The Jones-Carter Gallery, in Lake City, SC, (home of ArtFields®) is offering the exhibition, Francisco de Goya's Los Caprichos, on view through Jan. 3, 2015. The exhibition of etchings is one of the most influential graphic series in the history of Western art. This exhibition features a superb first edition of the complete set of 80 etchings, which by tradition, was one of the four sets acquired directly from Goya in 1799 by the duke of Osuna. It then came into the hands of Pedro Fernández Durán, of the house of the Marquis of Perales, the greatest Spanish collector of the 19th century and a major donor to the

This 28,000 sq. ft. facility includes professional space, collection storage, 12,000 sq. ft. of exhibit space to include two changing galleries, Education Gallery, Community Gallery, Pee Dee History Hall, three classrooms, kitchen, and an exterior courtyard.

Recently I contacted the SC State Museum, in Columbia, SC, to find out where a couple of their Traveling Exhibits would be showing in SC, and I found out that some were not even booked for October much less - through end of the year.

The Traveling Exhibits Program at the South Carolina State Museum provides museums, art centers, universities and other institutions with high quality, affordable traveling exhibitions. These special exhibits provide a variety of fascinating shows for institutions of any size, from large exhibitions designed for major museums to smaller, South Carolina-specific exhibits for local museums, galleries, libraries, schools and more.

I know that many presenting facilities in SC really depend on these traveling exhibits to help them fill their yearly exhibit schedules, but I was a little surprised to find that two of the exhibits, that are different every year, were not being booked much. One was the annual SC Watermedia Society's top thirty award-winning works exhibit, and the other was the annual SC Palmetto Hands Exhibition, a fine crafts show. Both of these exhibits offer an annual view of some of the best watermedia paintings and best craftworks being produced in SC.
