# Editorial by Tom Starland, Editor and Publisher COMMENTARY

### **Summer Has Arrived**

How can you tell? Well if the heat didn't give you a clue, Carolina Arts has gone from 80 pages in May to 60 pages in June. Some of this shrinkage is due to the fact that many colleges, universities, and arts groups tend to take the Summer months off. Many other institutions plan exhibits to last all Summer long. So those we reported on in May won't offer something new until August or September. And, many folks get a case of the Summertime blues and just forget to send us their info in time for our deadline - if they even made it that far. I have to admit that being stuck to my computer while others are out doing things is no picnic.

So be assured that there is much more going on in the Carolina visual art community than what you will be reading about in this issue. And, our 60 pages offers plenty to do and see.

### **ArtFields**

Well, the folks who head up ArtFields in Lake City, SC, have gone silent again after their event ends. I know an effort lik that can wear a person out, but it's now been a month and they've said nothing about how their second effort went. They announced the winners and then just went silent. I don't get it.

They have put out a few slick videos about the event, but other than that, very little chatter on their social networks and few media outlets have mentioned the

As soon as the event finished was the time to take advantage of the opportunity to tell people what they missed, give artists a reason to enter again or for the first

Now, other Summer art events are taking the headlines, like the Spoleto and Piccolo Spoleto Festivals in Charleston, SC.

Well, I guess we'll eventually hear how the event went. I just hope they aren't getting hung up with the numbers.

I knew another art event that got all wrapped up in numbers. When the Spoleto Festival USA was searching for money from the SC Legislature, they put out a report that said they were attracting 100,000 people to Charleston and South Carolina, making a huge economic impact. Soon the media picked up on those figures, as they tend to do. Whenever the name Spoleto Festival was mentioned the 100,000 number would follow. But it didn't make sense.

So one day, being the doubting Thomas I am, I called the Spoleto Box Office and asked how many tickets they sell on average and they told me a top end would be 60,000 - a bit short of the 100,000 mark. Spoleto doesn't offer any free events and figuring that many locals go to Spoleto events, the fact that few people only see one event, and hotels never seemed to be full, I came up with a generous figure that Spoleto, at best, could only be attracting 30,000 outsiders to Charleston. And to this day, I figure most of those folks come from the region - Charlotte, Atlanta, and other parts of South Carolina.

Today's updated phrase is that 60,000 70,000 attend Spoleto, which is more reflective of their ticket sales. Does it really matter that those other 40,000 never showed up. No! And I don't think Charleston could handle them if they did.

There was a time when Spoleto offered free outdoor visual art events, but those days are long past. With a free event it is very hard to tell who came for the specific event and how many people just happened continued above on next column to the right

to be passing by. But people in Charleston would know if there were 100,000 extra people on the streets, as it would shut the

Spoleto starts every year along with the Memorial Day weekend for a good reason Charleston will be packed that weekend. Are all the people there for Spoleto? No, but it looks good to anyone who is there for Spoleto - especially those folks from whom they receive funding. They wouldn't think of starting a week earlier or a week later.

So in regards to the folks in Lake City don't get all wrapped up in the numbers that become more important than your overall goal of bringing more people into Lake City. If the organizers are happy with the results (in just two years) and the merchants are happy with the results what does it matter to anyone else?

If you're looking for outside funding, then you are competing in a world that is used to over-bloating the numbers and the folks reading them don't believe them anymore - so why not just let them be what they are. Whatever they are - they are most likely better than before nothing was being done.

But, you need to push ArtFields all

There are still a few folks out there who keep asking us where they can pick up a printed version of the paper, which isn't going to happen any time soon - unless I win the lottery and in order to do that they say I have to buy a ticket. That doesn't sound like a good deal to me.

Some of these folks are convinced that they just got a printed version a few months ago - they just can't remember

where. The fact that we're into our fourth year of not printing the paper makes me wonder how regularly these folks read our printed version. No problem - time is on our side. Eventually these folks will learn how to deal with online publishing or just have to give up a lot, and soon young folks will be asking us - "You used to print the paper - why? Who does that anymore?"

