When asked about his work, Mac-Cormack said, "With the portmanteau of Participainting I'm describing the creation of work as an integral part of my life instead of just something that I do from time to time. My work comes from moments of inspiration, something interesting or compelling, an idea somehow clicking into place and becoming a piece. From a bay behind the house where I grew up, going to a balloon festival enjoyed with my wife, to an encounter with a health condition, each of the pieces comes from a gut feeling that I should make a piece. Vision, inspiration, revelation - call it what you will, each piece is inspired by an event that is a part of my life."

MacCormick added, "I get to use the tools I've come to acquire during my life. I've been enamored by paintings ever since the high school trip to Boston's Gardener Museum - before all the good stuff was stolen. I used to draw a lot more than I do now mainly because of the invention of digital cameras and computers. I see technology as simply additional tools to achieve my ends."
