Walker is a consummate printmaker using almost every printmaking form known. She is also a talented painter but this show will be exclusively fine art prints. In both her prints and paintings, she has created several story lines and themes. Most of them come from literature, art history or ballads giving them a basis in history to which she adds her interpretive and whimsical characters. In this latest series, she begins to unify her themes and bring together the storylines that have grown over the years out of myths and have morphed into her own family of images.

Walker returned to Charleston after studying in New York at the Art Students' League. She was raised in North Carolina, attended high school in Charleston followed by college in North Carolina.