Some folks would like us to just go totally virtual - publishing every day. With just the two of us that's not possible either. As is, I spend a lot of my time, almost every day, posting info at Carolina Arts News, where we offer late breaking news, news that's late, and news we think you need to know at

(http://carolinaartsnews.wordpress.com/). Here you'll find news about fundraisers, calls for entries, calls for submissions, staff changes to organizations, results of juried shows, news about artists, news about galleries, and news about art institutions. It's amazing how much stuff flows to us that has nothing to do about visual art exhibitions.

And then there is Facebook and Twitter. To me, Twitter is just a place to retweet other people's info and Facebook - don't get me started. Let's just say I have a tolerant - hate relationship with Facebook.

Don't get me wrong - I find Facebook useful, but at the same time totally a pain the rear and constantly in flux. People on Facebook are being used without any input on how it operates. It's free so what can we say?

### Just Keep Marching On

Next month we will enter our 28th year of bringing folks info about the visual arts. It's been a ride of ups and downs, but a good ride and never a boring ride. What have we learned in the last 27 years? You don't want to know. We prefer for folks to hold on to their illusions about the arts. I can tell you this. Most artists produce a product that is for sale. They hope people will want to buy what they produce. Some sell their work individually and some sell in retail outlets. The arts are an industry.

Smith is known for her bold and vibrant landscapes. More recently, however, she has been finding inspiration in abstract painting. "My joy in landscape painting for many years has been my connection with the natural environment," says Smith. "Morphing into abstract painting was an easy transition in that I'm still painting organic forms that tie in with nature.

"The image is not 'the thing'," Smith explains, "but the long fluid brushwork that flows into a colorful rhythm with unrestrained freedom becomes the expression of the image. And the result is a reflection again of nature, but now it has

Smith is a native of the Carolinas and has firmly established herself as an enduring artist in the region after over 40 years of painting. Her works adorn the walls of private collections in the area, around the country, and abroad. Her abstract paintings will be shown alongside works by Carl Plansky and Micheal Zarowsky.

Plansky, who died in 2009, is known for the texture, color, and energy that he brought to his paintings. An obituary published in *The Examiner* stated: "His surfaces look like the moon, building up to thick, craggy mountains of pigment and pockmarked with thin, perfect plains of washes. He was in love with the textures and colors of oil painting.

The Wells Gallery at The Sanctuary. on Kiawah Island, SC, will present a two day painting event, Painting Live at Wells Gallery, featuring Karen Larson Turner, on June 6 & 7, 2014, from 1-6pm.

Turner will be in the gallery to visit with our guests, discuss her work, and paint live. A local Charleston, SC, artist, Turner is best known for her four Murals that grace the Grand Staircases of The Sanctuary Resort.

As the artist remarks, "In November of 2003 I received the most challenging commission of my life, to paint four murals, each measuring 22 x 28 feet, for The Sanctuary Resort on Kiawah Island, SC. They were painted in my small studio. since the hotel was under construction. My husband and I designed two walls that had a scrolling wall system to accommodate the long rolls of canvas. All four murals are marsh scenes from Kiawah, each was done in small scale first and then translated onto the larger canvas. The strips of canvas were then installed like wall paper using the

double cut method, after which I got on a lift and did the finishing touches. From the first stages of planning until the final installation, the project continued from early November until April 1st, 2004."

Turner's most recent works feature luscious scenes of the Kiawah landscape, and views of downtown Charleston.



The Coastal Discovery Museum at Honey Horn on Hilton Head Island, SC, will present *Heart of the Lowcountry*, featuring works by Amiri Geuka Farris, on view in the Hilton Head Regional Healthcare Gallery, from June 21 through Aug. 11, 2014. A reception will be held on June 26, from 5-7pm. Two paint parties with the artists will be offered on July 2 from 10am-noon and July 19, from 10am-noon.

The exhibition illustrates and exemplifies the historic lifestyles and experiences of the Sea Islands and the Gullah/Geechee American experience in the Lowcountry. Farris will transform the Discovery House of the Coastal Discovery Museum at Honey Horn into a fabulous artistic vision of color and design, blurring boundaries between traditional and contemporary modes of representation. Vibrant layers of paint and installations transform the Gallery. The bold use of color, along with designs, patterns and Adinkra symbols, let you know the painting is an original work by Farris.

Farris transforms his personal visions into public displays in a flurry of brush strokes, and is carving his own niche among the noteworthy artists of the 21st century. He attend Savannah College of Art and Design, earning a Bachelor's degree in Illustration and a Master of Fine Arts in painting. His formal education solidified his undeniable natural gift. When asked about his inspiration Farris explains, "I like to see artwork that will take one medium and use it to do something else. Artwork that is bold, expressive and completely different."

