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

Here's hoping April will be normal - as far as the weather goes. I'm sure we're all tired of the Winter roller coaster we have been on. I'm still not ready for what Summer can bring, but it would be nice to enjoy some steady weather.

Things Are Really Heating Up In The **Visual Art Community**

In this issue we have 83 pages of info about what's going on in the visual art community of the Carolinas. That's a lot of info, but there will be even more next month.

Here's a warning for all you people who will be sending us info for that May issue. Don't wait for the deadline to come to send your info in. Send your info in early - well before the deadline of Apr. 24 at 5pm.

There were about a half dozen press release that came in after the Mar. 24 deadline and we couldn't fit them in. As some people know, sometimes we can fit some late items in, but when it's a stampede - we just can't - no matter what the story is for them being late. We had our hands full working on what came in on time.

So my warning is - don't wait for the last minute to get your info in for the May issue - as it's going to be a monster issue because of all the events taking place in May.

Just off hand, I'm talking about the

Spoleto Festival and its companion Piccolo Spoleto Festival, in Charleston, SC, Artisphere in Greenville, SC, the North Charleston (SC) Arts Festival, FireFest at STARworks in Star, NC, The Red Rose Festival in Lancaster, SC, Heritage Trail Pottery Tour & Sale in Greenwood, SC, Sculpture in the South in Summerville, SC, and for some reason ArtFields in Lake City, SC, decided to stick its toe into May - when it should have stuck to its April dates. And, these are just some of the events we know

That's a lot of presenters who are hoping to attract visitors to their event while other cities are hosting their own events that they hope will attract out-of-town folks.

May is getting to be a dog eat dog month for art events. Not to mention other events like sporting events, high school and college graduations, and the beginning of some folk's summer vacations.

Some folks would say it's a great month because of all the choices they have, while others just see - activity overload.

Scheduling in the arts has been a problem throughout the ages from the first time the first artists had conflicting dates for people to come see their cave drawings.

So the competition begins. One artist offers a torch for every visitor, the next artist offers a torch and dried strips of Mastodon meat, and another offers the torch, strips of Mastodon meat and a bowl of homemade grog. The really clever cave artist comes up with the idea of having young cave girls to hold your torch for you - the competition never ends.

I guess some of this can be blamed on the weather we get here in the Carolinas - warm Summers and Cool Winters. In some places that means a possibility of 100 + (you know what I'm talking about), freezing rain, and

sometimes snow. Which leaves only two seasons to safely schedule an event - Spring and Fall.

What's an art event organizer to do? If you have a solution - there are a lot of folks who would like to hear it.

Take the Art Walk/Crawl situation. If every city eventually has one on the 1st Friday, that's not good for attracting folks from other cities to come visit. So some people moved their event to the 2nd Friday, and 3rd Friday, and some the 4th Friday. Now we have some folks doing their Art Walk/ Crawls on Thursdays.

Again, there are never enough days in the week or month to schedule an event and not be in competition with someone else's

I guess we should all be glad we have so much going on in the Carolinas, but for those providing those events or planning to offer a new event - this is a big problem. I guess one solution is to not get stuck in a rut going to the same event year after year. Step out of your box every once in a while.

ArtFields 2.0

Last year I was fairly supportive of ArtFields, the art exhibit and competition that takes place in the small community of Lake City, SC. I had hoped this would be a great new visual art event - offering artists an opportunity for exposure and for a few a chance to win big bucks. I still think it is a great opportunity for some, but I've had to pull back some on that support and because I asked some questions - as I always do -ArtFields also pulled back on using us as a way to promote the event. That's OK, over the years I'm well aware of the results of asking questions when people don't what to give answers - for one reason or another.

Some folks will cut you off if you offer any criticism at all - like the SC Arts Commission. Carolina Arts was removed from their PR list (several times) for not playing ball the way they wanted to - as if we wouldn't find out what they are up to anyway. Someone always wants to whisper in my ear about something they don't like either, but wants to stay in the shadows.

Some people will cut you off if you just ask questions they hoped no one would. And, I just can't seem to not ask questions when something seems wrong or even just a little fuzzy. And, if people don't want to offer answers, all you can do is think something must be wrong. I don't know if anything is really wrong or not, but if I never get any answers and they cut you out of the information loop - what should you think?

My one question to ArtFields was to know the number of votes the top winners got in last year's competition. It's a very simple question and one that should be easy to come up with, but I never got the answer.

They seem to be able to tell us some numbers, like they say 22,000 visited the event. A number that it would seem harder to come up with than how many votes the winners got. They also told the Florence, SC, newspaper that when it comes to the voting - 5,965 people registered to vote, but only 2,443 votes were cast.

Out of those 2,443 votes cast there were 400 works they could vote for, and since they had to count those votes to come up with the winners or who qualified to be selected for the top prize - comprised of popular votes and the selection by a jury panel - it just would seem to follow that they had to have a list the had the numbers on how many votes each work in the exhibit got. But it seems for some reason they don't want to give that number to the public.

I've done a Google news tag on ArtFields so I've seen most of the articles written about the event. Most are coming from the Florence newspaper. But I've never seen any mention of how many votes put \$100,000 in the pocket of the top winner.

As far as I know, if you get one more vote than the other person or all other persons in a voting process - you're the winner. It doesn't matter if you got 1,500 votes, 1,000, votes, 495 votes or 50 votes - as long as you got one more than anyone else - you win.

So I don't see what the problem is in giving the vote totals. A bigger problem is - why did almost 6,000 people register to vote, yet only less than 2,500 cast a vote? Questions bad - Answers worse.



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Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Presents Two Special Exhibitions

The Gibbes Museum of Art's commitment to contemporary art is celebrated in the special exhibitions, John Westmark: Narratives and Beyond the Darkroom: Photography in the 21st Century, on view from Apr. 4 through June 29, 2014.

These exhibitions examine the creative process of photography and painting in contemporary, southern art. These will be the final special exhibitions on view before the museum closes for renovations in July 2014. "Since the museum opened its doors in 1905, supporting contemporary art has been central to the Gibbes' mission. Our spring exhibitions further this mission by showcasing the great artistic talent of our region today," says Pam Wall, Curator of Exhibitions.

John Westmark, winner of the 2012 Factor Prize for Southern Art, weaves imaginative narratives into his large-scale paintings. He explores the human figure in dynamic ways, through his innovative use of text and paper sewing patterns collaged on canvas. Westmark's paintings depict strong courageous women, some portrayed as stoic martyrs and others as warriors engaged in conflicts of rebellion. The Narratives exhi-


bition features a series of new work created specifically for the Gibbes installation.

"As a product of the American South, and its rich tradition of storytelling as a vehicle to impart a moral lesson or social enlightenment, I am interested in the role of stories and folklore in modern life," says Westmark. "This work references stories from a broad spectrum of humanity, and translates them into a visual narrative structure guided by the schematics of the store-bought sewing pattern. Domestic garment making is often looked upon as an intimate affair passed from one generation to the next, but once the pattern is used, it is tucked away or discarded. These paintings repurpose the garment pattern and its nostalgic aura into a storytelling template."

Beyond the Darkroom: Photography in the 21st Century, examines a variety of photography-based works acquired over the past ten years for the museum's permanent collection. Since the invention of photography in 1839, the medium has constantly evolved with the development of new technologies. In the 21st century, photographic processes have shifted from the darkroom to the digital world, bringing new possibilities to the medium. Ranging from the text and

Discovering a Sense of Place of Susana Berdecio

In Discovering a Sense of Place, Susana Berdecio presents a collection of photographs that capture the artist's vision of the unique Lowcountry landscape. Spending her childhood in Mexico and living most of her adult life in the western part of the United States, Berdecio became accustomed to photographing the vast open landscapes, tall mountains, dense forests, and winding rivers that surrounded her. Since moving to South Carolina five years ago, she has learned to adapt and adjust her techniques and artistic approach to connect to her new landscape, which she

describes as dense, lush, and full of seemingly chaotic forms.

The light is spectacular, sometimes so bright that color is muted," she says. "The creeks, the marshes, the ocean, the clouds all offer an exquisite variety of light, tone, color and texture."


Berdecio spends hours exploring with her camera. She then sits down with her photographs to recreate them into images that reveal the feel of the landscape the mood of the light, and the intricacy and movement of its details. "Sometimes the images require few changes," she explains. "Sometimes, the final result is just a small piece of the original capture where I have tried to recreate what I felt being there, adding all of the subjective elements from my past as I express how I have learned to see the Lowcountry."



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

City of Charleston, SC, Offers Works by Mary-Ann Prack

The City of Charleston, SC, is presenting Standing Still... In the Abstract: Works by Mary-Ann Prack, curated by Celia Cerasoli, a local artist and teacher of ceramics at Cone 10 studios, on view at the City Gallery at Waterfront Park, through Apr. 27, 2014.

This exhibition features sculpture, paintings and drawings by artist Mary-Ann Prack, based in North Carolina since 1994. Her distinctive and precise work explores the geometric purity of surface and form and the energy and emotion that can be found in stillness. Prack's powerful, detail-oriented pieces speak to the expression of the human experience on a physical, spiritual and emotion level. Her subjects are vehicles that connect the inner spirit to a tangible sculptural form, expressed through the use of intense, luminous colors and sharply defined shapes, tensioned against sensuous organic forms and surfaces.

Prack began her formal art training at the University of Guelph, Ontario, and furthered her education at the Art Institute of Fort Lauderdale and Florida Atlantic

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University. She concentrated in both fine art and interior design. After many years working in interior design, Prack made the transition to full-time artist. During the 1980's she became focused on developing her own technical process for creating her sculptural work. Though she uses ceramics as a material, she does not follow the potter's vessel concept but blazes her own path with clay as a pure sculpture medium.

Helena Fox Fine Art in Charleston, SC, will present *Mary Erickson and Her Feathered Friends: New Works*, on view from Apr. 4 - 26, 2014. A reception will be held on Apr. 4, from 5-8pm.

Erickson's first solo exhibit at Helena Fox Fine Art explores her fascination and beautiful depictions of the birds she often observes and studies in their natural habitat. "I record what I see, and am passionate about the scenes I can immortalize on canvas. That is my work's importance," the artist reveals. The exhibit will present 15 new paintings.

Leading up to the exhibition, Erickson will be in Charleston and surrounding areas painting in Plein-Air, a preferred method working on location in the tradition of painters since the French Impressionists.

