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find that this personal knowledge of form and movement has informed my drawing.

"The Moor's Pavane, choreographed by José Limón, is the inspiration for *Moor*. The story is drawn from Othello. The four dancers move in a circle. As the dance progresses, one can see the conflict building between Othello and Iago and the withdrawal of Emilia and Desdemona."

"The next series, *Shoot the Moon*, is based on a dance by the Nederlands Dans Theater. Dressed in black, the figures seem inexorably linked, but things are not going well between them."

"The third dance, *Orfeo*, is based on the myth of Orpheus and Eurydice and choreographed by Pina Bausch," adds Walker. "Orfeo has entered Hades in order to bring back Eurydice. Initially the shades try to resist him, but finally empathize with his sorrow."

Walker has been a painter and printmaker for many years. She taught high school math which she enjoyed, then decided to turn to art full time. Walker was born in New York and grew up in North Carolina. She started painting in 1975, while living in New York and studied at the Art Students' League with Isaac Soyer. After moving to Charleston, she continued to study painting and printmaking for several years at the College of Charleston. She often travels to Italy to work and vacation.

The upstairs Semans Gallery features a group show presented by the Artist Studio Project: *Macondo: A Journey Through Magical Realism*. This multi-media exhibit features the work of 12 artists respond-

ing to Gabriel García Márquez's literary masterpiece "100 Years of Solitude" in honor of the 50th anniversary of its publication. Curated by Rafael A. A Chapel Hill, NC, native, Brown received a Bachelor of Fine Arts at The University of North Carolina Chapel Hill in 1977. While at the University, he was honored as a North Carolina Fellow. Brown worked at The Guggenheim Museum of New York from 1979 to 1981, designing and implementing art programs. He has been working as a professional artist for 39 years.

This Eno Gallery exhibition includes Brown's landscape paintings of North Carolina landscapes during his travels throughout our fair state in 2016.

After our recent winter storm, Brown's painting *Snow Melt* reminds us of the passing of time we experience in nature. The snow comes - then melts and feeds both our watersheds and our sense of being a part of the grand scheme.

Venice Masters of the Renaissance

The North Carolina Museum of Art (NCMA) in Raleigh, NC, opens 2017 with two major exhibitions: one featuring the awe-inspiring work of Ansel Adams, and one showcasing masterpieces from Venice's cultural Renaissance. Beginning Feb. 4 and continuing through May 7, 2017, the Museum presents Ansel Adams: Masterworks, 48 iconic photographs of American landscapes. One month later the Museum opens Glory of Venice: Renaissance Paintings 1470-1520, about 50 paintings by such masters as Giorgione, Giovanni Bellini, and Vittore Carpaccio, many of which have never been seen outside of Venice. The two exhibitions are ticketed together.

"These two extraordinary exhibitions allow our visitors to explore the majesty of America and the splendor of Venice - all in one location," says Lawrence J. Wheeler, director of the NCMA. "It will be an unforgettable and once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to view stunning photographs
