka Blank campaign alongside Damien Hirst and his largest sized piece to date was recently acquired by Philip Morris/ Altria for their corporate headquarters in Virginia. Mars has been confirmed as a guest artist to participate in the Coca Cola bottle 100 year celebration in 2015.

Jay West subverts the grandiose aura of art history through his adaptation of pop aesthetics. Using both the expressiveness of abstraction and surrealism, and the







The Artist's Guild of Spartanburg in Spartanburg, SC, will present Warped, featuring works by Annette Giaco, on view in the Guild Gallery, located at The Chapman Cultural Center, from Nov. 3 - 28, 2014. A reception will be held on Nov. 20, from 6-9pm

Annette Giaco describes Warped as a show of distorted, sometimes abstract representations of the human form based on her collection of old photos.

After moving to the Spartanburg area from Virginia six years ago. Giaco returned to her artist roots fulltime, concentrating much of her energy on landscapes and the occasional portrait. "I love oil paint and canvas, but felt drawn back to my art school days and the simplicity of rendering the human form using graphite, pen and ink, and ink washes."

"It started with old family pho some of the fascinating stories behind all of those stoic expressions. My mother and father loved to tell those stories. From there, I began combing the antique stores, collecting photos of unknown people. Although not all of the photos I chose were sad or scary looking, I was drawn to those that looked disconnected, overburdened, or arrogant. To me, most of them looked a little sad, so I picked up a pencil and started sketching, distorting them or warping them, based on the look in their eyes or their rigid facial expressions. My imagination took off and I started applying stories of my own based on the period costumes, crazy hair or military trappings. Some of the stories are sad, some are happy, most are complete fiction but they guided the direction of each drawing.'

"I read somewhere that disfigured drawings of the human form are often interpreted as an artist's individual expression of frustration, anger or fear," Giaco said. "I don't see these pieces in that way. For me, it was just a natural inclination to render the form based on what I read in their eyes or the

notes scribbled on the back of some photos They ultimately became tributes or shrines to forgotten souls, my memorials to them. But they also became a calming retreat for me because of the recent illness and death of my mother.

Using mixed media, the images were drawn or painted on clay-coated boards. Giaco used a variety of tools, including sandpaper, printmaking tools and wire brushes used to clean electronics, scraping the media from the surface in order to create the "drawing", sometimes incorporating text as background texture.

"After doing the initial sketch, these tools became my pencils and pens, distorting the image a little more," says Giaco. "I scraped away and then sometimes rebuilt on top of that with ink or acrylic washes, moving further from the original toward an abstract version; all the while referencing the ongoing narrative in my head."

While Giaco hopes that the viewer will not take the "meaning" of these images too seriously, she does acknowledge that they may not be for everyone. "My grandchildren love them. One of the girls refers to them as "ghosts". Other members of the family either love or hate them. Recently, a writer with The Boston Globe visited my home on a completely unrelated story, wandered into my studio and was drawn to two of the pieces I was working on. He was interested in my interpretation of the continued on Page 35


original photos and my rendering technique. He purchased them on the spot. It made me feel like I accomplished my intention." Giaco said she used her imagination based on what the camera captured and sees each one as a fun, maybe irreverent way of honoring some old ghosts. She went on to say that a friend suggested that maybe she empathized with the individuals in those photos, connecting with their personal struggles. "I'd like to think that's true. Technology and social mores change, but people haven't changed much. We still struggle and set goals, we work hard; and we all have stories to tell. I'd like to think of this show as an affirmation of the spiritual connection we all have as human beings in our own life narratives.'



Historic Chancellor's Residence in Raleigh, NC, Features Works by John Menapace

The Historic Chancellor's Residence, at North Carolina State University and future site of the Gregg Museum in Raleigh, NC, is presenting SMOKES AND MIRRORS: Reflections of the Self in Photographs by John Menapace, guest-curated by Belén Morata and Sammy Kirby, on view through Feb. 6, 2015.

Menapace has been called "the father of fine art photography in North Carolina," and his entire life's work (nearly 30,000 negatives and 6,500 prints) has been gifted to the university.

In 1955, 28-year-old John Menapace decided to quit his job at Oxford University Press and head off to Mexico on a motorcycle. He bought a second-hand camera to record the trip. Somehow the plan fell through, but the camera opened up a whole new way of seeing. By the time he moved to Durham, NC, the following year to work for Duke University Press, his camera had become an almost constant companion, second only to the cigarettes he famously chain-smoked

Menapace eventually founded the first photography courses at Duke, soon followed by summer workshops at Penland School of Crafts, to which many of the state's best known photographers (Elizabeth Matheson and Caroline Vaughan among

them) trace their own visual lineage and way of working. Fellow photographer David Simonton has called Menapace "the father of art photography in North Carolina.

When Menapace died in the summer of 2010, he left behind hundreds of photography books from his personal library, thousands of black and white prints, and tens of thousands of negatives, all of which were gifted to the Gregg's permanent collection. Since July 2012, Spanish photo historian Bélen Morata and retired lawyer Sammy Kirby have been cataloging and archiving the trove.

Florence County Museum, 111 West Cheves Street, across the street from the Francis Marion University Performing Arts Center, Florence. Through Oct. 5. 2015 - "William H. Johnson: New Beginnings," features twenty one works from the life of Florence native, William Henry Johnson (1901-1970) selected from the collections of the Smithsonian American Art Museum the Florence Museum Board of Trustees, the Johnson Collection, and a private collector in Denmark. This selection not only represents the range of distinct periods over the artist's prolific career, but it also offers a rare personal glimpse into the artist's relationship with the people and places of Florence, America, & Europe. In 1901 William H. Johnson was born in Florence, SC. At the age of 17, he traveled and studied in America and Europe, producing and exhibiting art that reflected the styles and attitudes of the world around him. Fearing the eminent onset of war in Europe, Johnson returned to the United States in 1938. Over the course of the next decade, his art transformed into the intense, "primitivist" style he is recognized for today. Both vibrant and somber, these abstracted paintings depict the African-American experience from both a historical and personal perspective. Today the Smithsonian American Art Museum owns more work by Johnson than any other single artist. In 2009, two of Johnson's works painted during the artist's 1944 visit to Florence, were among those chosen by First Lady Michelle Obama as decoration for the White House. Through Jan. 1, 2016 - "Selections-from-the-Wright-Collectionof-Southern-Art". This exhibition features thirty works from the Florence County Museum's recently acquired Wright Collection of Southern Art. In its entirety, The Wright Collection of Southern Art features 141 works collected over 45 vears by former Florence pathologist. Dr. Louis Wright. 