Erickson has been painting ever since she can remember, growing up in Connecticut, and sold her first artwork to Gulf + Western Industries in Stamford, CT, at age 13. It wasn't until 1993 that she realized her long held dream to pursue art as a career and began painting professionally.

Erickson's day begins before sunrise, and ends after the last sunset painting. Since 1998, she has divided her time between Marshville, NC, and Venice, FL.

Erickson shares the following about her influence, "The love of the outdoors has always been a part of my life. I remember as a child fishing with my Mom on opening day in the spring in Connecticut, the river gliding by and the sounds of red-winged

blackbirds. As I get older, I appreciate more than ever the beauty that surrounds us." Traveling is also a large part of her influence and is essential to the artist.

Erickson is a founding member of SPAA (Southern Plein Air Artists) and a member of The Group of Eight, and the Florida Four, all Southern-based alliances that are intent on recording the scenery of the rapidly vanishing natural southern landscape. She is a Signature Member of the American Society of Marine Painters (ASMA). Memberships also include the Oil Painters of America and the American Impressionist Society.

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

Penn Center on St. Helena Island, SC, Offers Look at Early Years of Harlem

The Penn Center on St. Helena Island, SC, is presenting *Harlem on My Mind:* 1900-1939, first organized by the I.P. Stanback Museum and Planetarium at South Carolina State University in Orangeburg, SC, on view at the York W. Bailey Museum, through May 31, 2014.

Harlem on My Mind: 1900-1939, has only been seen twice in the 45 years since its creation in 1969, first at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in NYC and then in 2007, at the Stanback. This the first exhibition in the newly renovated York W. Bailey Museum and the first exhibition presented through collaboration between Penn Center and the Stanback Museum.

Long before Harlem became one of the trendiest neighborhoods in the red-hot real estate market of Manhattan, it was a metaphor for African American culture at its richest. *Harlem on My Mind* is the classic record of Harlem life during some of the most exciting and turbulent years of its history, a beautiful - and poignant - reminder of a powerful moment in African American history.

The exhibition, created in 1969 for the Metropolitan Museum of Art, records the struggle to establish an urban black culture in 20th century industrialized America. While the entire exhibition documents life in Harlem from just before 1900 to 1968, the exhibition at Penn Center surveys the changing character of Harlem until 1940. By moving through the exhibition, it is possible to witness history unfold and to sense what people might have thought and felt at those times: from white to black Harlem at the beginning of the century, the jazz age of the twenties, depression and hard times in the thirties.

The exhibition opening at Penn Center contains selections from the collection donated to the Stanback Museum by the New York Public Library's Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, where it was housed following the closing of the exhibition at the Metropolitan Museum of





Art. The exhibition features work by some of Harlem's most treasured photographers, among them James Van Der Zee and Aaron Siskind and includes photographic murals of Harlem, from its literary lights to its everyday people who gave life to this legendary community.

Ellen Zisholtz, Stanback Director, stated, "We are proud to continue the long standing collaboration between South Carolina State University and Penn Center which began in 1937, when Arnett House, built by islanders and students, was used for housing student teachers from SC State who were working in the county schools." Another important collaboration produced the first Gullah Studies Institute at Penn Center in the summer of 2005.

As Penn Center commemorates its 150th Anniversary 2012-2014, it honors its history as one of the first schools for freed slaves, established in 1862, and the center of activities for Martin Luther King, Jr. during the Civil Rights Movement, when it was one of the few places in the South where diverse people could meet together. Penn Center continues to serve as a national monument promoting historic preserva-

North Carolina artists Beerman and Katz are known both nationally and internationally. In this exhibition, a mix of the artists' new works and recently shown works will be presented to North Carolina audiences for the first time. Together, Beerman and Katz bring two divergent approaches to art-making. As such, Beerman's poetic sensibility and luminous approach to landscape contrasts Katz's surrealist figurative works.

John Beerman was born in North Carolina in 1958, lived and worked in Nyack, NY, for over 30 years, and moved back to Hillsborough, NC, in 2008. Beerman received his BFA from the Rhode Island School of Design and also studied at Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture. His works are in many collections, such as the North Carolina Museum of Art, the Brooklyn Museum, and the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Beerman is best known for his depictions of the Hudson River Valley as well as his paintings of North Carolina's landscape.

For Two Artists | One Space, Beerman is creating a new body of work which will represent a fresh start for him. He looks at the Greenhill exhibition as "a moment to take stock and plot a new course in my explorations as a painter. I am excited about this, and I am looking forward to creating a new body of work for this show at Greenhill. The changes will be in the direction of creating a design on the canvas. [I incorporate] what the culture of twentieth century art has brought to the table of painting, (especially the element of flatness and design of forms and shapes on the canvas) and [interweave these ideas] with my observational investigations of the world that surrounds us. [I take] the elements of nature and man-made creations and [reassemble] them in a fresh and dynamic way on the canvas."

Greenhill will present new subjects taken from views from the artist's Hillsborough studio, mountain landscapes, and scenes composed from the artist's imagination.

A recent resident of Greensboro, Noé Katz was born in 1953 in Mexico City, Mexico. He studied at the School of Design and Handicrafts of the Instituto Nacional de Bellas Artes, Mexico City with additional study at the Academy of Fine Arts in Florence, Italy. Katz, whose work has been compared to the masters of Mexican Modernism, is a multi-disciplinary artist who works in both two and three dimensional art forms. His experience traverses a variety of media such as drawing, painting, sculpture, and mural painting.

An animated video of his work was introduced at the Festival Internacional Cine Judio in Mexico City this year. The artist has produced several major architectural commissions such as the aluminum wall reliefs for the Fiesta Americana Grand Chapultepec building in Mexico City, and the monumental "Kissing Doors" for the Tokoro Museum of Modern Art in Omishima, Japan. Katz's works are in international collections including the Museo de Arte Moderno in Mexico City, and the Museum of Latin American Art in Long Beach, CA. The exquisite craftsmanship, sinuous lines, and gliding surfaces of Katz's works which combine the figure with objects and landscape communicate sensibilities of openness. His exhibition will include a selection of Katz's paintings and sculptures

His collages, watercolors, oils, photomontages and prints are imbued with visual metaphors from his past in Mecklenburg County, NC, Pittsburgh and Harlem and from a variety of historical, literary and musical sources.

Recognized as one of the most creative and original visual artists of the twentieth century, Bearden had a prolific and distinguished career. He experimented with many different mediums and artistic styles, but is best known for his richly textured collages. Bearden's work is included in many important public collections including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, The Mint Museum, Charlotte, The Cameron Museum, Wilmington, NC, and The Studio Museum in Harlem, among others. He has had retrospectives at the Mint Museum of Art (1980), the Detroit Institute of the Arts (1986), as well as numerous posthumous retrospectives, including The Studio Museum in Harlem (1991) and the National Gallery of Art, Washington, DC (2003).

Bearden was the recipient of many awards and honors throughout his lifetime. Honorary doctorates were given by Pratt Institute, Carnegie Mellon University, Davidson College and Atlanta University, to name but a few. He received the Mayor's Award of Honor for Art and Culture in New York City in 1984 and the National Medal of Arts, presented by President Ronald Reagan, in 1987.

Greenhill promotes the visual arts of North Carolina by engaging a broad

community of artists, adults and children through dynamic exhibitions and educational programs while providing a platform for exploration and investment in art. Bearden was a seminal African American artist and is recognized as one of America's most important twentieth-century artists. He was a prolific artist, with a catalogue of works in the hundreds. The exhibition and art sale at Greenhill will provide the viewer with some of his most important lithographs, serigraphs and etchings, including his highly acclaimed works *The Family, Out Chorus, Mecklenburg Autumn* and *The Train*.

Romare Howard Bearden was born on Sept. 2, 1911, in Charlotte, NC, and died in New York City on Mar. 12, 1988, at the age of 76. His life and art are marked by exceptional talent, encompassing a broad range of intellectual and scholarly interests, including music, performing arts, history, literature and world art.

Bearden began college at Lincoln University, transferred to Boston University and completed his studies at New York University, graduating with a degree

in education. He also attended the Art Students League in New York and later, the Sorbonne in Paris.

From the mid-1930s through 1960s, Bearden was a social worker with the New York City Department of Social Services, working on his art at night and on weekends. His success as an artist was recognized with his first solo exhibition in Harlem in 1940 and his first solo show in Washington, DC, in 1944. Bearden's works were exhibited during his lifetime throughout the United States and Europe.



soon as I saw my first star, followed several years later by seeing Van Gogh's "Starry Night" and realizing that nature can be painted on canvas not only how it appears exactly to the eye, but can be made more personal with broad brush strokes and bold colors. I would like the viewer to look at my paintings and feel a sense of time when seeing an old house or bridge. When painting flowers, I enjoy exploring texture, value and movement across the canvas, trying to share my passion for flowers -- not only for what they look like but also for how they make you feel. When painting figures, I try to capture the individuality of the subject I am painting and explore the push and pull of the figure as it relates to the environment. I strive to put modern touches of different colors around the canvas to express what I feel and see."

"Composition on the canvas is just as interesting to me as depicting subject matter. An active composition can reach out to a viewer just as much as subject matter. Often I will blend elements of realism and abstraction to create a composition and texture that I think is interesting and dynamic. I will often look for areas in which I can use geometric touches, like a pattern of shadows beneath the eaves of an old barn or the ovals and triangles that when painted just right, give the impression of a boat or a sail."

"I have a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Painting from the University of South Carolina," adds Watcher. "I have also studied at the New York Studio School and interned at

the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington, DC. Recently, two of my paintings were selected to appear in season three of the Showtime series, *Homeland*."

Amy Sullivan offers the following artist's statement, "My process is an intuitive exploration of simplicity. I am fascinated with negative spaces contradicted by positive mark-making."

"I start with a very small palm-sized study in oil and wax. Then I select the pieces that contain the potential for paradox. Larger paintings, sometimes as large as 60" x 96" are designed to capture this intrigue and paradox. Carving into the wax and paint, penetrating masses of space with sharp edges, I respond to the tension of defining space and object in an almost sensual way."

"Ever intrigued with the irony of painting, I wait for the voice that says, 'hurry hurry,' but slow down while you're doing it," adds Sullivan. "When I'm finished, and I know that the work is complete, there is a feeling inside that says you're home and safe, and at the same time it screams, 'run."



The Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting Jennifer Meanley: Far away, in the meadow, on view through May 24, 2014. The solo exhibition was organized by SECCA and curated by Steven Matijcio. SECCA will also present Eric Fertman: A Comic Turn, on view from Apr. 1 through June 30, 2014. This exhibition is SECCA Curator of Contemporary Art Cora Fisher's first show at the museum.

A joint opening reception for Jennifer Meanley: Far away, in the meadow and Eric Fertman: A Comic Turn will be held on Apr. 1, from 6-8pm. Guests will be able to experience the exhibitions in the company of both artists. Refreshments and a cash bar will be provided.

The paintings and collages of North Carolina-based artist Jennifer Meanley lure us into richly hued and strange worlds. The exhibition includes new work by Meanley and features a site-specific 27-foot collage, which draws on classical narratives and further demonstrates the emotional complexity of the artist's imagery and storytelling.

The title, Far away, in the meadow, comes from Ray Bradbury's 1962 novel Something Wicked This Way Comes, where - in what the writer calls "the Mirror's maze" - shadows flicker "as if parts of someone's life, yet unborn, were trapped there, waiting to be lived."

"Such is the case in Meanley's lush, mystical gardens, where the shards of men, women, animals, and the in between frolic in a carnival on the cusp of being," writes Matijcio, currently curator at the Cincinnati Contemporary Arts Center. This is Matijcio's final exhibition at SECCA concluding a vibrant five-year

Meanley studied painting at the University of New Hampshire and received an MFA from Indiana University. Since 2007 Meanley has been represented by Jacqueline Stoneberger at Les Beaux-Arts des Ameriques Gallery in Montreal, Canada. Since 2006 she has exhibited and lectured extensively at venues including the Manifest Drawing and Painting Center in Cincinnati; the University of Louisiana, Monroe; Ferrum College in Virginia, and at University of North Carolina at Charlotte. The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, is presenting *Pierre Dau- ra: Modernist in the Mountains* and *Take 10: Collectors' Circle 10th Anniversary* both on view through June 22, 2014.

Pierre Daura: Modernist in the Mountains features the beautiful artwork of artist Pierre Daura, including many mountain landscapes – scenes that residents of Western North Carolina will feel connected to. In 1998, the Museum received a gift of 36 paintings by Pierre Daura, given by the artist's daughter Martha R. Daura, and the Museum is thrilled to be showing some of the works.

Pedro Francisco Daura y Garcia (1896-1976) was born in Minorca, Spain and raised in Barcelona. He studied in Paris and in later years spent his summers in France. But from 1939 until his death in 1976, he lived in the Shenandoah Valley near Lexington, VA. The paintings the Museum selected focus on his work done in the Blue Ridge Mountains and the Shenandoah Valley. Daura's paintings from this region often depict sites and scenes from life near his home. In some images, he works in an Impressionist style while in others he utilizes a Cubistic approach. His reflective character is evident in these analytic and exuberant paintings.

As a young man, Daura studied in Barcelona at the School of Fine Arts with Pablo Picasso's father, Jose Ruiz Blasco. In 1910, at the age of 14, he rented a studio with fellow artists and sold work in his first exhibition. At the age of 18, he went to Paris with a letter of introduction from his godfather, cellist Pablo Casals.

Daura exhibited at the Salon d'Automne in 1922 and 1926. His rejection from the Salon in 1928 was a catalyst for joining other artists such as Jean Helion, Ernest Engel-Rozier, Alfred Aberdam and Joaquin Torres-Garcia in a highly acclaimed exhibition entitled *Cinq peintres refuses par le jury du Salon* at the Galerie Marck. It was during this time that Daura met and married an American art student, Louise Blair.

In the mid-1930s, Daura made his first trip to Virginia to visit his wife's family. In 1937, he joined the Republican army in Spain as a volunteer fighting against the forces of Franco. He served and was wounded at the battle of Teruel and went to France to recuperate. Refusing to return to Spain after the war, the family stayed in France until 1939, when World War II prompted their move to Virginia. For

the remainder of his life, Daura lived in Rockbridge Baths near Lexington, VA. Daura was active as an artist and teacher. He taught at Lynchburg College and Randolph Macon Woman's College.



Woolworth Walk in Asheville, NC, Offers Works by Kyle Keeler and John Nelson

Woolworth Walk in Asheville, NC, will present *Keeler + Nelson*, featuring works in glass by Kyle Keeler and paintings by John Nelson, on view in the FW Front Gallery, from Apr. 1 - 29, 2014. A reception will be held on Apr. 4, from 5-7pm.

Kyle Keeler has been working with glass since 2001. He moved from Colorado to the Appalachian Mountains in 2007 and became further inspired by Asheville's unique, artistic community. As he continues to deepen his understanding of the complexity of glass, he has begun to explore the relationship glass can have with other materials.

Each piece is individually hand blown using a torch that burns in excess of 2500 degrees Fahrenheit, using a gas mixture of propane and oxygen. Upon completion the piece is placed into a kiln to anneal at 1050 degrees overnight. All glass color is made from metals and minerals from the earth so there are no paints, dyes, or glazes. These elements combined with silica sand create each color. Every color reacts differently

to the slightest variance in temperature, so working with color is a delicate process. Borosilicate glass is the same glass formula as Pyrex glass, so it is a very strong material and made to last.

Cleveland-born, Sarasota-raised, professional guitarist and custom framer, John Nelson also moved to Asheville in 2007, trading hot days in the Florida sun and late nights with the band for cool, creative nights in his mountain home studio. Besides earning him a living for his family, framing design gave Nelson an outlet for his right-brain tendencies. But his fascination with

textures, color relationships, the use of positive and negative space and the use of art as a catalyst for emotional response drove him to create his own art as well.

"My paintings employ design to generate tension, and I use color for a release of that tension. I enjoy watching the art reveal itself layer after layer using newly discovered techniques while eliminating subject matter. Having no formal training, I can create in a manner that knows no bounds."



Bender Gallery in Asheville, NC, Features Works by Toland Sand

Bender Gallery in Asheville, NC, will present *Explorations*, a solo exhibition featuring the work of prominent glass sculptor, Toland Sand, on view from Apr. 4 through May 31, 2014. A reception will be held on Apr. 4, from 5-8pm. The artist will be in attendance and available for discussion during the reception.

Per Sand, "Explorations is a metaphor for my artistic life, my worldly life, and my spiritual life". His early life was one of living around the world including places such as Carmel, Taiwan, Athens, D.C. and the mountains of Colorado. He never lived in any one place more than four years and at each stop, he was constantly exploring the uniqueness of the area. In 1972 Sand was initiated into the Inner Mysteries by his spiritual Master, Sant Kirpal Singh and meditates daily according to His instructions.

Highly ground and polished and technically perfect, each of Sand's crystal

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assemblages exhibit balance, symmetry and harmony and pay homage to the deconstructed form. Architecture, symbolism, and Eastern philosophy are portrayed throughout the artist's work.

Aquamarine Triangulations is an "architecturally oriented study in tension and resolution". It is a deconstructed cube, reassembled with an optical wedge and other optical elements to form a compelling sculpture that spins on an anodized aluminum base. The striking aqua hue contrasts with the clear optical crystal and the interior graphics suggest fluidity in an otherwise angular piece. As in most of Sand's sculptures the piece is composed of both leaded and non-leaded glass, which allows for stunning reflection and refraction of the main inner core.

Weighing in at over 100 pounds, *Heliopolis* is one of the more impressive and visually striking pieces in the exhibition. The sculpture is essentially a cube halved at an angle and reassembled with a wedge of optical glass in between the two halves. Very architectural in nature, the sculpture is balanced on the points of each half. The entire piece spins to create the look of an external kaleidoscope, and the dichroic generated colors change as it moves. "The interior graphics are meant to compliment the shape" says Sand.

Sand is self-taught and has been professionally working with glass since 1977. His explorations in glass began when took over a friend's stained glass business. He has also blown glass and has worked in sandblasted architectural glass. Since 1984, Sand has been a glass sculptor discovering new horizons and pushing the limits of shape, color and technique. The artist was born in Berkeley, CA, and works out of his studio in rural New Hampshire.

students from four of the most internationally well known schools of ikebana will be treated to special demonstrations and workshops: Ichiyo, Ikenobo, Ohara and Sogetsu. Ikebana is the Japanese art form of flower design and the Ikebana International Chapter in Asheville has over 50 members. Ikebana International participants from other cities will assist local II Chapter #74 of Asheville with aspects of the conference: North Carolina (Charlotte, Winston-Salem, Durham and Wilmington), Columbia, SC, Pittsburgh, PA, Naples, FL and Atlanta, GA.

Of special interest and open to the public will be an Ikebana exhibition by more than 100 designers from across the US to take place at the Renaissance Hotel, on Tuesday, May 20 and Wednesday, May 21 from 10:30am to 7pm. This highly anticipated event is usually held every five years in the US and includes a first hand look at both traditional and contemporary flower designs, some in containers by regional crafts persons.

Regional artists have taken special forms adapted specifically for ikebana use. Interest stems from the high demand for interesting containers by ikebana designers locally and around the world as well as the distinctive images created in ikebana through the partnership of flowers and containers. Participating ceramic artists showing their works at a Container Market (for conference participants only) will be: WNC artists Akira Satake, John Ransmeier, John Lawson, Steven Forbes de Soule, Tacy Apostolik, Nick Joerling, Matt Tommey, Joy Tanner, Will Baker, Sue Grier, Judith Duff and Kathie Kline. Guest ikebana basket artist Judy Charlick of Cleveland, OH, will also show her unique containers.

Sue Grier and Kathie Kline, local members of Ikebana International, are also practicing designers with practical knowledge of the relationship of Japanese flower design and their special containers. Ikebana containers will be available to the public at their studios and through the galleries that represent them. Satake, Joerling, Grier and Duff will also be on display at the Blue Spiral Gallery exhibition, *ZEN*, that coincides

with the NARC Conference and public exhibition.

Asheville was awarded the bid to host NARC 2014 by a vote of the delegates at the 16th North American Regional Conference held in Monterey Bay, CA, in May 2008 following the presentation of Asheville Ikebana International President Terri Ellis Todd. Selected for its crafts culture, passionate ikebana designers and container artists, and native plant life similar to that of Japan, Asheville won the recognition of their peers over larger chapters such as Naples, FL, and Dallas, TX. Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Features Works by Ralph Burns

Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, is presenting Ralph Burns: A Persistence of Vision — Photographs 1972-2013, on view in the East Wing, Upstairs Gallery, through July 20, 2014.

