

Last Month's Cover

Last month we featured works by Colin Quashie, which are being presented in the exhibit, *The Plantation (Plan-ta-shun)*, which is still on view at Redux Contemporary Art Center in Charleston, SC, through May 6, 2012.

I expected to get some reaction due to the nature of the images, but I did not expect such a jump in downloads of the paper which took place in April.

Since Dec. 2011 we have been averaging over 80,000 downloads a month - a great reaction to our electronic newspaper. Linda and I even speculated - well more like dreamed of a day when we would see that number reach 100,000 - ten times what our circulation used to be when we were printing the paper. So, you might imagine our excitement when in just 9 days in April we had gone over 90,000 downloads. We had reached another step in the ladder leading to that magic number. Of course the pattern of downloads is that most come in the first ten days of the month and then they trickle down to sometimes nothing.

But something different was happening in April. By mid-month I put out an update on my Facebook page that announced that we had reach 100,000 downloads on Friday the 13th - amazing! I thought of the movie *Jaws* and said to myself - "We're gonna need a bigger goal".

Was this all due to Colin Quashie's images? I can't say it was and I can't say it wasn't, but it's the first thing people see when they get ready to download the paper - so I think he gets a lot of the credit and so do those folks who help spread the download link of the paper around to friends and contacts by e-mail.

So, in the last 25 years, we've gone

from printing 5,000 copies of the paper and spreading them around Charleston, SC, to eventually distributing 10,000 copies throughout selected areas of the Carolinas to now having 100,000 copies downloaded in the Carolinas and beyond.

I'm glad I'm not delivering those papers anymore and yet, in some ways wish I was still out there at times on the delivery trail. It wasn't as bad as some people imagined and it took me to places a lot of you have never been.

End of story - you would think, but it's not. The downloads just kept coming. Somedays it would only be 120, but many days it would be 700 - 1,000 and then there was day when it was 3,500. I can't give you the total just yet, but it's up there, way beyond anything I expected for an April issue. May and October have always been our biggest months.

Of course our April 2012 issue was our biggest issue to date, with 79 pages - until this issue came along with 82 pages. Maybe the deal is - the bigger the paper - the bigger the audience. I don't know, but we'll see what happens this month and maybe we'll learn something about what's going on.

Taking Notice

Not all those downloads are coming from people in North and South Carolina. I'm sure at lot of you readers noticed the ad we had from the High Museum in Atlanta, GA, during the last 6 months. The exhibit they wanted to promote to our readers ended in April, but other folks noticed it. Like the good people at The Virginia Museum of Contemporary Art in Virginia Beach, VA. You can check out their ad on Page 17. I hope some of the

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Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Mary Whyte and Vaughn Sills

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, will present two special exhibitions including: Mary Whyte: Working South and Places for the Spirit: Traditional African American Gardens of the South, on view from May 4 through Sept. 9, 2012. In the Main Gallery, renowned watercolorist Mary Whyte captures the essence of vanishing blue-collar professions from across ten southern states in Working South. The Rotunda Gallery will feature the work of fine art photographer Vaughn Sills and her stunning collection of photographs documenting African American folk gardens and their creators in the exhibition Places for the Spirit.

"The pairing of these exhibitions underscores our mission to promote American art from a southern perspective. This is a splendid opportunity to discover the uniqueness of the South through the eyes of two stellar artists," stated Angela D. Mack, Executive Director.

Mary Whyte: Working South features 50 watercolor portraits, sketches, and drawings that focus on vanishing rural and industrial workforces that were once ubiquitous throughout the region but are now declining due to changes in our economy, environment, technology, and fashion. From the textile mill worker and tobacco farmer to the sponge diver and elevator operator, Whyte documents the range of southerners whose everyday labors have gone unheralded while keeping the South in business. By rendering these workers amid scenes of their rough-hewn lives, Whyte shares stories of the grace, strength, and dignity exemplified in these images of fading southern ways of life and livelihood. The exhibition is accompanied by a full-color publication that includes an introduction by the artist.

