Converse College in Spartanburg, SC, Offers Several New Exhibitions

The Milliken Art Gallery at Converse College in Spartanburg, SC, will host a collaborative, site-specific installation beginning Oct. 2, 2014. In Kinetic Connections, four women artists will come together to create a multi-media expression through organic natural forms, gestural drawings and paintings, and a progression through connecting spaces. Visual artists Janet Orselli and Diana Gurri will create mixed media works and sculptural installations for the exhibition.

On the closing night, Autumn Singleton, a Tai Chi Instructor, will lead a Tai Chi performance, with accompanying sound by Linda Powell. The exhibition will be available to view through Oct. 23, 2014.

On Thursday, Oct. 23, at 6pm in the Milliken Art Gallery, a Gallery Talk with artists Janet Orselli and Diana Gurri will include discussions of their art process. The Gallery Talk will be followed by a reception at 6:30pm, which will include the Tai Chi performance and music. The exhibit and events are free and open to the public.

Orselli states, "As an installation artist, I am most interested in creating spaces that contain an 'alive' quality - spaces that reconnect the viewer with our natural origins. It's as if I want the viewer to wander upon an enchanted dwelling place somewhere between the natural world and the man-made world where the two join and support each other."

Three local large-scale sculpture artists will be featured in an exhibition that will extend beyond the gallery walls. Opening on Oct. 30, 2014, Vivianne Carey, Greg Mueller and Cody Roberts aka "Hoondirt" will present Concord & Flow.

These three well-known artists are creating the majority of the sculptures showcased in Concord & Flow specifically for the Milliken Art Gallery. The exhibit promises to engage visitors with a

variety of sculpture.

Vivianne Carey's latest body of sculpture features "clothes, shoes, and bottles assembled from found and created materials." Carey's sculptures will be exhibited inside the gallery alongside "Hoondirt's' new work. He will be showing 4 or 5 pieces which will pay homage to Edward Gorey. "I have taken some of my favorite Edward Gorey drawings and brought them to life."

Greg Mueller's work will be featured outside of the Milliken Art Gallery. He plans on "using re-claimed wood from a local architectural millwork company, my intention is to respond to the Milliken Gallery courtyard site by creating an architectonic arch-like form based on the geometry of a hyperbolic paraboloid."

The exhibition will run from Oct. 30 through Nov. 20, 2014. The artists will present a Gallery Talk on Nov. 6, at 6pm in the gallery followed by a reception from 6:30-8pm.

o "Staging the Image" deals with the artificiality of photography and its constructed or manipulated images.

o "Sacred Spaces" presents photographs of sites of spiritual significance.

o A"Daisy Chain" links a heterogeneous group of photographs into a continuous, associational sequence.

In addition, photographs from the Ackland's collection are specially installed in each of the Museum's eight permanent collection galleries, juxtaposed in thoughtprovoking ways with African, Asian, and Western paintings, sculpture, and decorative arts.

PhotoVision was organized by Peter Nisbet, interim director and chief curator, with Lauren Turner, curatorial assistant.

"We're now 175 years from the announcement of the discovery of photography, and the pervasiveness of photographs in our age of camera phones, image-sharing apps, and media saturation is self-evident," says Nisbet. "This very ubiquity can stimulate curiosity about the evolution of the medium, anxiety about which images are worth preserving, and enthusiasm about the medium's seemingly inexhaustible potential. PhotoVision is presented with these questions, reactions, and emotions in mind." In connection with PhotoVision, the Ackland also presents Adding to the Mix 8: William H. Mumler's "Mrs. W. H. Mumler, Clairvoyant Physician" (1870s), an exhibition focusing on the Ackland's recent acquisition of a nineteenth-century spirit photograph by the foremost American practitioner of commercial spirit photography. The makers of spirit photographs claimed to capture images documenting supernatural presences. This example, the first of its kind in the Ackland collection, is presented alongside paintings and prints in which artists of various media and cultures have attempted to visualize the indescribable forces purported to make up other planes of being. The Ackland Art Museum in Chapel Hill, NC, is presenting PhotoVision: Selections from a Decade of Collecting, including over 150 selections from recently acquired photographic works, on view through Jan. 4,2015.

The Ackland Art Museum has the distinction of holding North Carolina's leading collection of photographs, covering the history of the medium as an art form from its beginnings in the late 1830s to the present. Of the more than 2,000 photographs in the Ackland's rich collection, more than 500 have been added in the last decade.

"The photographs in this exhibition are first and foremost presented as individual works of art, as each has its own aesthetic power," says Ackland chief curator and interim director Peter Nisbet.
