Starting Oct. 30, 2013, you can register online for the 2014 ArtFields Competition and Exhibition in Lake City, SC. The 2014 ArtFields Competition and Exhibition takes place in Lake City from Apr. 25 through May 4, 2014.

Whether you're an established or emerging artist, you can submit your artwork to the 2014 ArtFields Art Competition for a chance to win part of \$100,000 in total cash prizes! One big change from last year is that the People's Choice award of \$25,000 will now be split into two categories: \$12,500 – People's Choice 2-Dimensional and \$12,500 – People's Choice 3-Dimensional.

Each of the People's Choice awards is determined by visitors' votes throughout the ten-day artfest. Visitors will register in Lake City, and vote for their favorite entries during ArtFields. Visitors may only vote once per entry.

We all ended up here for one reason or another, but I never expected to be an editor of an arts newspaper covering the visual arts in North and South Carolina preparing an article about an artist from Saginaw, MI, my home town, showing at a gallery in Conway, SC.

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But that's what's happened this month, and in some ways I'm not surprised. The Michigan connection has been high in the last year.

Facebook or NSA?

And without images Facebook is a pretty boring medium for spreading info.

But, most of the time Facebook users are their worst enemy, by spreading rumors and false fixes that are meant to stop the changes being offered. Unless you read what the changes are or go to a trusted source - you'll never know what's going on.

If Facebook is the great medium many people think it is for spreading info and I'm still not sure it is, but without an alternative - I'd rather pay a monthly fee to know exactly what I'm getting. Of course then I'd have to pay someone to tell me how to use what I'm getting. It's a no win situation for those of us who just can't seem to get a handle on all this tech stuff.