Farris applies this philosophy to his own art, combining unique designs and bold colors. Also apparent is an affinity for shadow effects and an interest in abstraction, while making sure he doesn't stray too far from realistic elements. Farris is a firm believer that art should be fun. Like most artists, he is motivated by the organic need to express himself creatively, proving the mantra that success is "1 percent inspiration and 99 percent perspiration", Farris follows up an inspired idea with the tedious process of transforming his mental musing into a sketch. The sketch then becomes a finished drawing and, finally, a painting - then comes the "fun part."

Filling in the designs allows the artist to expound upon his original ideas, engaging in a beatific barrage of impromptu inclusions. Farris' use of layers requires an extensive time commitment, but the Page 10 - Carolina Arts, June 2014





results are phenomenal. Despite the long hours devoted to his creations, this consummate perfectionist has yet to complete a piece with which he is totally satisfied. His meticulous eye focuses not only on the stunning creation but on the details that could be added to make it better. His ever-increasing fan base speaks to the appeal of his work. Original pieces consistently sell for \$1,000 to \$20,000.

Farris' thriving career and loyal following have created a high demand for his work. He has a steady influx of art show invitations, was the recipient of the prestigious "Emerging Artist Award" from the historic Penn Center and received a preservation co-award from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and his work is also exhibited internationally. In the meantime, he will continue to produce paintings that he hopes change common views about the modern world. His views parallel those of his inspirational role models which include Romare Bearden, Yinka Shonibare and Keith Haring. "Yes, they were artists, yet they were also involved in their communities and very politically active." Farris notes. "They created art to change people's views about the world. I want to do the same thing."


Holliday says, "The foundation for my work lies within the understanding of primordial forms and their purpose throughout history. These are the forms that are repeated throughout history by different and separate cultures for a similar purpose." He has linked this concept to the aesthetics of Czech glass (where he received much of his training) as well as merging in elements of Cubism and Constructivism.

In his work, Holliday employs "a repeating dialogue incorporating space and time, using visual elements that are inherent in solid cast glass". Sculpture is

by definition three dimensional. Holliday integrates the fourth dimension...time... in his work as well as adding a "fifth dimension", using light to play upon the interior of the object.

Holliday's work is pure in form and color. Much of the imagery captured in the sculptures is derived from the architecture of gothic cathedrals found throughout Europe. These circles, arches, passages and buttresses form a schema that replays itself in different forms throughout the work. The artist's use of a single bold color adds to the strength of each piece.

Pointed Arch Composing Green and Yellow depicts the composition of a pointed or ogival arch, one of the defining characteristics of Gothic architecture. The arch has been broken apart and segmented rendering it asymmetrical. A circular form at the top gives rise to the sculpture, much






## **Southern Highland Craft Guild** in Asheville, NC, Offers Works From Haywood Community College

The Southern Highland Craft Guild in Asheville, NC, is presenting Haywood Community College Graduate Show, on view in the Main Gallery of the Folk Art Center, through Sept. 14, 2014.

Graduates of Haywood's Professional Crafts Program will showcase their talents in wood, clay, fiber, metal and jewelry. This exhibition continues the historical relationship between the Folk Art Center and Haywood, an Educational Center Member of the Southern Highland Craft

Haywood Community College is located in Clyde, NC, just west of Asheville. The college's Professional Crafts Program began in recognition of the region's strong craft heritage. It was envisioned that students would learn the basics of craft media and how to transform that craft into a business. The clay studio was the first

to open in 1974. With the addition of jewelry, wood and fiber studios, a comprehensive curriculum was in place by 1977.

The program's total enrollment is about 60 students: thus classes are small which allows for one-on-one student to teacher attention. Students come from the area, the nation and abroad. They may or may not have prior experience in their craft and many are pursuing crafts as a second or third career. The course of study is challenging, combining craft concentrations with supplemental classes in design, drawing, craft history, business, marketing and photography. Students spend the majority of their time in the studio making their work. At the end of the two-year program, graduates are awarded either a diploma or an Associate of Applied Science degree.

tices has set Haywood's program apart. The college has worked closely with NC Real Enterprises (Rural Entrepreneurship through Action Learning) to develop a hands-on approach to the business and marketing of crafts. This practical training has proven far more successful than academic business classes in the development of entrepreneurial skills.

