In conjunction with Randolph Arts Guild's 27th Annual North Carolina Potters Conference held Mar. 7-9, 2014, in Asheboro, NC, the North Carolina Pottery Center (NCPC) will hold a special presentation by East Tennessee State University student Becca Irvin. The presentation will be about a vortex soda kiln students from the university constructed with the help of their professor and graduate students.

The kiln has a unique burner port layout that directs flame into a spiral motion down to a small flue in the center floor that exits out to the chimney. Irvin documented the entire process and will talk about firing results, burner and soda port configuration, refractory materials and provide photos of the pottery fired in the kiln.
