# **Greenville County Museum of Art** in Greenville, SC, Highlights Work by Children's Illustrator Raúl Colón

The Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, is presenting Tall Tales + Huge Hearts: Raúl Colón, on view through Dec. 28, 2014.

As a youngster, award-winning illustrator and artist Raul Colón suffered ill health, and today, he attributes part of his success to the time he spent cooped up at home.

"As a child I had chronic asthma and would frequently be so ill that I could not leave the house for days or even weeks at a time. But all those times I spent locked up inside, I spent filling up dozens of composition notebooks with all kinds of drawings. I even tried to write my own comic books .... So my illness as a child, which kept me from going outside to play, became a blessing," says Colón. As a young boy, Colón (born 1952) moved with his family from New York City to Puerto Rico. In 1978, Colón returned to the US and settled in Florida, where he worked at an educational television station, designing everything from puppets to animated films. A decade later, Colón established himself as a freelance illustrator in New York City. He has received numerous awards, including a Golden Kite Award and a gold medal in the Society of Illustrators' Original Art exhibition. Colón combines watercolor painting, etching, and drawing techniques to create vivid colors and rich textures. Featuring 68 works of art from such popular books as Tomas and the Library Lady and The New York Times bestseller Angela and the Baby Jesus, this exhibition invites both young and young at heart to explore themes of family, freedom, and heritage.
