An encaustic painter, Pam Winegard's artwork reflects her developing critical view of social and cultural subject matter as it relates to the concept of community. She recently worked on murals with Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools and the South Carolina National Guard. The Arts & Science Council awarded her a scholarship to attend Penland School of Crafts and she has recently been selected as an Affiliate Artist-in-Residence at the McColl Center for Visual Art and a residency at the Vermont Studio Center.

Isaac Payne explores pedestrian views of the modern land and cityscape through draftsmanship, a subtle palette of painting and drawing media, and combined surfaces of paper. He is a winner of the *New American Paintings 2010 Southern Competition*, and an Affiliate Artist (2011-2012) at the McColl Center for Visual Art in Charlotte, where he also lives.

Janet Lasher's work emphasizes the textural and surface qualities of fiber, textile, and handmade paper. She was awarded a printmaking residency at the Penland School of Craft and an Affiliate Artist residency at the McColl Center for Visual Art. Her work can be found in private and corporate collections including the Bernina International Collection in Switzerland.


