Weatherspoon Art Museum, University of North Carolina - Greensboro, Cone Building, Tate and Spring Garden Streets, Greensboro. The Gregory D. Ivy Gallery, The Weatherspoon Guild Gallery, Through Mar. 9 - "Nature in All Its Glory: Selections from the Collection." This exhibition of paintings, works on paper, and sculpture from the Weatherspoon's collection honors one of the longstanding themes in the history of art: the celebration of nature and all its wondrous grandeur. Through myriad means, the works featured in this exhibition explore the magnificence, mystery, and power of nature as we experience it in daily life. The Louise B.