Haywood Community College and the Southern Highland Craft Guild share a history that documents the role of craft education in preserving traditional culture, creating economic opportunity and fostering professional practice. All of the artists represent the vitality and creativity of craft practice today, which is the ultimate purpose of both institutions. 

## Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC, Features Works by Joseph Pintz

The Penland School of Crafts in Penland NC, is presenting Joseph Pintz: Ceramics, an exhibition of functional ceramics by Joseph Pintz, on view in the Focus Gallery through June 22, 2014.

Pintz works with earthenware clay, handbuilding understated utilitarian pots along with sculpture that echoes the forms of utensils and tools. This exhibition features simple bowls, cups, and serving pieces in a color palette of turquoise, white, amber, yelthe delicate colors, the pots are rugged and reminiscent of carved and painted wooden bowls from the turn of the century. The glazes and slips covering the clay are layered so that textures and the colors from the red earthenware clay are subtly revealed.

Talking about his tableware, Pintz says, 'Sharing food with others and making the time to eat well are ideals I try to live up to in my daily life. The stubborn physicality of my pots forces one to slow down and pay close attention to the moment. In an age of ever-increasing speed, the dinner table is the perfect place to savor, to spend time, to share food and vessels made with integrity and purpose. I sincerely hope that such sustenance allows us to develop a deeper relationship to making and to each other.'

Pintz is an assistant professor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, MO, and recently participated in the Roswell Artistin-Residence Program in Roswell, NM. He will be teaching ceramics at Penland School in early June.

by the students, instructors, and resident artists of Penland School of Crafts and offers tours of the Penland campus twice each week when classes are in session.



They are both small mountain towns, but I think most people would agree they feel different. Rather than rendering the details of the elements in a landscape, I try to reduce it to elemental shapes and colors. In that way the work becomes as much about the paint as the



Spencer's highly collected paintings can be found in galleries throughout the United States and Europe. He has been described as "both an expressive painter and a true colorist" by William Kortlander, Professor of Art at Ohio State University. His landscapes are frequently done in the alla prima tradition (one sitting) and feature North Carolina and South Carolina and specifically Tryon, where he now lives. 


Lobel was born in Krakow, Poland, and was barely five years old when World War II began. After the Nazis burst into her home and stole many of the family's possessions, Lobel and her brother spent years in hiding with their nanny, first in the relatively safe countryside, then in the ghetto, and eventually in a convent, where the Nazis captured



her and her brother. The two children were imprisoned in a succession of concentration camps, including Plaszow and Auschwitz. Miraculously, Lobel and her brother lived to witness the allied takeover of Ravensbruck. Red Cross workers transported the pair to Sweden. They reunited with their parents, and the family immigrated to the United States when Lobel was 16 years old. She has worked as an artist, a textile designer, and, since 1964, as a children's picture book illustrator. She chose not to return to Poland or to the sites of her imprisonment, but she has visited her beloved Sweden. The artist focuses on the present and her interests in music, theater, languages, and art. She respects the long struggle that brought her

to this life in America.








# T. Andress and Amy Hart

Ciel Gallery, a fine art collective in Char lotte, NC, will present *Time Collectors*, the first in a series of member showings, featuring the art of Emily T. Andress and Amy Hart, on view June 6 - 28, 2014. A reception will be held on June 6, from 6-9pm.

Majoring in fine art with concentrations in Painting and Printmaking, Emily Andress started her career as a printmaker. Although her style has changed dramatically after a return to oil painting, the subject matter is still portraiture. Andress' portraits are not exact representations of the subject, but rather use facial expression and body language to convey personality.

