RIVERWORKS Gallery in Greenville, SC, Offers Works by Sara Schneckloth

RIVERWORKS Gallery in Greenville, SC, is presenting *Sara Schneckloth; Making Mark*, on view through Dec. 1, 2013. A reception will be held on Nov. 1, from 6-9pm.

Sara Schneckloth; Making Mark defies definition. Is Schneckloth's view microscopic or panoramic? Is she making marks with evaporating watercolor puddles? Are her images scientific or imaginary? Is she constructing a drawing by layering elements much like a sculpture might be built? Yes, yes, yes and yes.

As Schneckloth defies definition, she simultaneously honors tradition by constructing her drawings within a traditional pristine white-space window. Her sense of place warms her drawings with memories. The viewer can feel the warmth of the sun on the stone walls she helped restore in France and the daily alteration of the

ings with immediacy by suspending them from the wall.

Addressing her process, Schneckloth says, "Material layers build dimensionally on the page, as each element is chosen and placed for overall integrity... Taken together, these drawings envision and ques tion the relationships between our bodies and the structures that contain them." She invites Making Mark viewers to share her memories as they enjoy unraveling her marks and making their own inquiries. Schneckloth has shown in over fifty exhibitions throughout the US, South Africa, and France, including the South Carolina Biennial, the Wisconsin Triennial, the Columbus Biennial, Drawing Beyond at the Princeton Arts Council, the Florida Experimental Film Festival, Soho20 Chelsea, and in numerous university galleries. Her essays on drawing and embodiment have appeared in the Journal of Visual Culture, Visual Communications Quarterly, and the Manifest International Drawing Annual. Schneckloth holds an MFA from the University of Wisconsin - Madison, and has lived and worked in Iowa, Chicago, Seattle, San Francisco, Cape Town, South Africa, and Columbia, SC. She is an Associate Professor in the Department of Art at the University of South Carolina. continued above on next column to the right

The gallery will also celebrate its 6 year anniversary on Nov. 1, from 6-9pm, with a special unveiling of a commissioned portrait by member artist Diarmuid Kelly at 7pm.

Mulfinger holds an MA in Studio Art and currently free-lances full-time. He also teaches painting, printmaking, drawing and batik. around me."

"My numerous sketchbooks attest to my obsession with drawing anything in my environment. Even the simplified forms around me when confined to a flat surface impress me with a new found essence. The reality that arises from extracting forms from nature fuels my creative process encouraging me to compose with shadow and color."

"My work is purely visual; if it does not arrest the viewer by itself without a verbal explanation, I consider it ineffective."

Schneckloth is recording the panoramic landscape with the intimacy of the microscopic. By utilizing her own personal marks and materials she transcribes the record of the view to the tactile memory of the view.

Schneckloth employs graphite, watercolor, colored pencils, wax, ink, and charcoal to weave the images of *Making Mark*. She empowers the unframed draw-Page 8 - Carolina Arts, November 2013 After a number of years of focusing on batik as his main medium, Mulfinger discovered linocuts as a "sister medium." The progression from light to dark values parallels that of batik, with the advantage, in the "new" field of printmaking, of several individual, original pieces. In addition, linocuts with their layers of color, averaging twelve in depth, provide a rich, tactile presence akin to oil painting.

Mulfinger executes linocuts using the reduction method of printing. After each printing of color, the plate is cut away until the final, darkest skeletal lines remain. By definition, this process decrees an intrinsically limited edition - usually between 20-50 original, hand-cut, handrolled, hand-pulled pieces. This qualifies them for, in collector's parlance, a "rare" designation.

Mulfinger resides in Greenville with his wife and five children.

Mulfinger offered the following artist statement: "Most of my artwork is dependent upon the visible world immediately While walking along Main Street, Greenville, an idea for a cooperative art gallery was born. "With such a beautiful setting and an abundance of talented artists, it was a natural fit," stated Laura Buxo, creator and founder of the Artists Guild Gallery of Greenville. Starting with 18 local artists in Nov. 2007, the gallery has been open seven days per week with permanent display space for each member artist. Each month a different local guest artist is highlighted on one of the premiere walls with a meet-the-artist reception.

Thousands of dollars have been raised by the gallery at charity events for the American Heart Association, Greenville Humane Society, American Red Cross and Foothills Search and Rescue. The Artists Guild Gallery of Greenville also dedicates a wall for local student artists to display their art at no cost. During the past three years, the gallery has developed and hosted a Juried Small Works Show with *continued on Page 9*
