
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ern Coast: The Art of West Fraser, on view through Apr. 30, 2017.



The Charleston Artist Guild in Charleston, SC, will present Land, Sea and Sky, a collection of paintings that reflect the Dorothy Allston Rogers' life and deep roots in the Lowcountry, on view in the Guild Gallery, from Feb. 1 - 28, 2017. A reception will be held on Feb. 3, from 5-8pm.

Rogers grew up on the Intracoastal Waterway near Charleston. Her father was a farmer and property caretaker for multitudes of local acreage including Botany Bay Plantation. The youngest of ten children, Rogers was often told to "go on outside!" where she loved being near saltwater and experiencing land, sea and sky! Her formation as an artist is powerfully connected to her upbringing.

Rogers states, "I am thankful that God put me in a family who has lived in the Charleston area since the 1650's and that the traditions of a saltwater and farming lifestyle have continued. The awareness of my artist-ancestor, Washington Allston, (1779–1843) has inspired me since childhood with considering art as a viable activity, and as a way to revel in the splendor of God's creation! To me, art should portray a sense of glory that gives the viewer 'hope' beyond circumstances. This endless task

of looking for such scenes and compositions renews my own hope and peace that God is sovereign and good remains if we stop to look and ponder. One may think this lofty attempt to portray such sensations as 'hope', 'peace' and 'joy' with mere paint is ridiculous. And it really is, I suppose. However, the process of this attempt always rejuvenates my soul!"