Inspired by innovators of late 19th to early 20th century artists in Paris, Andress uses aggressive brushstrokes and a loose style, giving her portraits a timeless quality. Inspiration ranges from antique photos of family (her grandmother lived to be 109), antique flea market photos, and friends and family. The *Time Collectors* series includes paintings of people from the late 1800's through the present, but identifiable personalities shine well beyond any represented era. "My goal is to create a recognizable style in portraiture, much as those long gone trailblazers did so beautifully," says

Amy Hart creates whimsical sculpture from found objects, with a heavy emphasis on well-used metal. As a child in upstate New York, Hart was influenced by her small agricultural town. It wasn't uncommon for neighbors to have old plows in their front yards, or even a few cars that hadn't run in

"Rusted objects were as much a part of the landscape as the trees and sky," says Hart. Now she haunts junkyards to find these icons of rural life and transforms them into whimsical ornaments that range from




12" to more than six feet. Flowers and birds are favorite subjects, but serrated alligators, elephants with watering-can trunks, and a common house fly created from mustardtinted engine parts with metal-strap wings and spoons for google eyes also make their way into her collection.

"I'm drawn to the theme *Time Collectors*, because the found objects I select for art are truly timeless in their function and form," says Hart. "Even if you work in an office tower, everyone recognizes a pitchfork used as a bird's tail. These left-behind objects help us connect the past and present to make the obsolete useful again, and bring a bit of groundedness to fast-paced lives."



Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, will present Claire Farrell: A is for Art, on view from June 3 through Sept. 14, 2014. An opening reception, \$15 for Museum members and \$20 for non-members, will be held from 5:30-7:30pm on June 3.

Learning one's ABCs takes on a whole new meaning when this Columbia, SC, artist turns the familiar symbols into an array of whimsical images.

A is for Art is a collection of 26 mixed media monotypes, one for each letter in the alphabet. A monotype is created by drawing or painting on a blank plate and transferring the image to paper using an etching press; only a single print of each image is made. In creating A is for Art, a variety of other techniques were used including chine collé (printing on a delicate surface such as Japanese paper or linen, which is bonded to a heavier material), collage, digital images, drawing and etching, hence the term "mixed media" monotypes.

Farrell, a native of Charleston, SC, is a graduate of Duke University. She also holds two master's degrees from the University of South Carolina, one in studio art. She has worked in watercolors and oils as well as printmaking; many of her works are landscapes. While studying in Italy in 2002, Farrell was introduced to Solarplate etching, a method using opaque paint or ink to create an image on transparent acetate, mylar, Xerox or a glass surface. This "transparency" is used as a contact, either positive or negative, for either intaglio or relief printing. By converting a drawing or painting to a digital image, Farrell creates what she calls photo etchings that she then incorporates into her

"I find that the challenge of doing something new, coupled with efforts at experimentation, are giving me a new attitude about art and a new pleasure in creating it," Farrell writes in her artist's statement

Works in the *A is for Art* series were all created within the last few years.

Farrell's works have received "best in show" awards in competitions including the San Diego Watercolor Society Exhibit, the Friends of the Coast (Charleston), the Waccamaw Arts & Crafts Guild Juried Exhibition, and the University of South Carolina Alumni Art Competition. 



## Theatre Art Galleries in High Point, NC, Offers Four Summer Exhibitions

The Theatre Art Galleries in High Point, NC, are offering four summer exhi bitions, on view through Aug. 8, 2014.

The Main Gallery will feature photographer David Spear who began his hotography career by focusing closely on his nearest neighbors, a tobacco-farming family in his native Rockingham County, NC. ## Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, Offers Works by Chris **Graebner, Jude Lobe and Garry Childs**

Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, will present Intersections, featuring works in paint, wax and clay, by Chris Graebner, Jude Lobe and Garry Childs, on view from June 23 through July 20, 2014. A reception will be held on June 27, from 6-9pm.

For painter Chris Graebner, the most obvious reference of *Intersections* relates to travel. Says Graebner, "So much of my work comes directly from my travels. I'm constantly thinking about how I could paint a scene – technically, how to express what I'm looking at. I take loads of photos when I travel. Pictures from cars, from trains, from planes. They are not great pictures but they help me to be in the time and place where they were taken and to see things I might have missed or forgotten.

Graebner finds, however, that the places she paints are generally from trips taken several years earlier - not the most recent ones. "Somehow, I'm not ready to paint what I've recently seen. I need some time and distance before I'm ready to paint a place. It takes a while to see which images stay with me and come to represent that place and time. The paintings in this show are from a number of trips and many different places: Spain in 2011, Hong Kong in 2013, Wisconsin in 2011, Bois Blanc Island in 2012, Louisiana in 2009 and of course Hillsborough. My husband and I went to Portugal in January of this year – so expect to see paintings of the trip in 2016!"

