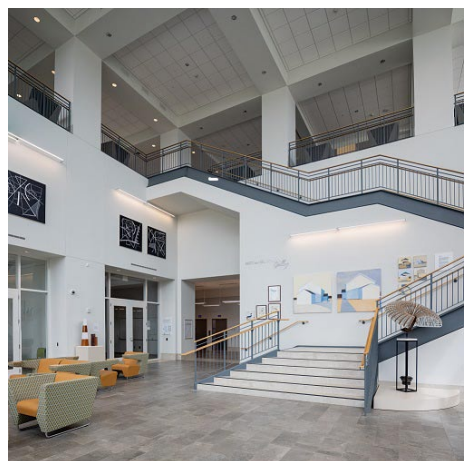

Davidson College, Belk Visual Arts Center, 315 North Main and Griffith Streets, Davidson. **Van Every/Smith Galleries, Through Dec. 9** - "Nicholas Galanin: Dreaming in English". Galanin's work is rooted in his perspective as an Indigenous man, deeply connected to the land and his Tlingit/Unangax culture. Over the past two decades, Galanin has worked across media, materials, and processes—engaging past, present, and future—to expose widespread misappropriation and commodification of Indigenous visual culture, the impact of colonialism, intentionally obscured collective memory, and barriers to education. His practice, encompassing sculpture, installation, photography, video, performance, printmaking, and textile-based works, unites traditional and contemporary processes and materials to reclaim narrative and creative agency, and contribute to the continuum of Tlingit art within an ever-evolving contemporary Indigenous practice. His exhibition at the Van Every/Smith Galleries, "Dreaming in English", includes an installation of the same title that speaks directly to the forced removal and relocation of Indigenous children from the reservation into residential "schools." These so-called "schools" were not focused on the acquisition of knowledge but on assimilation; the intent was to eradicate both culture and spirit. **Ongoing** - While on campus, be sure to take a tour of our Campus Sculpture. Elizabeth Ross Gallery, Central Piedmont Community College, Central Campus, Overcash Performing Arts Center, Elizabeth Avenue and Kings Dr., Charlotte. **Through Dec. 9** - "Metamorphosis II," an exhibition of multi-view paintings by CPCC Art Instructor Al Torres, that go beyond the physical presence of a person or object. A reception will be held on Nov. 3, at 5:30pm in Central Campus, Overcash Center, Ross Art Gallery, 1st floor. An Artist Lecture will be offered on Nov. 3, at 2pm, at Central Campus, Overcash Center, Tate Hall, 2nd floor. Torres aims to capture the "truth" of the subject and impart a sense of wonder to the viewer. Torres paints directly onto aluminum surfaces at 45 degrees. The intent is for the spectator to approach the work from the left side, where he or she sees the first image. As they walk toward the center, they encounter a combination of the left and right views. These multiple views help the spectator transition through the story of the overall painting. Tryon St., Charlotte. **Through Jan. 17, 2022** - "Container / Contained: Phil Freelon - Design Strategies for Telling African American Stories". The late North Carolina architect Philip G. Freelon (1953-2019) had a remarkable career of over four decades designing public buildings with his firm The Freelon Group and later as Design Director of Perkins + Will North Carolina. This exhibition critically examines Freelon's work, including museums, libraries, cultural centers, and public parks, with a focus on projects that foreground African American communities and identities. Freelon often noted that architecture should be more than a container, that it should help tell the story of and be integral to the content of these public institutions. **Through Jan. 17, 2022** - "Visual

Vanguard: An Exhibition of Contemporary Black Carolina Artists". The exhibition is an examination of twenty-six artists who create in a variety of vibrant and versatile media. This exhibition surveys the struggles, strengths, and celebrations of Black creativity in the Carolinas through visual art, performance, video, and poetry. By examining the ambiguity and origination within retakes and variations, each artist amplifies the ideals of racial pride, social power, identity, and the importance of heritage and culture. Guest curators, David Wilson and Stephen Hayes, Jr., sought a mosaic of styles that range from didactic to reductive. Their collective vision provides a framework for significations that are inverted and opportunities where form and content merge. Consideration was given to content that is disassociated from its original meaning, ultimately exposing the artist's process.