Ralph Burns has long been recognized as a documentary photographer whose images have captured the diverse and enigmatic nature of ritual and religion, and who has explored the subjective and often defining nature of belief, worship and culture. Like his predecessors - such as Walker Evans, Diane Arbus, Mary Ellen Mark and Robert Frank - Burns uses his cameras to probe a constantly shifting human landscape and to document the public and private aspects of culture and religion in transition, often working at the unclear and overlapping intersection of both.

Throughout his career Burns has displayed a continuous and persistent interest in the motivations for worship and ritual while maintaining a compassionate and non-judgmental intimacy with his subjects. He has photographed both collective and individualized manifestations of what he sees as a seemingly irrepressible human need to ritualize loss, love and death, and to formally externalize and codify hope and the desire for transcendence.

The photographs in A Persistence of Vision illuminate Burns's concerns and interactions: an Elvis fan seemingly keeping vigil over a blanket-covered, bed-ridden Elvis icon in Memphis; a penitent in Mexico carrying the statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe, strapped awkwardly to his back; a man staring hard into the distance while being prayed over for healing at a Marion apparition site in Georgia; a woman in agonized ecstasy struggling with being baptized in the Jordan River in Israel.

A native of Louisiana and a resident of Asheville since 1975, Burns has travelled great distances to photograph a specific event or religious festival. He has photographed in New Orleans, Asheville and Western North Carolina, the American South, Mexico, Cuba, Israel, England, Thailand, Nepal, Afghanistan and Europe.

Burns is recognized both nationally and internationally, exhibiting his photographs in museums worldwide. In her curator's statement for *Heaven*, a group exhibition

that included a number of Burns's photographs and exhibited at Kunsthalle Düsseldorf in Germany and Tate Liverpool in England, the German/Israeli curator Doreet Levitte Hartten wrote: "(His) insights into the religious character ... makes Burns's work, apart from their aesthetic qualities, into documents of anthropological significance."

This is Burns's second solo exhibition at the Asheville Art Museum, his first being in 1990. His work has also been included in a number of group exhibitions at the Museum and is included in the Museum's Permanent Collection. Ralph Burns: A Persistence of Vision — Photographs 1972-2013 is a broader and more extensive survey of Burns's work over the past 40 years and, although centered on his images of religion, ritual and belief, is not limited to those subjects.

Founded by artists in 1948 in Asheville, NC, the Asheville Art Museum annually presents an exciting, inviting and active schedule of exhibitions and public programs based on its permanent collection of 20th and 21st century American art. Any visit will also include experiences with works of significance to Western North Carolina's cultural heritage including Studio Craft, Black Mountain College and Cherokee artists. Special exhibitions feature renowned regional and national artists and explore issues of enduring interest. "Using found materials in my work, collected in the places I live, allows me to create a direct connection between art object and place. The tins, rusty bolts, scraps of plastic and metal are transformed in conjunction with enamel and steel to make jewelry and sculpture distinctly of a place and time," adds Cole.

Julia Ralston (Boone, NC & Kiawah Island, SC) says, "I've been trusting my instincts and experimenting recently with imaginative color and composition. Landscape is still my starting point, but I'm just as interested in the environment created on the 2-D surface as I am concerned with the original motif. After all, I'm making a painting, not stamping an exact likeness of the natural world. It's been an intuitive learning process to narrow my focus and not try to say everything on every canvas."

Some of the artists you may know, most of them not. But, all are accomplished in their art. The Toe River Arts Council has accepted 12 new artists into their Burnsville and Spruce Pine gift shops. This process keeps the art fresh and gives talented artists a venue to show and sell their work. Some of the artists are newcomers to the area; others are familiar presences on the vibrant arts scene here; still others have been quietly creating here for years.

TRAC is very proud to add Claudette McCurry to its roster. A local artist, she studied under nationally-known teacher Urban Bird decades ago. Since then, she has developed her own style. "My oil paintings reflect my country heritage."

Watercolorist Christopher Nash says he can't remember a time when he wasn't compelled to be creative. Although he has no formal training, his tree line silhouettes cast back to seemingly years of talent.

Laurel Lovrek's oils have been on display at TRAC in several of the Blue Ridge Fine Arts Guild's exhibitions. Now she will have an opportunity to show off her talent for capturing the outdoors on her own.

Also, in the two-dimensional category, T.J. Kearns joins the Arts Council with his photographs of natural surroundings, which he hopes will "inspire people to slow down and take a look at how beautiful the world we live in is."

Ed Mundy is one of those folks who puts a handprint on the wall and on the floor. His "rusted" wall pieces on handmade paper speak to nature's quiet shadows while the light from his lamps atop barnwood constructs cast egg wash reflections on the wall.

Jewelry was as diverse as the wall art in the jurying. MaryLouise Jordan came to Burnsville by way of Hawaii where she learned the Hula and an appreciation for color everywhere. Working in series, her beaded pieces evoke a story, a color, a flower, a shape in their design and feel.

Delphia Lamberson moved here from Atlanta, GA, and began creating beaded jewelry, which led to silversmithing, which has melded into a passion for making "jewelry that looks and feels handmade."

And Jem Klein's unique handcrafted barrettes and earrings are made from sustain-

ably harvested North American wood. Ever since the age of nine when she first used her father's dremel tool, she has surrounded herself in wood and considers it "a calling and great passion."

Spruce Pine's Judy Meek began her basketry career seven years ago as a winter retirement activity. Now, she says she addicted to the form. Her basketry suggests the simplicity of an earlier time, when their only purpose was utilitarian. But Meek's are more. Perhaps one would want to fill one of her baskets with Simona Rosasco cards.

Rosasco, already a member of the gift shop registry in fused glass has added photography to her repertoire of talents, putting images not only of her glass and of almost everything else on blank cards.

Rounding out the new gift shop artists are two well-known artists who have previously exhibited in the galleries, been on the studio tour several times and now have been juried into the TRAC gift shops. First is Judson Guérard. Known for his larger pieces, he will be offering his hand-blown glass ornaments ("a comfortable first step") and paperweights, which he considers as doodles, that could have evolved into larger works, but stayed small.

And finally David Ross, whose Bakers-ville studio has been around for almost 40 years. He is a "people's potter" whose work speaks to the natural world, with its earth and sky tones and the creatures that call the land and the water home.

Ed Mundy has said, "I find the traffic on the beaten path unbearable, so why not walk where there is no path, and leave a trace." These talented new TRAC gift shop artists will leave a lasting imprint.

The Toe River Arts Council in Spruce Pine, NC, is presenting works by blacksmiths participating in downtown Spruce Pine's Fire on the Mountain Festival, on view in the Spruce Pine TRAC Gallery, through Apr. 26, 2014. A reception recognizing the talents of these blacksmiths and open to the public will be held at the gallery on the eve of the Festival on Friday, Apr. 25, from 5-7pm.

Held in conjunction with "Fire", the exhibition will give visitors an opportunity to view iron arts and crafts in a gallery setting and to learn more about the nationally acclaimed smiths and their work processes. The floor will be weighted down with large forged work while smaller, intricate handwrought pieces will adorn pedestals, with even more on the walls.

TRAC's history of displaying the acme historical craftsmanship in iron remains at the top for the 2014 exhibition. This year's recognized Master Blacksmith is Scott Lankton from Ann Arbor, MI. Lankton, who has been a studio artist for 31 years, began falling in love with metal while working at a jewelry store in his teens. He went on to earn a BFA in jewelry and metalsmithing from Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, MI. Later, he traveled to Germany to hone his metal working skills. Now, he focuses more on "house jewelry." He says, "I'm making big jewelry. A railing is like a big necklace for a house." And this year, his house will be the TRAC Gallery with his piece inside.

Blacksmiths in the exhibition include Jeff McDowell from Green Mountain, NC, and Jim Moore from Morganton, NC. Also on the floor will be Avery County's Bill Brown, a "sculptor" of metal since 1978 and bladesmith Shelby Mihalevich whose Damascus steel keyhole kiridashi (knife) will slice through the exhibit. Zack Smith-Johnson from Boone, NC, offers a bit of whimsy with his metal sculptures - pieces that evoke contemplation and a smile. And

Special this year is the Finial Design Contest. Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, NC, will present *Remote Sites of War*, featuring more than 110 works by North Carolina-based artists Todd Drake, Skip Rohde and Christopher Sims, on view from Apr. 10 through May 30, 2014.

The exhibition offers a first-person world view of war that is quietly revealing and poses as many questions for people to consider as it does answers, said David J. Brown, Fine Art Museum director who also organized the exhibition.

"Ongoing armed conflicts involving the United States somewhere in the world seem to have little effect on us; we are carefully shielded from what really occurs," Brown said. "In their own way, each of these artists delves into the peripheries of war and shares a core belief that all humans deserve to be treated with dignity and respect."

All three artists will be present for the Apr. 10 opening of the show and will be either speaking with or conducting workshops with students and faculty from the art, English, history, political science, and religion and philosophy departments as well as the Honors College. Brown described the interdisciplinary approach as one way "to break down the walls of the museum and provide meaningful intersections with the larger community on and off campus."

A resident of Summerfield, NC, Todd Drake creates works of art aimed at a better understanding between people in the US and other parts of the world. The US Department of State asked Drake to help build bridges between Sunni and Shia Muslims in Bahrain and to empower women in Saudi Arabia. A college-level studio art instruc-

tor, he has authored and designed several books in collaboration with undocumented immigrants from Mexico into the United States. For his "Double Vision: Perspectives from Palestine" series, he spent three weeks holding photography workshops with Palestinian youth who have grown up with a narrative that Drake claims he can never fully know.

Skip Rohde, of Asheville, NC, spent 20 years in the US Navy before going back to school and receiving an art degree. His work, guided by his interest in the "consequences of war," landed him several assignments in Iraq and Afghanistan working as a consultant for the US Department of State to help the Afghan people "run their own affairs and manage their own districts," he said. Rohde began sketching the portraits of

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a variety of Afghan people, from elected officials to local villagers and bazaar owners, using whatever materials were available – scrap pieces of paper, pencils, graphite, pen and ink. The result is a series called "Faces of Afghanistan."

