53rd Art on Main Festival Takes Place in Hendersonville, NC - Oct. 6-7, 2012

The Arts Council of Henderson County will present the 53rd annual Art on Main fine art/fine craft festival along Hendersonville, SC's historic Main Street, Oct. 6 & 7, 2012. Festival hours will be 10am–5pm both days.

One of the region's most popular outdoor arts festivals, Art on Main will feature fine arts and fine crafts from local and regional artists, as well as many artists from states beyond the southeast region. More than 70 artists will participate in this juried and judged festival.

The Arts Council's Art on Main committee is announcing the inclusion of 25 new artists to the annual festival. New artists this year include Beatriz Kelemen (glass) of Weaverville, NC, John Gunther (fiber) of Abingdon, VA, and Cindy Riccardelli (mixed media) of Candler, NC. German-born Beatriz Kelemen's fused glass reflects two generations of glass artists. Her work is included in collections belonging to the Denmark Glass Museum, the Kings of Spain and Jordan, and Arnold Schwarzenegger. John Gunther's woven pieces are hand dyed and hand woven with a contemporary Asian influence. Cindy Riccardelli's sculptural dolls are a continuing part of her exploration of many different media. "We are thrilled to have these talented individuals as part of Art on Main this year. All three are members of the Southern Highland Craft Guild," says Kim Adams, co-chair of Art on Main.

The Art on Main committee has also gathered a diverse group of artists for live arts demonstrations which will take place in front of the Historic Courthouse on Main Street. Demonstrations will include wheelthrown pottery and hand built pottery; painting in several different styles including watercolor and oils; blacksmithing by Jason Redick; an iron pour sponsored by the Arts Council and Blue Ridge Community College's art program, jewelry making; gourd art and clay sculpting. Artists will take time to explain their processes and motivation and many will have finished work for sale. Three distinguished judges will be judging the artist's work and booths to determine winners for more than \$4500 in prize money. In addition to the Morris Broadband \$1,000 Best of Show Award, first place (\$500), and second place (\$300) prizes will be awarded in categories of fine art and fine craft. The Hans Nagel Fine Craft Award of \$750 will be given this year, as well as the Margo Nagel Fine Art Award of the same amount. Initiated last year, the Arts Council continues to honor the legacy of two of its most generous benefactors, Hans and Margo Nagel, German immigrants who moved to the United States in 1956 and settled in Hendersonville in 1984. The Nagels were avid appreciators and collectors of handcrafted art. Four Honorable Mentions of

\$100 each will also be awarded. Shirley Palmer-Hill of WICKWIRE fine art / folk art will once again be honoring American Craft Week by sponsoring an American Craft Week Award of \$100. During Oct, 5-14, artists, galleries, craft organizations and schools across the nation are celebrating the third annual American Craft Week in order to raise awareness of the many benefits of craft to our lives and to our economy.

The Art on Main committee is honored to have three distinguished judges for the 53rd Art on Main. Stephanie Moore is the Executive Director of The Center for Craft, Creativity & Design at UNC Asheville, with a Masters in museum studies. A visual artist, and independent curator who launched the Artists Registry in 1992, for over 18 years Moore served as the Director of Visual Arts for VSA, an affiliate of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts where she provided the overall direction and production of visual arts exhibitions and activities on the national level.

Patrick Dennis of Atlanta, GA, is the co-founder and President of the Atlanta Foundation for Public Spaces, LLC, formed to establish and manage outdoor public art events (producing over 6 art shows around Atlanta in 2012). A visual artist, and founder of the first museum of Florida, Dennis judges annual gallery shows of 250+ entries, and often supports or manages the judging for festivals with 300-600 applications.

Jeanne McCartin has been a gallery curator for 11 years and produces quarterly shows of 100+ works. She is a practicing sculptor, arts journalist, reviewer, and costume designer from New England. Mc-Cartin has taught workshops on sculpting, mask-making, creativity and the business of art at Sanctuary Arts, NH Institute of Art, Manchester NH, and given workshops throughout the Northeast. Jeanne is a feature arts' correspondent and theater reviewer for the Portsmouth Herald, Portsmouth NH, (17 years), and is a former visual arts reviewer.
