Asheville Art Museum Offers Exhibit Focused on Digital Impact on Crafts

The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, will present the exhibit, *The New Materiality*, on view in the Appleby Foundation Gallery, from Nov. 18 through Mar. 18, 2012

The exhibit expands beyond the boundaries that currently exist between technology, art and craft. 

A great effort is made to reveal the true nature and beauty of the materials, and the transformations they undergo due to the direct interaction of clay and fire. Points of both contrast and harmony in the artist's work are evident through his use of form and function, as well as through the use of applied glazes and naturally occurring effects of the firing process.