Christopher Sims, a resident of Efland, NC, teaches at Duke University's Center for Documentary Studies and spent seven years as photo archivist at the US Holocaust Museum. While there, he became interested in "the idea of making war photographs that weren't about the violence or spectacle or the things that make people turn away from

most war photographs." In "Theater of War: The Pretend Villages of Iraq and Afghanistan," he photographed the training grounds of US Army bases in the deep forests of North Carolina and Louisiana and the deserts of California. These pretend villages serve as "a strange and poignant way station for people heading off to war or those that have fled it," he said.



daughter that were equal parts fear, reverence, and love.


Also in book form, *All the In Between* will be available for purchase during the exhibition. A perfect exhibition for the month of Mother's Day, the FAC encourages the public to attend.



sen color for his primary tool to express his view of how he envisions some of the inequities and mobility issues of people from differing backgrounds and experiences.

"This series was created as a statement on ethnic stereotypes and racism in America. My work is meant to show the viewer the subtleties of racism that exist, using examples or terms I have witnessed personally or through the experiences of my friends and family. I want the paintings to create a dialogue with the viewer and have them question themselves and society. The work is meant to be subtle yet in-your-face, by not having the text as the main focus of each piece but having it play just as strong a role through its subtlety," says Maciel.

"The work focuses on three major elements; the figure, text, and color," adds Maciel. "The background and text are painted in similar colors to convey the subtle undertones of these different racial slurs or derogatory terms that represent the different ethnicities. The text is painted in such a way that it covers the canvas and becomes a design element within the background. The figure is then painted to convey a reaction to each term, partially covering the text, leaving it to the viewer to complete each term with the letters that are still visible. The figures are roughly painted, creating a sense of struggle and contrast between the figure and the text. The idea is to create a visual resistance or battle between the text and the

"My work as a whole represents an issue that still exists in our society whether it be racism or classism. The differences between people will always exist, but understanding and respecting those differences is where my point is to be made. The melting pot that is the inner city is what drives and influences my state of mind or passion. Though it is far from right or perfect there is a common respect for others within the struggles of life that is somewhat genuine and not felt everywhere. Like many people, I get frustrated with certain individuals in society, and it seems being fake or politically correct instead of having a true mutual respect is the new norm. As an artist I express my



Hunter pursued her undergraduate studies at the Kansas City Art Institute, Parsons School of Design, and the Yale Norfolk Summer School of Art & Music. As a Regents Fellow, she received her MFA from the University of California, Davis, where she studied with Robert Arneson, Roy De-Forest, and Irit Rogoff. She has participated in numerous solo and multiple artist exhibitions throughout the United States and Europe. Additionally, she has also received many awards and grants for her artwork, nost notably, a Starr Foundation Fellow ship, enabling her to be the first American woman to serve as Artist-in-Residence at the Royal Academy of Art, London.

The production and distribution of her Spectacle Spectacular has been supported by a University of South Carolina Research and Productive Scholarship Grant, a Josephine Abney Research Fellowship, special funding from the University of South Carolina Research Foundation, a Puffin Foundation Ltd. Grant, Cultural Council of Richland and Lexington Counties Quarterly Grant, and a University of South Carolina Research Opportunity Program Grant Category III. Hunter began this series through the award of a summer residency at The Cooper Union, New York, NY. She is currently an Associate Professor of Art and

Hunter offered the following statement, "I create visual representations of our complex and ambivalent psychological relationship with the messages about gendered identity that are disseminated through popular culture. I am interested in how young females are shaped psychologically through the consumption of mainstream cultural symbols. I analyze narratives of fashion photography and their ability to mold behavior through the symbolic portrayal of models. Utilizing the models as surrogates and stereotypes, I deconstruct their unobtainable status through narratives that question the status quo. The images address political and gender issues while simultaneously serving as personal testimony. Fashion photographers rely on basic shapes in set design and model positioning to create a sense of harmonious balance that discourages viewers' interrogation of the message behind the image, I use techniques to achieve the opposite effect—discordant messages, tension of shape, and psycholog cal unrest."

Susan Lenz is working on her Wall of Ancestors, which is made up of over forty framed, anonymous vintage photographs. Each image includes a collage of individual letters clipped from antique books and old sheet music. The words suggest a potential narrative for the faces frozen in time, forgotten yet still visible. As a collection, the work speaks to human mortality, the way society seeks to remember, and the inevitable manner in which time marches ever forward.

Pat Gilmartin will be showing some new pieces of figurative sculpture. Two of them are full-length works of the female figure, while others are new additions to her series of panels featuring small faces of both males and females. Gilmartin's ceramic sculptures challenge viewers to create their own meanings and interpretations of her works.

Stephen Chesley has returned to the Atlantic ocean of his hometown of Virginia Beach and of South Carolina. The poetic realism and symbolism handed down by mentors such as George Inness, Albert Pinkham Ryder, and Winslow Homer reads through in a new brace of nautical paintings. Also featured are rare showings of Chesley's pastel work. Some works feature the Florida Everglades that are in a fragile balance against developmental and climatic pressure.

Sharon Licata will present a series of limestone tablets, each with a hand-lettered oriental character with the English translation below it.

"Hanging Pages" by Laurie McIntosh is part of an ongoing series of large, deconstructed paintings created with multiple layers of calligraphic marks and grounds. The deconstruction results in pages that are then reassembled and unconventionally bound to create new visual relationships between the images.

Kirkland Smith continues to create representational work in both traditional and non-traditional materials. In her paintings she tries to capture a moment in time, recording its power and beauty to share with others. In her assemblage art, she hopes to challenge the consumer habits of our crazy, fast-paced society.

Also on display will be an interactive wall where visitors can say something through words or drawings. The wall will remain on display throughout the show so visitors can participate at any time until the show comes down.

Eileen Blyth, Heidi-Darr Hope, Michel McNinch, Robert Kennedy, Laura Spong and David Yaghjian will also present new work and be available to meet visitors to their studios.

The South Carolina Confederate Relic Room and Military Museum in Columbia, SC, is presenting *An Artist's Story: Civil War Drawings of Edwin Forbes*, on view through Aug. 15, 2014.

Like thousands of young men, twenty-three-year-old John Edwin Forbes went to war in 1862, but he did not shoulder a rifle or carry a saber. A classically trained artist, Forbes joined a group of reporters known collectively as the Bohemian Brigade. Sent south by northern newspapers, they fed a home front population hungry for information about the war and the men engaged in it. For two and a half years Forbes documented the Union and Confederate armies in Virginia in camp, on the march, and in battle.

The exhibition features a selection of his intriguing drawings. Accompanied by Forbes's own descriptions, this exhibition features original pen-and-ink drawings based on his wartime sketches and used to

'here' and 'there'. Simpson's paintings, drawings, and videos explore the paradoxical irony that digital technologies impose on the perception of time and place. Using the poetic metaphor of a river to set the context of time, and the Middle Saluda River in western South Carolina for imagery. Videos of sites along the river are used to create stop-action images of the movement of water. Using a second or two of video, three and sometimes five frames are edited to infer a specific moment on the river. The subtle differences in the ebb and flow that can be seen in these side-by-side images create a time frame that happens so quickly that the experience allows the viewer to feel as if they are inside a moment.

Callas has exhibited extensively in Korea, China, Japan, Europe, and Australia. His works are in museum collections in those countries as well as in Hungary, Brazil and numerous American museums.

Warner Hyde is a native of Spartanburg, SC, and is Associate Professor of Art at Meredith College in Raleigh, NC. Recently he was invited to be a member of YAKI-MONO, an international group of 80 top tier ceramicists from all over the world, who make ceremonial grade wares for Chado, the Japanese tea ceremony.

Hyde was selected to participate in "SteinFest," an exhibition by six North American artists who were invited to make and exhibit modern interpretations of the







Also in the collection was his certificate of American citizenship which he received in 1995. Zoltan was the author of numerous books

Zoltan taught workshops across North America from Florida to Alaska and from California to Nova Scotia. Travel workshops included Hungary, Norway, Russia, Belgium, Italy, Scotland, Japan and Saudi Arabia. Zoltan continued to study videos and books of other artists until his final days and continued to teach as his students visited. His last request was that his books and videos continue to be available to his friends. Willa McNeill, Zoltan's long time

Waterworks Visual Arts Center in Salisbury, NC, Offers Works by Ken Hoffman, Brian Mashburn, & Kevin Palme

The Waterworks Visual Arts Center in Salisbury, NC, is presenting *Relationships:* Art of the Human Condition and its Effects on the Environment, featuring works by Ken Hoffman, Brian Mashburn, and Kevin Palme, on view through May 17, 2014.

These artists use dreamlike images to investigate the relationship of the human condition and its effects on the environment. Each work expresses the subject in the context of human values, contemporary culture, and events of a specific space, both physical and psychological. The exhibition takes a fresh look at conventional representations of nature to push boundaries and offer interesting ways to evoke emotional responses. The art may seem whimsical, colorful, or challenging, yet each elicits contemplation and empathy toward the artist's view.

Ken Hoffman (Peoria, IL) uses anthropomorphic imagery to pursue a surreal approach to the human head. "For the past 20 years, the anthropomorphic subject matter of my animal portrait paintings has been the central focus of my artistic endeavors. My main objective has been to pursue this vigorous and quasi-surreal approach to the human head. It is my intention to convey to the viewer animal-people expressions and to show how close humans are to animal counterparts. The impact of the imagery parallels certain kinds of modern literature such as Animal Farm, Metamorphosis, and Waiting for Godot."

Hoffman uses color and a buildup of oil paint as part of a complex method to achieve surface effects. In his recent work, he has been exploring the use of new materials such as sand, glitter, and acrylic paint.

Hoffman is Professor of Art, Emeritus at Bradley University in Peoria, IL. He earned his BFA and MFA at the San Francisco Art Institute. His work has been exhibited nationally and is held in public collections of the Rockford Art Museum in Rockford, IL; the Lakeview Museum in Peoria, IL; and private collections including the Administrative Director of the Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago; and the President of the Chicago International Art Expo. He has also shown his work internationally in Paris. Poland, Germany, Australia, Ireland, and Argentina. Hoffman's exhibition, Animals Great and Small, will be shown in the Norvell Gallery.

Known for darker, chaotic landscapes, Brian Mashburn (Asheville, NC) paints a whole series of work that centers around the overgrowth of cities, industry, and urban populations. His scenes look like they could be from a post-apocalyptic world.

