Chapin Art Museum, in Myrtle Beach, SC, is presenting Track of the Rainbow Serpent: Australian Aboriginal Paintings of the Wolfe Creek Crater, which will be on display through Sept. 14, 2014. In the Western Desert of Australia is a massive crater nearly 3,000 feet in diameter, created by a meteorite believed to have weighed some 50,000 tons. Aboriginal Australians called the crater Kandimalal; in their "Dreamtime" (i.e., creation) legends, the crater had been formed by the passage of a rainbow snake out of the earth. The exhibition comprises 19 paintings which portray the "Dreamtime" stories of the origins of the Aboriginals' ancestral lands, with most describing the creation of the crater.
