# University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC, Offers Several MFA Thesis Exhibitions

The University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC, is and will present several MFA Thesis exhibitions, on view in the McMaster Gallery, through Apr. 26, 2024

Annually, the School of Visual Art and Design at USC presents thesis exhibitions that encompass work by candidates who have completed their final year of the Studio Art MFA program.

On view from Apr. 1 - 5, will be Labor of Love, featuring works by Jordan Dantzler. A reception will be held on Apr. 2, from 6-8pm.

Dantzler offered the following Artist's Statement, "As an artist deeply concerned with the narratives of Blackness and womanhood, my work is a testament to the power of storytelling and representation. My latest project, Labor of Love, emerges from a personal journey into the lives of the women (and girls) in my maternal lineage, including my mother, grandmothers, aunts, sister, cousin, and nieces. This exploration is not just an act of remembrance for those who have passed, but a conscious effort to honor the living, to give them their flowers now. Through this body of work, I aim to celebrate and center the women in my family-those who have shaped me into who I am today. This project is driven by a profound respect and love for these ladies, who frequently place the needs of others above their own. Labor of Love is a tribute to the strength, resilience, and enduring spirit of these remarkable women, serving as a mirror to their invaluable contributions and sacrifices."

Dantzler, a native of Rock Hill, SC, discovered her love for visual art early on, participating in programs like the ST-ARTS program at Winthrop University. She pursued her passion at Spelman College, earning a Bachelor of Arts in Visual Art with a minor in Curatorial Studies. Dantzler's journey includes prestigious art internships at institutions such as the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, ZuCot Gallery, and

Samantha Reali is an interdisciplinary artist who analyzes her unique perception of personal relationships through dream-like narratives. Her practice and personal life are fueled by introspective curiosity, making creating art an act of intimate self-discovery. An exploration of dreams and memory stands in the forefront as the artist translates complex narratives into surreal, saturated, and ambiguous images.

Reali was born and raised in Staten Island, NY, where she grew up consistently interested in the magic of creating. She attended SUNY Cortland in Cortland, New York, earning a BFA in studio art with honors. She is pursuing her MFA in Studio Art at the University of South Carolina.

On view from Apr. 15 - 19, is the exhibition Chasing the Unknown, featuring works by Anna Byars. A reception will be held on Apr. 18, from 5:30-7pm.

Byars offered the following Artist's Statement, "Through my work, I am visualizing what transcendence feels like. To transcend is to go beyond what is tangible and known and to be enveloped within a fleeting feeling that becomes imprinted on the mind. For me, light and brightly saturated colors have always been the gateway to this feeling. Light can appear hard or soft but is never tangible. My work is created through spontaneous, meditative line work to create bright, colorful, and reflective imagery. I am bringing the colors of the natural world into one space to feel the vibrations of color and light.

Anna Byars is an artist based in Columbia, SC. She grew up in Lexington, SC, and received a BA in Studio Art and Art History at the College of Charleston. Her work has been shown in exhibitions at the Southern Graphics Conference, Sawtooth Visual Arts Gallery, and the Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art. Byars' primarily focuses in printmaking and is currently exploring the idea of transcendence within her work. On view from Apr. 22 - 26, will be the exhibit, This Must Be Ektachrome, featuring works by Addison Graham. Graham offered the following Artist's Statement, "I have had a profound connection to nature since childhood, growing up exploring the Ouachita and Ozark mountains in Arkansas. However, my interactions with nature coexist with human-made structures such as power lines, architectural features, and pathways. Nature has been affected by human interaction, including buildings, walkways, and invasive species. A location is not simply an aesthetically pleasing location with waterfalls and trees but a place for contemplation, reflection, and memorable phenomenon." 'Emotions and the environment intertwine to create transformative, intangible experiences. How can a landscape evoke continued above on next column to the right nostalgia? How can emotions be so powerful that they defy description? As an artist, I use a range of mediums to explore these questions, choreographing colors, shapes, and light. I use various materials and colors to create diverse environments and reflect the complexities of life. My techniques include photography, printmaking, and sculpture," added Graham.

"My work explores landscapes, optics, memories, paradoxical thoughts, and psychological experiences influenced by nature. It is interdisciplinary, and I often blend different mediums to communicate the context of my artwork. To begin my creative process, I venture outdoors and capture Ektachrome photographs with a Bell and Howell Stereo Realist camera from the 1950s-60s. These serve as standalone pieces and inspiration for my work in different mediums.

Addison Graham, a fine artist from Fort Smith, AR, obtained her BFA from Arkansas Tech University in 2020. Actively engaged in the Arkansas Society of Printmakers and serving as president of the Artist Guild on campus, Graham has exhibited her work in numerous galleries and museums across Arkansas and internationally in Taiwan. Notable accomplishments include participation in the inaugural student solo exhibition at the Fort Smith Regional Art Museum in 2019 and being selected as the sole printer for visiting artist Mark Dion in 2023. Graham's diverse experiences include interning at The Half and Half, teaching printmaking workshops at the Columbia Museum of Art, and working as a graduate instructor of record for drawing and painting classes at the School of Visual Art and Design