For Jude Lobe, whose work for this show uses cold wax and oil, *Intersections* is the coming together of ideas. Says Lobe, "as a child, I loved to put together puzzles. It was fascinating to see how different elements fit together and changed the look of the individual piece that was now part of a whole. In school I discovered that this idea of interconnectedness had a name - ecology."

"The cold wax & oil medium I use lends itself to expressing this idea of inter-connectedness, or intersections, as well as evolution," says Lobe. "It affords the opportunity to show a history of the painting. I build up layers of texture and color obscuring what's beneath. At the same time, I remove parts of layers by scratching, scraping, applying solvents and so on. This reveals parts of past layers. The artwork



then represents the history of a life, which becomes the compilation of bits and pieces of the experiences we traveled. It could be the life of a natural area, or architectural structure as well.

For Garry Childs, who has been a potter for more than 40 years, *Intersections* has a more technical connotation. "In my thinking *Intersections* is about the intersection of form and surface, always a complicated issue for a potter. All of my work is made on the potters wheel. Form or shape that grows and expands from within is the essence of all of my pieces. Glazes and carving are used to emphasize the shapes and bring color and texture to the surface." Childs' designs are inspired from ancient South American, African and Mediterranean pottery and are of terra-cotta. He would like his pots to be used and enjoyed on a daily basis.

Founded in 2006, the Hillsborough Gallery of Arts (HGA) is owned and operated by 22 local artists. HGA represents established artists, accomplished in their fields, exhibiting modern and contemporary fine art and fine craft. Represented media include painting, sculpture, ceramics, photography, fiber, jewelry, glass, metal, mosaics, enamel and wood.



Alicia Armstrong offers oil on panel paintings; Molly Clift-Hilts offers encaustic paintings; and Tinka Jordy offers figurative ceramic sculpture.

These artists have each found their unique way to use familiar forms. Often elements in these works have little to do with those specific figures and more to do with larger ideas. It's a different figure we see in this exhibition. The works are partly figurative and partly abstract, but each of them speak with a contemporary voice. They are influenced by the representational, abstract and conceptual ideas that each artist brings with their unique perspective and personal

From serene and sublime to quirky and surprising, each artist offers their own unique style for your discovery. Much of this layered and nuanced work is narrative, sometimes not immediately recognizable but somehow familiar and as such deeper and more rewarding.

Three artists in three mediums created a body of work around 'The Figure'. There are numerous overlapping themes found in this exhibition. 

## North Carolina Museum of Natural Carolina Arts is now on Sciences in Raleigh, NC, Features **Works by Daniel McClendon**

The North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences in Raleigh, NC, will present Somewhere Between Lost and Found: A selection of work by Daniel McClendon, on view at Museum' Nature Art Gallery, from June 6 through July 27, 2014. A reception will be held on June 6, from 6-8pm.

The exhibition by McClendon begins non-objectively in the form of a chaotic black and white painting, but from the chaos emerges patterns, forms, and symbols that collectively build to a visual identity.

Chicago, IL, born McClendon graduated from Western Michigan University in 2007 with his Bachelor's of Fine Arts in painting realism. Shortly after graduating, he relocated to Asheville, NC, where he maintained his focus on realism and began painting full time. This continued until one day he came to the belief that his work was "fraudulent" due to the lack of a true and honest voice. He decided to quit painting and figure out how to fulfill his desire to create.

During this hiatus his focus inherently came back to painting and the important themes in his life, then on March 21st, 2011 he had an epiphany. He rolled out of bed and wrote down an idea and plan of action on how to achieve an "honest" form of painting. McClendon's work now focuses on the beauty of impulsive action when creating. By filtering out the peripheral baggage and just acting within the parameters of the painting, he achieves a visual stream of consciousness. His method has been described as, "somewhere between lost and found" — the exploration of defining oneself in a chaotic and otherwise unpredictable world.

McClendon's solo exhibitions have been featured at the Center for Visual Artists, (CVA Gallery) in Greensboro, NC, The Lift Studios in Asheville, NC, Michael Mitchell



Gallery in Charleston, SC, and DeVries Gallery in Kalamazoo, MI. His work is also included in a public collection at Davies Medical Center in Wake Forest, NC. Publications include "Studio Visit", volume 19, Winter 2012. (Juried), "Our State Magazine" August, 2012 and "The Bold Life", May, 2012.