Mashburn graduated from UNC (Chapel Hill) with a BFA in Painting and Drawing and has shown his work across the United States.

Mashburn says, "My paintings are about accumulation and consequence, contrast and depth, narrative and observation. The growth of cities, industry, and urban populations has entered a state of perpetual velocity, with untold implications for both natural and social geographies."

Consequent states of excess, alienation, degradation, and serenity bleed together in Mashburn's meticulous oil paintings of gothic beauty. Between grandeur and the grotesque, he presents post-apocalyptic visions of the modern world where nature, culture, and industry engage in an ambivalent endgame. With the delicate touch of 19th century German Romantic painters, Mashburn creates complex, but exquisitely rendered spaces where trees, clouds, spires, and solemn figures negotiate a proliferating maze of telephone poles, smokestacks, and carcasses of the Industrial Age.

Painting with what Mashburn calls, "the soul of a hopeless romantic and the dark humor of a cynic," He channels hallucinatory states of a bleak, yet sublime future. Steven Matijicio states, "After spending time in Hong Kong, Thailand, and China, the endless tides of skyscrapers and citizenry left an indelible imprint on the work of Brian Mashburn. As a model of the escalating urban condition, the sheer density of population and infrastructure was sublime as it teetered on the tipping point. Like the seductive draw of an epic disaster, he travels this path towards overload in both subject matter and style."

Comparing his methodical brushstrokes to the monotonous processes of mass production, Mashburn observes, "In the end, they both produce a polluted, drab landscape." His current body of work, *Miasma*, is on view in the Osborne and Woodson Galleries.

The work of contemporary artist Kevin Palme (Asheville, NC) is an ongoing study derived from his interest in places, landscapes, and the abstraction of memories. Born and raised in New Jersey, Palme spent time driving and traveling throughout the country which had a dramatic impact on his work and ideology about making art.

Palme says, "Since 2001, the primary continued above on next column to the right

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basis for my work has been my relationship to landscapes and places. I employ painting to understand how I interact with spaces and environments and how those particular places impact me. Derived from atmospheric light, sheer scale, or simply from a specific object, the work is often spare and focuses on only one facet of the environment, resulting in fields of slowly shifting color."

"My recent series of works are based, not only on physical places, but psychological spaces as well," adds Palme. "I am interested in examining how painting can be utilized to allude to an idea of a place or memory of a particular time. Transparent and hazy layers of color built into and over previous layers of color become metaphors for the act of remembering and its inherently distant and abstract nature. As completed paintings, the works function as contemplative fields conjuring memo-

ries of landscapes and experiences. While each painting has a very specific origin and meaning for me, each may also have uniquely different and individual meanings to viewers, inviting personal interpretations and new metaphors."

Palme received his BA in Studio Art from Wake Forest University and his MFA in Painting from Savannah College of Art and Design. His work has been nationally exhibited and is held in public collections including the Creative Arts Guild, Dalton, Georgia, Mohawk Industries, Dalton, Georgia, Parsec Financial Management, Asheville, North Carolina, and Savannah College of Art and Design, Savannah, Georgia. His works are also held in private collections nationally.

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Clemson University in Clemson, SC, Installs Public Site Specific Art Project

Atelier InSite is Clemson University's new Creative Inquiry project that embarks on collaborative research to bring site-specific public art to new capital improvement projects on campus. Creative Inquiry is an educational initiative at Clemson University that engages undergraduate students in applied research and real team projects. Atelier InSite is unique in that it fosters a cross-disciplinary and inclusive approach that is predominantly student driven: "By students, for students." The overarching goal is to create a "new paradigm for the administration of public art on university campuses." The term "Atelier" is derived from a French word with a root translating, "workshop" or "studio." Atelier InSite is a unique Creative Inquiry in that it transcends many departmental boundaries, taking the platform for cross-disciplinary research and field collaboration.

The project began in August of 2012 when representative faculty from the Art Department were invited by the Clemson University Master Planners Office and the Perkins + Will architecture firm to join the conversation for artwork planned for a new state-of-the-art Life Sciences Facility. They were brought on board for aesthetic consultation, but instead pitched the idea that the project should become a collaborative and interdisciplinary partnership under the Creative Inquiry initiative, which has its roots in applied student research. The project for implementing art for the Life Sciences Facility would be funded by a provision in Clemson's Master Planner's Design Guidelines. This provision states that ½ of 1% of the university capital improvement projects exceeding a budget of \$2 million dollars would be set aside for funding a public art initiatives on campus.

Taking President Jim Barker's advice, the faculty presented the Atelier InSite/Creative Inquiry initiative to Clemson's Administrative Council requesting that the former provision, be made an official university policy. Page 40 - Carolina Arts, April 2014

The measure was subsequently passed by the council, which now means that every future university funded construction project (exceeding \$2 million in budget) on Clemson's horizon will be funded and will thus foster the presence of art on campus. The Atelier group has received great enthusiasm from its onset: from President Barker, the university administration, and faculty, to deans of the various colleges. Dave Detrich pointedly shared that without the support, trust, and enthusiasm gained from the Master Planners Office and the Dean's, faculty and students from the College of Agriculture, Forestry, and Life Sciences (CAFLS), the success of the project would not have

The new Life Sciences Facility was the first of these interdepartmental projects with the team effort composed of both the Art Department and CAFLS students. They were given the creative license and freedom to develop the project from the first meeting, drafting the initiative's mission and guiding principles, to the building's opening ceremony, complete with a Clemson "orange" red carpet, fireworks, and the Tiger mascot.

The student group, led by Art Department Professor Dave Detrich, Senior Lecturer, Joey Manson, and Lee Gallery Director, Denise Woodward-Detrich, which meets once a week and is comprised of 12-15 students each semester. It began in 2012 with 6 visual arts students and 6 life science students, but as the projects have expanded and evolved, so has the team. It is currently comprised of students representing the different areas of study that are directly related to the research explored in each proposed building and public art site. With new projects around the corner, the group now boasts student representatives from each of Clemson's five colleges. Students are recommended and recruited by each college's administration and faculty based on

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significant academic achievement, involvement, and ambition.


This project is "Uniquely Clemson" in that it is student driven: "By students, for students." To date, over 28 students have been involved. They come on board for various reasons; from helping to bring art to campus that expresses "freedom and creativity" in their program, to getting experience in cross-disciplinary research leaving a unique legacy at Clemson. They value finding an avenue to be involved in getting experience in the field they may one day like to work in, learning about collaborative art initiatives, and community planning. Students play a role in every level of the process from research, to proposal, to implementation. They learn important skills about the ins and outs of funding, budgeting educational research, administrative communication, and public impact.

One of the many goals of Creative Inquiry is to bring students together from varied academic disciplines. From the beginnings of Atelier InSite none could foresee the degree to which these student would learn from and impact each other. The faculty dedicated the first few Creative Inquiry class sessions to this alone. The students came in prepared to share the basics of their educational backgrounds; Art students gave a presentation about the fundamental principles of art and art criticism and then gave the stage to the Life Science students who gave lessons on the basics of Biology and Life Sciences related research. The art students provided insight to the art historical influences, contemporary impact, creative technique, and overall aesthetic coherence to the art submitted, while the life science students provided the knowledge of the sciences and empirical research. This critical exercise started the important conversation of how the work in the space could be contingent upon the research done

Atelier InSite is not only a unique project because of its student centeredness, influential breadth, and promise of prodigious and long-term educational and community impact; it is unique in its unprecedented devotion to interdisciplinary collaboration. Detrich stressed why shared ideas, communication, and collaboration throughout the project's entirety is so important, "This is not only by students, for students, but it is derived from a small collective for a very large public collective. When we enter an art museum or gallery, we make a conscious decision to be there, and in some ways, through interpretive material, etc., are guided in how to look at and interact with the art. [When we, in this project] propose and install public art, we in essence make that decision for each person; we decide where it goes and what they will encounter in their daily routine on campus. We endeavor to disarm apprehension about art in the public realm. This is why it is so critical to involve them –the administration, the students, and the faculty at all levels. This is an inclusive enterprise where everyone needs to be accounted for in some capacity... it is critical to give them ownership, otherwise we could

never be remotely successful." The process of selecting an artist for a new space starts with a student led converation with deans, faculty, and departmental heads, beginning with the question "what kind of work would be coherent in the physical space and accurately reflect the research of that program/department?" Students then send out a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) call to artists world wide, utilizing the established mission, vision, and guiding principles they initially composed as a guide. Typically hundreds of RFQ's flow in and the students research each artist's work, discussing disciplinary relevance and contemporary aesthetic ingenuity. Once the number is narrowed down, the Master Planner's Office, the Deans of the participating college, facilities staff, and the departmental faculty and students are asked to join the conversation. The students then contact a small number of selected artists and request they send a fully budgeted and modeled proposal. It is then that one of these artists gets to play a role in a lasting legacy of Site-Specific Public Art on the Clemson campus.

The artist for the very first Atelier InSite Creative Inquiry project is San Francisco based artist, Klari Reis. Her artwork, "The

Reis received her MFA and Associate Research Fellowship from City and Guilds of London Art School in London, England. She also holds a BA from University of California at Davis and an AA from University of California at Santa Barbara. Her finished work will be comprised of 600 individualized paintings embedded in laboratory Petri dishes of varying sizes. Each of these paintings composed of powders, acrylics, dyes, and plastics has a unique aesthetic and different title. The artist has invited members of the Clemson community to participate in the project by soliciting title suggestions on a blog site. Responses on the site have ignited conversations based on individualized perception: What do you see in this abstraction? What emotive response do these colors evoke?

These brilliantly colored and characterized organisms have the capacity to intrigue any scientist, inspire any artist. They bubble, froth, and erupt in every color and organic form imaginable. The forms and colors divide and grow like cells, explode like galaxies, mushroom like fungus, branch

like capillaries, pool like blood, bead like dew, spiral like the iris of an eye, buzz with the electricity of a neon fluorescent, flower like a rose, and sizzle like the yoke of an egg. The artist will be on campus Apr. 21-25 to install the work on site. The dedication for the project will take place on April 25 at 1:30pm. The public is invited and encouraged to attend. Klari's other work can be found at the dailydish.com and a link to her blog can be found at clemsongenus. blogspot.com

The steam of this engine has been chugging away since the conversation began in 2012. Future projects have already left the station and projects have been planned out past 2017. Besides the Atelier InSite project for upcoming Life Sciences Facility dedication, the campus will next get to enjoy an installation outside of Lee Hall III, the young academic facility for Foundation Art, Architecture studios, and Landscape Architecture. The RFQ, which is the international artist invitational letter and call for qualifications and has been publicized for the placement of an artwork in front of the newly constructed Lee III. Artists worldwide have submitted nearly 200 applications for the outdoor site. The installation is slated for March 2015.

