I guess that reflects how I experience life."

She feels that, "Creating these images has tapped into my own early memories and challenged my representational painting skills as I try to create a logical anatomy and scenario for each creature. It's a departure from my usual work and it's been pure fun." This summer, Eberle will be teaching figure drawing at Penland School of Crafts, in Penland, NC.
