## The Ellington-White Community Development Corporation in Fayetteville, NC, Features Works by Charles Wilbert White, Jr.

The Ellington-White Community Development Corporation (EWCDC) in collaboration with the Jerald Melberg Gallery in Charlotte, NC, is presenting over sixteen early sketchbook drawings and watercolors from one of America's most renowned and recognized African-American and Social Realist artist, Charles Wilber White, in our Ellington-White Contemporary Art Gallery in Fayetteville, NC, through Nov. 12, 2016.

Charles Wilbert White, Jr. (born Apr. 2, 1918 – died Oct. 3, 1979) was an artist recognized for his extraordinary draftsmanship, who dedicated his life and work to examining the heroism, tribulations, hopes, histories, and strengths of black people. He held steadfast throughout his productive career to the notion that his art had to echo the sentiments and the beauty of the black race. The poetic vision that white shared with the world is composed of powerful images of stunning people of African ancestry at a time when such images were not in vogue.

This particular group of drawings and watercolors are being exhibited in the Fayetteville area for the first time. Although primarily studies for larger works, they poignantly show the artist's drawing skill as well as his devotion to working on paper. The drawings were produced in the late 1930's when the artist was in his early twenties and presents to us the dynamic


talent that was to come.

During his long and active career, White produced etchings, lithographs, drawings, paintings and murals. The artist had, and continues to have, an extensive exhibition history. His works are included in more than fifty museum collections, including the Art Institute of Chicago, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Whitney Museum of Art, the Museum of Modern Art (MOMA), and the National Gallery in Washington, DC.

Art historian David C. Driskell says that White was always harboring a genuine love for art that depicted the human condition within social order, White made visual narrations that centered principally on people in search of the good life. This was the charge he brought unfailingly to his art.

Support for this exhibition comes in part thru a project support grant award from the Arts Council Fayetteville/Cumberland County that will assist EWCAG in presenting to the community local and national visual arts exhibitions and events. "The support for these projects helps to assist Ellington-White in implementing our mission and providing high quality arts events for the community," says Calvin Mims, EWCDC Executive Director. Project Support Grants increase opportunities for access to arts, science, cultural and historical programming in Cumberland County. The grants are awarded to

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nonprofit agencies in Cumberland County that demonstrate financial and administrative stability.

EWCDC's Ellington-White Contemporary Art Gallery series of visual art exhibitions, will present local and national artists. Several of these exhibitions are collaborations with other area arts presenting agencies that include The Arts Council Art Galleries on Hay Street, The Fayetteville State University Rosenthal Art Gallery and William T. Jones Student Center. The Arts council grant enables EWCDC to expand the arts offerings for the community.

EWCDC is a non-profit "arts based"

community development corporation, generating and supporting high quality diverse cultural experiences in all of the arts and arts-related disciplines. The Ellington-White Contemporary Art Gallery located on Gillespie Street, in Fayetteville, is an art gallery for emerging and professional artists, presenting a yearly exhibition schedule of national and local artists, national touring exhibitions, curatorial research projects in the visual arts and the humanities