A project for the The Watt Family Innovation Center is currently being researched by the group and will be built near the recently constructed Academic Success Center and Cooper Library. It will be centered on academic collaboration and student engagement. The balance will enhance academic, scholarship and athletic programs, most specifically for the colleges of Health, Education, and Human Development; and Engineering and Science. The Creative Inquiry team has already brought engineering students on board for this initiative and the breadth of disciplinary background has never been so diverse. Future projects a few years out include the Spaulding Paolozzi

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Center at Clemson's Architecture program Charleston location, a project for the Business and Behavioral Science College, and the proposed construction a Campus Core Project near the current Clemson House.

This "Uniquely Clemson" project has already gained notoriety from public campuses across the nation. While other Top 20 institutions indeed have initiatives for funding public art on campus, Clemson alone allows for the initiative to be a student driven project, placing an admirable faith in the professionalism, creativity, and ambition of their students. The legacy that it brings

to the Clemson campus is the first of many innovative strides that will leave a cultural thumbprint on a proud, prospering, and ever progressing institution and continues to build on Thomas Green Clemson's view of "The Beautiful Arts – the magic bonds which unite all ages and nations".

Clemson University in Clemson, SC, Offers Works by Adrienne Lichliter

The Center for Visual Arts at Clemson University, in Clemson, SC, is presenting *Restrain*, *Resensitize*, an MFA Thesis exhibition by Adrienne Lichliter, on view in the Lee Gallery, through Apr. 11, 2014. An Artist Talk will be given on Apr. 9, from 2:30-3pm, with a reception held on Apr. 11, from 6-8pm

The exhibit showcases the MFA creative research and final thesis of printmaking graduate student, Adrienne Lichliter.

Lichliter uses a unique printing process, implementing techniques with wood and copper, allowing for the natural media, the grain, notches, and wearing of the wood as well as the patina finish of the metal, to surface in the work, creating a swarming dynamic of textural intricacies and depth of delicate mark making. She allows the visual effects of the reactive material to work with and against the sensitive marking of her hand to create a conversational push and pull of visual focus and to highlight the rich and quiet vibrancy of the medium.

The artists writes, "The artwork hovers between paradoxes: dissolve and formation, density and void, focal point and dispersion, accident and intention." By enhancing the viewer's experience of the essence of the medium in a "modest and restrained aesthetic," the emphasis shifts from a traditional object-subject matter to

a relinquished revelry of the spontaneity and honesty in the mark of the artist's hand. This is Lichliter's sincere directive, "[that] there is potency in something that can be comfortably indecisive and unclear. With art that resists assertion and clarity, I hope to re-sensitize the viewer."

The visual production is a small part of the research and creative development pur-

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sued in the two and a half year of a students graduate study in pursuit of a Master of Fine Arts Degree at Clemson University. Students explore concepts, purposes of intent, art historical discourse, personal histories, and new processes, creating a conceptual foundation for their visual work. For the artist, this is an ever evolving and essential process in their creative research.

At the end of each semester the Lee Gallery showcases artwork of undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in the Department of Art academic program. Students are required to present a final thesis of their creative research in a professional exhibition format as part of their degree fulfillment. Artists included in exhibitions are asked to deliver a public presentation about the content, inspiration and historical context of their work to the general public. Artists' presentations serve to provide the community with an access point for understanding artistic research practice and individual motivations for creating visual art.

Clemson University in Clemson, SC, Offers Works by BFA Art Students

The Center for Visual Arts at Clemson University, in Clemson, SC, will present *Look Here, Not There*, a BFA senior student exhibition, on view in the Lee Gallery, from Apr. 14 - 24, 2014. Artist Talks and a reception will be held on Apr. 18, starting at 6:30pm. Each artist will give a five-minute talk about their work.

The exhibit showcases the culmination of senior studio research for the graduating class of 2014, including oil paintings by Ashley Davis, Georgia Haas, and T. J. Fletcher; drawings by Chi-Chen Lee; photography by Sarah Phillips and Elisabeth Smith; and woodcuts by Annemarie Weekley.

The gallery walls will be brimming with the work of seven up and coming artists to be, in one of the largest senior showcases for Clemson's Art Department. While the styles and breadth of work - paintings, photos, and prints - are unique in their own right, this group of emerging artists shares an underlying perspective and tactic of abstraction in many manifestations. Many of the works on view in the exhibition rely on perspective and the conceptual route of abstraction, dissipation, and deconstruction as inspiration for their creative research. Works in the exhibit explore a range of ideas starting from a reformation of a dissipated memory, to the annihilation of a constructed notion of one's self-awareness; from the abstracted re-proposition of a minimalistic movement to the satirical breakdown of societal intemperance.

Other works explore a dispersion of sheltered confines for a radical immersion into nature or the transcendence of the plague of disease; even the stripping of the non essential in order to revel in the grain and simplicity in a natural medium. With the dynamism of color, angles, and abstracted compilations of broken barriers, these seven students have put forth a challenge for the active approach and responsibility of the viewer to absorb.

The visual production is only a piece of the research and creative development pursued in the four year Clemson BFA program. Students explore concepts, purposes of intent, art historical discourse, personal histories, and new processes, creating a conceptual foundation for their visual work. For the artist, this is an ever evolving and essential process.



The Chapman Cultural Center in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting an exhibit of kites by award-winning collector, Chuck Holmes, on view throughout the Center, through Apr. 30, 2014.

Spartanburg is soaring, and two-time

national award winning kite flier Chuck Holmes is the wind behind its sails.

A Spartanburg resident and life-long kitemaker, Holmes is an invaluable part of the Spartanburg Soaring! initiative spearheaded

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by Chapman Cultural Center. In 2013, he and his wife Karen approached the Center with a proposal to exhibit his collection of over 100 kites. What ensued was more than just an exhibit, and planning began for Spartanburg Soaring! - a community-wide initiative to celebrate Spartanburg's sky-high successes using the kite as its theme.

"When Chuck first approached us, I saw more than just a passionate enthusiast with a unique art form, I saw a symbol," Chapman Cultural Center President and CEO Jennifer Evins said. "These kites represent the playfulness, the brilliant diversity, and the skyward growth that are so characteristic of Spartanburg."

Holmes' collection features threedimensional cellular kites, compound kites, bowed kites, and, his specialty, the della Porta - an Italian kite that reminds Holmes of framed artwork whipping through the skies. Originally intended for either lifting fireworks and lanterns at night or the development of manned flight, the della Porta is one of the oldest recorded Western kites. "The della Porta is rectangular with the height one and a half times the width so it's like a portrait," said Holmes. "I also like that the kite is very easy to assemble and flies beautifully.

Within his extensive collection of kites, around 40 of them are handcrafted by Holmes himself. One such kite is a Bermudian, an octagonal kite he built over 10 years ago using only red, white, and blue. "I like the colors, but I also like the neatness of the frame and the fittings I made that allow it to be easily adjusted and flown."



Having flown and competed internationally, Holmes has more than just handmade kites, he has compiled many from kitemakers around the world. Holmes boasts approximately four kites made by Bobby Stanfield, a national kite-making champion who is well-known for his impressive cellular kites of the '80s and '90s. "He uses black borders to accent the other colors," said Holmes. "And his framing and his machined fittings are amazing."

Several of the kites in the exhibit at Chapman Cultural Center were crafted by members of his family. They hang side-byside with those made by world-class kiters - and you'd never know the difference. One kite in the exhibit was crafted by his youngest daughter Allison Holmes Hoffman. It is a rokkaku kite - one used for battles - with a cat's face in black and purple. "She used a drawing from a pumpkin carving kit," recalled Holmes. "It is one of the best kites for showing contrast. The black stops almost all of the light, but the purple glows with

Kiting is a multi-generational hobby, inciting pure joy in youngsters with plenty of energy to spare and fond memories in more experienced fliers. For Holmes, this is more than true. His passion for flying began



around age 12 when his father returned home from a business trip with a simple, plastic kite. Years later, while dating his now-wife Karen, he discovered his soonto-be father-in-law was a fellow enthusiast. Eventually, he passed down his passion to daughters Allison and Lauren, and hopes to keep the tradition with his grandchildren.

"I would like them to realize that this is something that they can do together," Holmes said. It may be a daytime family activity, but, as with Holmes, it can turn into a life-long hobby and tradition. "Although my kites look intricate today, the first kites I made and flew were very simple. We have to start simple and then we progress."

Kiting is more than just about playfulness and togetherness, it also engages students in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). STEM is a national movement to engage young people in fields of study where workers and innovators are needed, developing the world's next generation of scientific pioneers.

"I just read the book Last Child in the Woods by Richard Louv. In it, the author talks about how being in nature is good for health, allows children to have unstructured play that leads to creativity, provides a calming effect, and more," Holmes said. "I suggest that all of these are important for artists, scientists, businesspeople, all of us." Flying also provides a free, practical course in aerodynamics, and building kites requires a hefty amount of mathematical calculation. "What diameter spar does one need to support a certain surface area? What weight will support that surface area? What angles give stability?"

Holmes also notes that scientist Benjamin Franklin, inventor of the radio Guglielmo Marconi, the Wright Brothers, telephone creator Alexander Graham Bell, and many other historical figures utilized kites for experiments, designs, and inspiration.

In addition to STEM is the movement to incorporate Art/Design into the mix-STEAM. "Since I have started to incorporate art into my designs, I have felt even more motivated. I am sure that STEAM can only strengthen the sciences."

Holmes' kite exhibit, although the original catalyst for Spartanburg Soaring!, is one of two major components for the initiative, the other being the International Kite Festival, which was held on Mar. 29, 2014. Other events and activities are planned for Spartanburg Soaring!, with over two dozen local partners collaborating on this community-wide celebration of what's good about the city. Spartanburg Soaring!'s purpose as a whole is to build civic pride, engage ultural curiosity, and promote active play something kite fliers know all about.

