Baskets by Lynn Shallis are woven using patterns and designs to make a fine art piece.

Light catching and reflective blown glass by John Almaguer and Robinson Scott enhance the *Small Works* exhibit, along with the assembled recycled glass trays, plates, coasters and candle holders by Fred Mead. Niche awards finalist, Mead exhibits "Crystal Globe" an assembled, recycled, sandblasted glass sculpture offering peace and tranquility for the *Winter* exhibition.

Wearable fiber is represented by hand-crafted wool felted hats by Myra Tannehill and Vasanto. Hand woven colorful scarves by Carolyn Glazener and Banaris along with mobius shawls by Nancy Roberson are artistically crafted and stylish.

Small works in lovely fine crafted jewelry is a feature for the *33 Winter Group Exhibition*. Pendants, and Rings by Ran Armstrong are in sterling silver with 14K gold interspersed in some pieces. His work is finely crafted with a 21st century design and quality. Channing Ayers crafts necklaces using a varied selection of quality gemstones and pearls. Furman University in Greenville, SC, Offers Photography Exhibition

Photography by students and faculty of Furman University Undergraduate Evening Studies (UES) is on display now through Dec. 7, 2015, in the Baiden Gallery of the Herring Center on the Furman-campus in Greenville, SC. The exhibition, *Personal Narratives of Home: Finding Meaning in Greenville*, is free and open to the public.

The exhibition showcases the university's hometown as seen through the unique perspectives of UES alumni, students, and faculty, and debuts the works of instructor and internationally-exhibited artist, Bryan Hiott. Hiott, a fine art photographer, earned his Master of Fine Art from Parsons The New School for Design in New York City where he taught prior to joining the UES faculty in 2013.

Furman UES students are typically working adults committed to earning their undergraduate bachelor's degree. Required general education courses in the arts are designed to encourage creativity and individual vision, and provide students opportunities to engage in new learning experiences outside their major courses.

The exhibition gives the community an opportunity to visit the Herring Center where Furman's Continuing Education Department serves more than 2,000 Upstate students annually.

Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, Offers Works by Andrew Moore

The Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, is presenting the exhibition *Andrew Moore*, on view through Jan. 17, 2016.

A native of Connecticut, Andrew Moore (born 1957) has taught at Princeton University and currently teaches at the School of Visual Arts in New York City. His large-format color photographs capture architectural elements and urban landscapes as they are slowly reclaimed by nature. Moore maintains a "perpetual fascination with certain kinds of decayed spaces that have been reappropriated or reused or where the evidence of people struggling to keep their dignity lingers, places that have been abandoned but retain the ghosts of what they were." Moore's previous projects explored subjects in Cuba, Russia, and Detroit. The photographs in *Andrew Moore* are part of an ongoing project that focuses on the American South.

Moore's work is included in the collections of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, and the National Gallery of Art. He received the John Simon Guggenheim

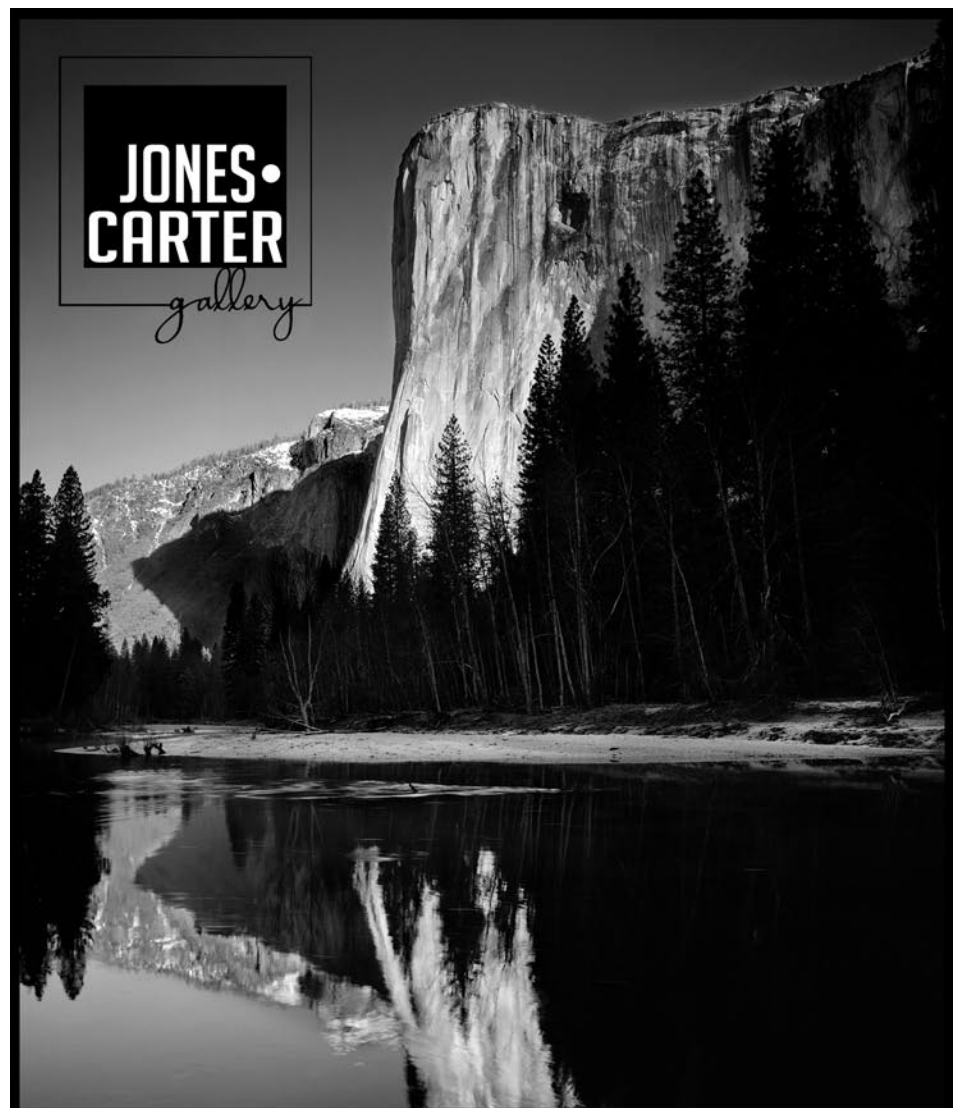


"Midnight Gin, Mississippi, 2014" by Andrew Moore, 50 x 60 inch archival pigment print

Memorial Foundation fellowship as well as grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, New York State Council on the Arts, and several private foundations.
