

USC-Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, Features Works by Bodo Berheide

USC-Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, will present *Between Image and Language*, featuring works by Bodo Berheide, on view in the Curtis R. Harley Art Gallery, located in the Performing Arts Center, from Oct. 4 through Nov. 1, 2014. A reception will be held on Oct. 10, beginning at 4:30pm.

Berheide was born in 1944 in Thuringia/ Germany and studied at the Art Academy in Dusseldorf with Joseph Beuys (Beuysklasse). Communicative exchange is characteristic of the work of Berheide. Key considerations in his work are the respect for nature and the forces of nature and an exchange of resources among people in community activities.

Berheide's (sometimes multi-part) works are monochrome, essentially limited to blue, red, and green, which are colors that have a loaded content for him. There are reliefs made of paper pulp, obtained from daily newspapers. In this fragile form of presentation, which is in fact stable, reason, words, animals, symbols, and pictogramlike formulations appear. Animal signs refer to the skills and qualities that we people like and that connect us together (Zodiac signs, totem, or clan animals). Some of the pieces introduce, with catchphrases, models from society that relate to the design of the character and history of the earth. Sensuality and socio-political statements fit together associatively, yet still leave room for one's own interpretations.


In the wake of the horrors of World War I, visual and literary artists alike experimented with imaginative creative forms to express their responses to a world wholly changed. Beginning in the early 1920s, art movements such as Dadaism and Surrealism flourished in studios on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean.

Artists working in a surrealist vein sought to unite their philosophical and aesthetic tenets in provocative canvases that simultaneously explored the conscious and unconscious realms of hu-

man life, blending the fantastic and the ordinary to create what poet André Breton described as "an absolute reality, a surreality."

In *Life is But a Dream*, over twenty selections from the Johnson Collection's twentieth century holdings illustrate the surrealist revolution and evolution in the American South. Featuring paintings by such diverse artists as William Henry Johnson, Carroll Cloar, John McCrady, Minnie Jones Evans, Frank Marsden London, Will Henry Stevens, Ernie Barnes, and Paul Hartley, this exhibition evokes Freud, fear, race, and religion, taking viewers beyond the traditional gallery experience.
