The Hollingsworth Gallery in downtown Brevard, NC, is presenting an exhibition of photographs by Rob Travis and Bruce Siulinski. The exhibit Light of the Carolinas, will be on view through Feb. 28, 2013. The exhibit explores venues and subjects throughout the mountain and coastal regions of the Carolinas.

The featured images include many of Travis' mountain overlooks and snow-capped venues around Western North Carolina. Travis is almost entirely self-taught in photography, with a little help from some well-known professionals in Western North Carolina and from the Land of Waterfalls Camera Club. His primary motivation to become involved with photography in the first place was a love of birds.

"I inherited my artistic abilities from

my father, who was drawn to three dimensional expression, and my mother, who was a somewhat gifted amateur in oils and acrylics. Those abilities, along with my imagination and creative spark seems to fuse my photography with what catches my eye and imagination."

One of Travis' favorite subjects, the North Carolina cardinal, is featured in the exhibit. His award-winning images of both the male and female cardinal in snow are two of the selections. Travis is also a glass artist at Glass Feather Studio in Cedar Mountain, NC, a craft that influences his photography. His images have appeared in numerous publications including Views magazine and Blue Ridge Country. Several of his winter images appear in the current issue of WNC magazine.

Bruce Siulinski presents a selection of images from the coastal Carolinas. His series of four shots of Atalaya offer viewers different perspectives of the winter home of Archer and Anna Hyatt Huntington at Huntington Beach State Park in South Carolina.

Siulinski studied graphic design and photography in Texas before moving to North Carolina in 2004. Favorite subjects continue to include the Carolina coast and also coastal Maine near his childhood home in greater Portland.