Whyte is a teacher and author whose figurative paintings have earned national recognition. A resident of Johns Island, SC, Whyte garners much of her inspiration from members of the Gullah community of coastal South Carolina, who number among her most prominent subjects. She has published several books, and her portraits are included in numerous corporate, private, and public collections, including the Gibbes Museum of Art.

Mary Whyte: Working South is sponsored by the member auxiliary group Gibbes, etc., BlueCross BlueShield of SC, TD Bank, and Charleston magazine.

Vaughn Sills began photographing folk gardens in 1987 after visiting Mrs. Bea Robinson's garden in Athens, GA. Sills recalls that she "became entranced by Bea's garden" and felt a magic or spirit

surrounding her. Over the next twenty years, Sills traveled throughout the Southeast and photographed over 150 yards and gardens - and often their creators. These gardens found in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina represent an important element of the American landscape that is quickly disappearing.

The landscapes that Sills documents have a unique historical significance due to the design elements and spiritual meanings that have been traced to the yards and gardens of American slaves and further back to their African heritage. The gardens are places to socialize and be creative, but they also have mystical purposes: bottles and plant pots are put on the tree branches or intentionally placed in the garden to capture evil spirits; pipes are placed vertically in the ground to allow the spirits of ancestors to communicate with the living. These seemingly whimsical arrangements are actually subtle and symbolic reminders of the divine in everyday life and the cycles of the natural world. The exhibition is accompanied by a catalog titled Places for the Spirit: Traditional African American Gardens.

A fine art and documentary photographer, Sills' work has been exhibited widely in museums and galleries. She has recently been awarded grants from the Massachusetts Cultural Council, the New England Foundation for the Arts, and the Polaroid Foundation. She is a professor of photography at Simmons College in

addition, the piece has become part of the City of North Charleston's Public Art Collection. T-shirts and posters featuring the winning design will be available for sale.

Barna gathers inspiration from the Impressionism and Post-impressionism art movements, as well as Art Nouveau, and cites Van Gogh, Toulouse-Lautrec, Gauguin, Monet, Degas, and Alphonse Mucha as artists she admires. Preferring to work in acrylic and oil, her work features vivid

colors, thick application of paint, distinctive brush strokes, and realistic subject matter, mainly people. Form and color are central to her aesthetic and shimmering surfaces and rich dabs of paint characterize her paintings. Her art is an emotional vision of the world. She uses color as a means to express feelings about a subject or her memories – a way to express emotion and communicate to the viewer a spiritual message.

Born in 1987 in Volgograd, Russia, Barna began her art education in high school. She received a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Painting and Art Education from Volgograd State University of Education in Russia. In 2008, Barna came to Charleston to work for the summer and learn about life in America. To her surprise, she fell in love with the city, the Carolina Lowcountry, and resident Josh Barna. After returning home to complete her education and the long process of legal immigration, Elena and Josh were married following her return to Charleston in 2009. She currently lives and works in North Charleston with Josh and their bull mastiff, Phoenix.










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






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
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30th North Charleston Arts Festival Takes Place Throughout North Charleston, SC - May 4 -12, 2012

Now in its 30th year, the North Charleston Arts Festival will take place May 4-12, 2012. The nine day event draws thousands of residents and visitors each year and is one of the most comprehensive arts festivals in the state, highlighting national, regional, and local artists and performers in the areas of Dance, Music, Theater, Visual Arts, Crafts, Photography, Media Arts, and Literature.

Organized by the City of North Charleston Cultural Arts Department, the festival strives to maintain the spirit of a public celebration with the mission of presenting a broad, multidiscipline event schedule that provides a wide range of performances, exhibitions, and activities for people of all ages and backgrounds. Many of the offerings are free, and those that are ticketed are moderately priced. Recognized by the Southeast Tourism Society as a Top 20 Event, the North Charleston Arts Festival offers something for everyone.

"The Arts Festival is truly a point of pride for the City of North Charleston," says North Charleston Mayor, Keith Summey. "It provides our residents and thousands of visitors with a myriad of opportunities to experience high quality entertainment, exhibits, and programming from every arts discipline in a variety of traditional and non-traditional settings."

