of dreams, visions, fears, ...and the magic of a private, secret language.”

This is Chris Graebner’s third year on the tour. As a painter she works most often in oils, but also has a background in botanical art in which she has used watercolor and ink. She enjoys mixing media to see what each brings to the other. Her most recent work is a return to botanical silverpoint drawings which she colored with layers of highly diluted acrylics instead of traditional watercolors. Graebner invites you to visit her in her studio, #8 on the Tour map, just a couple of blocks from the Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in downtown Hillsborough.

Marcy Lansman is welcoming visitors to her home studio, #43 on the Tour map, on Mt. Bolus Road close to the center of Chapel Hill. She will be showing her paintings together with the work of fellow artist Dale Morgan. This is Lansman’s ninth year on the Studio Tour. Many neighbors drop by as well as repeat customers from previous years. It is a great time to reconnect with old friends and show them the new directions her work is taking.

Lolette Guthrie will be showing contemporary landscapes and abstracted landscapes in oil and pastel. Her studio is #62 on the Tour map, located at 113 Rhododendron Drive, Chapel Hill. Guthrie will have open studio both weekends of the tour and is also open all year by appointment.

ENO Gallery in Hillsborough, NC, is presenting *On and Off the Wall*, featuring new sculptural ceramics by Alice Ballard and Roger Dalrymple, on view through Nov. 15, 2013.

One of the most noteworthy ceramics exhibitions to come to the Triangle, *On and Off the Wall*, features the work of Roger Dalrymple and Alice Ballard. One of the finest ceramic artists in the US, Ballard’s work is in numerous important collections including the Smithsonian museum in Washington, DC.

Ballard was born in 1945, she received her Bachelor of Science in Design in 1967 from the University of Michigan and a Masters of Arts in painting in 1968 at the University of Michigan.

Ballard’s work is in numerous collections including The Renwick Collection at The Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, DC, The State Art Collections in South Carolina and TN; The Mint Museum of Art in Charlotte, NC, and The American Embassy in Portugal.

Van W. Shields, Director of Culture and Heritage Museums says, “Alice Ballard’s exquisite ceramics of natural objects illustrate by her hands that we are a part of and not apart from nature.”

Ballard and Dalrymple have been married and collaborating for 23 years.

Dalrymple was born in 1942, and earned degrees in Architecture and Art from the University of Kansas and Kansas State University.

Dalrymple states “My forms are an expression of my lifelong exposure to the American Indian Tribes of the Plains and

Southwest United States, the Haida and Aleut Tribes of the Pacific Northwest, the Inupiat, Eskimo and Athabascan Tribes of Alaska and the Maori, Aboriginal People of New Zealand and Australia.”

Louisburg College in Louisburg, NC, Features Works by Andrew Ross

Louisburg College in Louisburg, NC, will present *TRANSIENCE: Large Format Photography by Andrew Ross*, on view in the Edith C. Lumpkin Community Gallery, located in the Seby B. Jones Performing Arts Center, from Oct. 17 through Nov. 26, 2013. A reception and lecture will be held on Oct. 17, beginning at 7pm.

Ross has been making photographs for over 25 years. He received a BA degree in Philosophy from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he developed and supervised a successful commercial photography business for 10 years. Ross took his work in a different direction when he moved to Florida and received an MFA degree in Photography from Florida State University. Currently he lives in Raleigh, NC, where in addition to his photography, he is a web designer, and a video and multi-media artist.

“My *Transience* series examines the boundary between vision and perception, seeing and imagining, the real and the remembered,” says Ross. “These images

are both an inward journey and an outward expression, as I look for my place in society, society’s role within my life, and the significance of my presence along the timeline of history.”

“To live in a world of perception is to live in isolation; no two people experience the world in the same way. The more society comes up with ways to over-stimulate our thoughts and our senses, the more our perception separates from reality - we isolate ourselves from that which surrounds us.”

Ross continues, “I see reflections of myself played out through the lives of others. As I observe, I begin to realize the discrepancy between my thoughts and reality. I do not see the world from the outside; I see it from the inside. These images I create through my camera are memories and dreams, both real and perceived.”
