A self-taught artist, Cassandra Gillens' (Beaufort, SC) paintings feature silhouette figures saturated with vivid colors and simplified forms. Born in Massachusetts, her earliest memories are drawing with colored chalks on the sidewalks of Roxbury. As a child, she spent time in South Carolina with family. Upon returning to South Carolina, she became closely connected with the people and culture she loved so much.

Gillens' paintings depict her fondest memories as a child where everyday life becomes a celebration. Her talent portrays a culture filled with warmth, gentle personalities, close families, and all the things that make her beloved land so special.

Gillens' work is collected throughout the United States and Europe. She is part of the permanent collection of the Myrtle Beach Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC and the Harvey Gantt Center in Charlotte, NC. Her work was also featured in the Nicholas Sparks' movie "Nights in Rodanthe."

Lyon moved to King, NC, with her artist husband Scott Burdick to escape the hectic city life and experience a different part of the country. Surrounded by nature, her studio allows her the space and privacy to grow as an artist.

Painter and mixed media artist Terry Thirion's (Charlotte, NC) abstract body of work intrigues the viewer and invites them to discover the little surprises embedded in each piece. Growing up on the farmlands of Belgium, she spent a lot of time on sites with her father who was a stonecarver. She now works from her studio in Charlotte.

Thirion graduated from Parmentier School of Design in Brussels, Belgium. She collects reference materials by sketching and photographing on site. Through her work, she expresses a fundamental sentiment of light and joy, represented in bold colors, a sudden curve, or random marks. Her subjects range from the high spirits of drumming circles to the silent play of light on a secluded river's edge, or the intimacy of a single tree in a community park.

Exuberance is balanced by a certain melancholy for the disappearance of older architecture, natural landscapes, and traditional communities. This sensitivity is revealed in her realistic and representational works that are driven by world events and common life experiences. They include the human figure, architectural elements, and found objects in nature.

Thirion states, "Each piece has its own challenges. Sometimes it's a mood I want to convey, sometimes an unwillingness to stick to the norm."

Encaustic artist Felicia van Bork (Davidson, NC) creates artwork that explores origin and evolution of consciousness. Her encaustic portraits featured in her body of work Portraits Just In Time use exquisite color and texture, drawn from observation, that result in spirit and energy.

Artist Susan Lyon (King, NC) was inspired to take drawing classes after seeing a television show featuring Georgia O'Keefe. She studied painting at the American Academy of Art in Chicago and was an active member in Chicago's Palette and Chisel Club. It was there that she first began exhibiting her work, and at 23, she was the youngest winner of their prestigious Gold Medal.

Lyon's body of work Seeing the Figure through Color and Form, depicts her true love of painting the figure. She draws inspiration from painters such as Zorn, Fechin, Sorolla, and Celia Beaux. Her style is realistic with as much impressionistic color as possible. She likes to combine wide sweeping strokes in the background with small, subtle details in the center of interest. Lyon's technique uses wet paint on wet to start and wet on dry for finishing touches.
