Three artists from South Carolina's Lowcountry have headed north to Tryon, NC, for Spring shows at Upstairs Artspace in Tryon, NC, on view through May 24, 2024. The gallery is pleased to welcome Lynne Riding, Kristi Ryba and Mary Walk the contemporary art gallery. Concerning Being is the title of Lynne Riding's 32-piece show. Abstract in nature, the major elements in Riding's pieces speak to "issues of impermanence, shifting perspectives, and loss, aligned with the dichotomy of enduring hope, that which drives us on." Like an Epiphany, Kristi Ryba's 17-piece show, is a timely examination of current political figures depicted in the style of paintings and images of centuries ago. Using gouache or egg tempera on vellum with gold leaf, at first glance the viewer might mistake the personages for Renaissance European royalty, religious figures, or grand images common to Medieval artwork, iconography and altarpieces. Painter and printmaker Mary Walker will be returning to her former home of Tryon, NC, to exhibit Scenes from Alice in Wonderland. Walker's black and white prints depict the many characters and settings from Lewis Carroll's famous children's novel "Adventures of Alice in Wonderland."
