USC Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, Features Works by Herb Parker

The UPSTATE Gallery on Main, run by USC Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, in celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the SC Arts Commission, presents *Southern Gothic*, a sculptural installation by Charleston artist and SC Arts Commission fellow Herb Parker. The exhibition opens Jan. 12 and runs through Mar. 24, 2018. An artist's reception will be held from 5-8pm, on Jan. 18, during Spartanburg ArtWalk.

In Southern Gothic, Parker explores the nuances and incongruities of modern life through the conjoining of hand-crafted and found objects, which are used to create an assemblage-inspired installation. Surreal and often macabre, Parker's highly topical works are imbued with a sense of his own history, culture, and philosophies.

"This work reflects the insecurities, fears and exhilarations of life and has evolved into a discourse on the dichotomies that make life challenging and rewarding," Parker said. "It is occasionally grotesque with elements of a fatalistic romanticism and dark humor that serves as an absurdist social critique."

Originally from Elizabeth City, NC, Parker earned his MFA in sculpture from East Carolina University and currently teaches at the College of Charleston. Parker has completed artist residencies at the Center for Contemporary Art, ArtPark, Quartz Mountain Nature Park, and Kotakiji

Temple, among many others. Parker has also received grants and fellowships from numerous organizations, including the National Endowment for the Arts, Southern Arts Federation, and the South Carolina Arts Commission. Since 1983, he has created over 60 site-specific installations.

This exhibition is supported by the South Carolina Arts Commission, South Carolina Arts Foundation and First Citizens Bank.

The UPSTATE Gallery on Main located on E. Main Street in Spartanburg, is a dedicated art exhibition space that features a rotating schedule of regional and national artists' work. 
"My journey began in Cameroon, West Africa, where I was born in October of 1994," Nkoth said. "The vibrant cities inspired me at an early age so much so that I spent much of my time there filling sketch-Page 10 - Carolina Arts, January 2018

books. My work explores the relationship between the body and urban spaces. With influences as diverse as Picasso, Dali, and Andy Warhol, new tensions are crafted from both opaque and transparent layers infused with rich textures and colors."

"Ever since I was a pre-adolescent I have been fascinated by the essential unreality of the moment," added Nkoth. "What starts out as vision soon becomes corrupted into

a dialectic of greed, leaving only a sense of chaos and the prospect of a new understanding. As momentary replicas become distorted through frantic and critical practice, the viewer is left with an epitaph for the edges of our condition. In these new works, I want the viewer to feel at home while in an unfamiliar environment, reaching new levels of understanding art works that makes no sense to the naked eye."

About 14 pieces of art will be in the month-long exhibit, and most of it will be very colorful and abstract images of people on textured backgrounds. His painting style often uses many different bright colors combined with dark shadows to achieve a sense of isolated diversity. His style consists of depicting energy and emotion through color choices; creating expressive art, to stimulate the viewer's mind, compelling him/her to interact with the piece. The larger works (48 by 60 inches) sell for \$3,000, and the smaller pieces (30 by 40 inches) sell for \$1,000. A series of masks (12 by 22 inches) will sell for \$200 each.

Nkoth received his bachelor's degree in art education/art history in 2017 from the University of South Carolina Upstate. Among his awards are the 2014 Scholastic National Award and top prize in the University's art competition in 2015. His work has
