
May 17 - 19 "Spring in Saluda" (Saluda, NC)

Specializing in prototypes, one-offs and custom fabrication in a variety of mediums. Roger Carter produces functional and static mixed media works using reclaimed/repurposed materials. He currently lives and works in Morganton.

Tom Denne is a lifelong woodworker and native of Lancaster, NY. He holds both BS and MS degrees in Industrial Arts Education from Buffalo State, Buffalo, NY and taught woodworking at Washington Park High School in Racine, WI, for 30 years.

For many years Denne has enjoyed turning and making wooden furniture for friends and family. He has been practicing segmented turning since 2005.

"These turnings involve 100s of pieces using varied woods combining the use of color and intricate designs," says Denne. John Ferguson says, "From 1977 to 1987 my late teens and early twenties were steeped in an old Appalachian mountain culture. The cabinet shop where I apprenticed for 8 of those 10 years was founded in 1872 by Felix Barr after he walked from Jefferson, NC, to Galax, VA, bought a lathe head and tail stock, strapped it on his back and walked home. When I arrived in 1979, Barr Cabinet Shop was owned and run by his son Basil Barr. He was 85 years old and referred to by some as "Colonel", which had been his retiring rank from the army. Ferguson has enjoyed a lifelong love of woodworking and has been designing and building furniture for over 20 years. Blaine Johnston grew up surrounded by wood. His father ran a sawmill; two of his uncles run furniture companies; and his grandfather and great grandfather ran another. He also spent much of the time in his youth in the forest. During a break from college he went to work for Habitat for Humanity and ended up working for

them for two years. During this time he worked on more than 25 houses and found his passions for working wood and for helping others. Before he left, a friend let him build a table in his cabinet shop and his interest in furniture was piqued. His furniture education came from Haywood Community College and was complimented by his sculpture studies at Western Carolina University.
