SC State Museum, 301 Gervais St., Columbia. **Through Mar. 23** - "Tutankhamun: Return of the King," will dazzle museum guests with 124 stunning replicas of King Tut's original treasures. Discovered in 1922 by British archaeologist Howard Carter, the opening of King Tut's tomb was the greatest archaeological find of all time. "Ten years ago, this exhibit of these exquisite objects became the biggest, most popular exhibit in our history, drawing more than 120,000 people," said Curator of History JoAnn Zeise. "It is fitting that on the occasion of our 25th anniversary, we celebrate with the return of this hugely popular show to be enjoyed by the people who loved it the first time, and by those who weren't here or didn't have a chance to see it back then." **Through 2015** - "The Coming of the Civil War," will look at the origins of the disagreement between South Carolina and the federal government, beginning with the nullification crisis of 1832-33. 