Jane Allen Nodine offered the following statement, "Memory, as related to record, trace elements, or the vestige of some past activity, are central to my work and result in various forms that may be objective or non-objective. Attention to surface with detailed foundation layers places an emphasis on the appearance of work as I strive to attract the viewer in for closer observation. I describe my approach to making art as a process of excavation and construction. Visual and conceptual clues reveal ideas and images that emerge in both anticipated and unexpected ways but destination is never the same twice. There is no map, no definitive ending or preconceived plan of travel, only a sense that something waits to be revealed."

Nodine offered the following about Thermal Response, "After many years of using acrylic based mediums I became

dissatisfied with the synthetic and plastic barrier quality of the material. Seeking a more satisfying solution I came to wax for its malleability and aesthetic qualities. I was drawn to the cerebral and physiological breadth of beeswax that has a rich history of application, symbolism, mystique and direct ties to the natural world. Years of working as a jewelry-metalsmith gave me a keen sense of heat as a tool, and the molten wax is satisfying as a medium that readily moves from a liquid state to a firm and durable material that can be cut,

"My current work takes a magnified look at surfaces and patterns that develop in nature, particularly in thick liquids," adds Nodine. "Viscid, having an adhesive and sticky quality, is central to many of the pooling patterns cast in molten hot wax and cooled into rigid layers. Colors reflect elements of the natural world and the transformation of aging."

Jane Allen Nodine is Assistant Chair of Fine Arts and Communication Studies at the University of South Carolina Upstate where she is a Professor and director of the Curtis R. Harley Gallery. Recognized with numerous awards, Nodine received



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

North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, Presents Contemporary Latino Prints and Children's Book Illustrations

Beginning April 13, 2014, the North Carolina Museum of Art (NCMA), in Raleigh, NC, presents Estampas de la raza/ Prints for the People: The Romo Collection, a series of 61 bold, colorful prints that chronicle the unique heritage, history, and experience of contemporary Mexican American and Latino artists, on view in the East Building, Level B, Meymandi Exhibi tion Gallery, through July 27, 2014. Concurrently, the Museum presents Tall Tales and Huge Hearts: Raúl Colón, an exhibition of children's book illustrations by Raúl Colón, on view in East Building, Gallery 2, through July 27, 2014.

Estampas (Spanish for prints) de la raza (the race or the people, often referring to Mexican and US heritage) is the first comprehensive examination of contemporary Mexican American and Latino prints and their place in the context of American art and the history of printmaking.

Ranging in date from 1984 to 2011, the works in Estampas de la raza explore social, political, and economic issues, as well as issues of identity and race often faced by Mexican American and Latino artists. The exhibition is organized according to the following themes:

Identity: Prints in this category portray the search for Mexican American identity. These artists may declare independence and strength through the use of bold colors and subjects with steely gazes; acknowledge mixed heritage and the blending of Mexi-

can and American identities; or address the evolving identity of Americans, particularly those of Mexican American heritage. Other prints attempt to define or comment on one's own cultural identity—showing pride in a particular culture, people, or place, or depicting individuals in tension with their heritage and cultural status.

Struggle: Many of these prints examine Mexican Americans' and Latino Americans' struggles for equality and labor rights. For example, artist Ester Hernandez's darkly humorous Sun Raid illustrates the continuing struggle for migrant field workers' rights, while Michael Menchaca's Cuando ..., an image of sombrero-wearing cats crossing—and drowning in—the Rio Grande, uses symbols to bring awareness to the issue of US-Mexico border control and politics. Several prints explore other issues, such as drug use.

Tradition, Culture, Memory: Many of these prints examine themes of tradition. For example, Angel Rodriguez-Diaz's Stepping into the Light—Quinceañera, shows a girl participating in the centuries-old cultural tradition of the quinceañera, when a young woman celebrates the move from childhood to adulthood on her 15th birthday. Other prints illustrate the melding of Mexican and American cultures, featuring an image of a Mexican symbol—such as a flag or figure—paired with an American item or theme. Finally, several of the prints are inspired by family memories, with images of family members cooking favorite foods or playing music.

Icons: Hispanic cultural icons, such as artist Frida Kahlo, political figure Che Guevara, and Catholic saint the Virgin of Guadalupe, appear frequently in these prints. "Artists depict such images to venerate significant icons as well as to promote a particular social or political viewpoint," explains Jennifer Dasal, associate curator of contemporary art at the NCMA. Other cultural icons represented include Golden Age Mexican film stars and luchadores, Mexican freestyle wrestlers.

Other voices: These prints may consist of abstract, eclectic images; comment on more widespread economic or social issues; or show a blending of narratives that transcends culture, time, or location.

"The prints in *Estampas de la raza* are certainly remarkable and thought-provoking simply from an aesthetic viewpoint, but because of their cultural and political content, we also expect the prints to stir up conversation among our visitors," says Dasal. "We

hope that the prints—with their bold colors and striking imagery—spark interest in the artists' fascinating heritage and culture and the issues that continue to concern them today."

In conjunction with Estampas de la raza, the Museum presents Tall Tales and Huge Hearts: Raúl Colón. Colón, who was raised in Puerto Rico and now lives in New York City, has illustrated over 30 children's books featuring thrilling legends and heartthem Doña Flor, Tomás and the Library Lady, and Jill Biden's book Don't Forget, God Bless Our Troops.

Colón's watercolor, pencil, and etched works dazzle with their charm, depth, and bright color. Since beginning his artistic career in the 1980s, Colón has received numerous honors, including the Pura Belpré Award, which honors a Latino/Latina writer or illustrator whose work best celebrates the Latino cultural experience in a work of children's literature.

A selection of books illustrated by Colón will be available at reading areas in the exhibition gallery.

Estampas de la raza/Prints for the People: The Romo Collection was organized by the McNay Art Museum.

Artspace in Raleigh, NC, Features **Works by Artists Association Members**

Artspace, a non-profit visual art center in downtown Raleigh, NC, is excited to present several new exhibitions centered on artwork by Artspace Artists Association (AAA) members in its Gallery 1 and Upfront and Lobby Galleries this April. Opening receptions will be held on the Apr. 4, from 6-10pm.

Catherine Thornton's April exhibition Friends, Sense and Non-sense (Apr. 4-26, 2014) in the Upfront Gallery features her imaginatively conjured animals and human figures. She creates relationships to identify what she calls the "crossing of the senses," when emotions are not simply happy or sad. "In the middle of sad, sometimes we laugh. In the middle of happy, we cry," says Thornton in her artist statement. In the situations that art conjures, Thornton asks whether these reactions are sense or nonsense, and whether friendships can help sort out the difference. Her ceramic sculptures are accomplishments in striking realism, while the imagined world they inhabit hums with whimsy and eccentricity.

Thornton earned a BFA in painting and sculpture from Longwood College (currently Longwood University), VA. She has been the recipient of numerous awards and her work has been included in numerous solo and group exhibitions. Thornton's work has also been published in Lark Publication's 500 Cups.

Artspace exhibits all new paintings by prominent abstract painter Ashlynn Browning (Apr. 4-26, 2014) in the show New Geometric Constructs. Her geometric abstractions, painted with sumptuous strokes of paint, are hybrids of geometric forms and her own intuitive, painterly process, on view in the Lobby Gallery.

As the artist writes in her statement, "Some of my paintings read as 'places,' of both a geographic and psychological nature. In others, geometric forms – some precarious and toppling, some bold and assured – function as stand-ins for figures. Each of these figures displays an individual personality, mood and implied narrative."

In Browning's most recent work, she stacks forms into painterly grids, ladders, and walls. She retains the hexagons and webs of her previous body of work, but, as the artist states, they are "partially buried beneath chunkier forms that play with weight and architecture." She continues with the concept of opposing forceswhether expressed with color, a range of painterly textures, or linear variations. Her multiple stages that result in a finished work contribute to the organic feel and complex surfaces.

Browning has received grants and residency fellowships from the Joan Mitchell Foundation, United Arts Council, Vermont Studio Center, and Virginia Center for Creative Arts. She has been selected to attend the International Artists' Symposium in Neustadt an der Weinstraße, Germany during the summer of 2014.

This exhibition brings together work by artists Courtney McCracken and Tracy Spencer-Stonestreet, women whose innovative voices both take on the traditions of Southern culture. continued above on next column to the right | They ask what it means to both inherit and

make traditional expectations of home and femininity your own in the 21st century, sometimes visualizing as a literal burden or entanglement. A reception will be held on Apr. 4, from 6-10pm.

Tracy Spencer-Stonestreet shows artwork that she created during her 2013 Artspace residency. Her work, entitled Dragging,

involved her tying pieces of an entire formal dining room set with ropes to her body and filming the walk. "Part of the aesthetic of the resulting video," the artist explains, "is the real effort that it takes me to pull such a load with just my body." She will exhibit the video and photo diptychs of select objects before and after being dragged on the walk down a rural road in Wake County. Viewers may consider what metaphors the scrapes and breaks on the plates, silverware, and doilies may represent in terms of labor, power, femininity, wealth, and desire.

Courtney McCracken's newest series integrates sculpture, installation, and drawing. She uses laborious processes, often associated with feminine, domestic activity, such as casting, crochet, and cut paper. Mc-Cracken's work begins a dialogue about the domestic home and the idea of ownership. She adds her own artistic twist to recognizable objects such as doilies, rugs, and chandeliers. Viewers may note the imbalance or subtle dangers that she adds to ordinarily nurturing objects, implied by embroidering "forgetting" in red on a handkerchief, or weaving a doily into a sculptural, tangled three-dimensional object that could not ever lay flat on a surface like the doily that inspired it.

An Educators' Discussion with Courtney McCracken will be held at Artspace on Apr. 5, from 10:30am-12:30pm. The event, exclusively for high school teachers, will begin with a gallery talk with McCracken and will be followed by a roundtable discussion about how Artspace can support high school teachers. Refreshments will be provided and this is a free event.

Courtney McCracken (b. 1990, Jacksonville, FL) received her BFA in Sculpture at the University of North Florida. She is currently enrolled as an MFA candidate at

the University of Georgia in Athens, where she lives and works. She was granted the Graduate Dean Award and looks forward to instructing classes at the Lamar Dodd School of Art within the year. Her research includes sculpture, installation, and drawing. Laborious processes such as casting, crochet, cut paper, and metalsmithing are used to create a dialogue concerning the domestic home and the idea of possession. Her work has been shown regularly throughout the Southeast region, including at the National Conference for Cast Iron Art at Sloss Furnaces in Birmingham, AL.