The Arts Festival Main Event, held on Saturday, May 5, from 10am-4pm, and Sunday, May 6, from 2-5pm, at the North Charleston Performing Arts Center and Charleston Area Convention Center, offers free admission and parking to over forty performances on four themed stages: General Audience, Cultural Heritage, Youth Entertainment, and Bands. Other features include judged fine art and photography exhibits; the 12th annual South Carolina Palmetto Hands Fine Craft Exhibit; youth art from Charleston, Berkeley and Dorchester county students; the Lowcountry Gem & Mineral Society show and sale; the Village Antiques & Collectibles show; children's activities at Box City and Creation Stations; art & craft vendors, a food court, and much more.

The Festival continues with over fifty events throughout the week at various locations. In the Distance of the Dream – Works by Mariannic Parra, on view May 1 - 20, 2012. Following in the footsteps of French impressionist artists such as Claude Monet, Paul Signac, and Georges Seurat, Mariannic Parra seeks to explore dimensions of light. But, like more contemporary artists such as Dan Flavin and Walter di Maria, Parra's works move beyond the impressionists by using light as a medium. Her featured body of work includes landscape thematic paintings using natural materials, like volcanic sand and coal, and contemporary materials, such as plexiglass.

Pieces in the exhibit are inspired and accompanied by original poems by her husband, Jean Pierre Parra. Her work leaves us with an impression of luminosity and opens the door for the viewer to become part of the art experience and to work with the light, both natural and industrial, as it moves across the surface of the canvas throughout the day. Light enters each piece and becomes a part of the painting, creating movement and





draw you in, but from a distance, the gummy bears seem to be more interested in "sweet revenge" as they appear to slowly march toward you.

Fire by Amanda Williams, located at the North Charleston & American LaFrance Fire Museum and Educational Center Grounds, 4975 Centre Pointe Drive, on view May 4-12, 2012, daylight hours. Fire is as seducing as it is devastating. This installation invites the viewer to interact with one of nature's most dangerous elements by stepping inside of a giant "flame."

For the Birds by Kelley Wills, located at the green space at intersection of East Montague Ave. and Spruill Ave., on view May 4-12, 2012. Inspired by the idea of combining ordinary objects in unassuming and simple ways, this whimsical piece puts viewers face to face with a whistling "bird-man." The human-size creature sports the face of a man and the body of a bird.

II by Kevin Mclean, located at the Courtyards at Wescott, between 9284 & 9288 Asycough Road, on view May 4-12, 2012. Themes of contrast and duality are explored in this simple, yet sophisticated piece. A large, lead sphere appears to be wrapped in a white, stone obelisk. The simply massive, deadweight presence of the static sphere contrasts with the comparatively slender and fleetingly dynamic obelisk to create a truly inspiring form.

Peak by James Wine, located at Northwoods Park, 8348 Greenridge Road,

on view May 4-12, 2012, public park open daily. Organic in form, this piece is comprised of many geometrical shapes that coalesce to create a recognizable, but abstract, structure representative of a mountain peak. Mountains have always been dominating monuments in the land-scape. The peak of a mountain represents different things in many cultures. For some, reaching it is a physical achievement. For others, it represents the birth-place of spiritual enlightenment.

We Can Talk by John Jamison, located at the traffic circle at Wescott Blvd. & Oak Forest Blvd., on view May 4-12, 2012. Referencing antique sound machines and childhood memories of talking with friends via string and tin cans, this installation naturally encourages interaction. Two giant, steel horns are arranged to face one another, begging for a conversation.

Student Sculpture Installation, located at Tanger Outlet Mall, 4840 Tanger Outlet Boulevard, on view May 4-12, 2012, Mon.-Sat., 10am-9pm; Sun. 11am-6pm. Cultural Arts Department student interns, Crystal King and Lauren Nordstrom, will create contemporary, conceptual sculpture installations in a covered breezeway of the shopping center. King and Nordstrom are both pursuing a degree in Studio Art at the College of Charleston.

city her home and the surrounds her inspiration. The artist began her journey early in high school in Endicott, NY, when she illustrated book reports and discovered her love for drawing. Encouraged by a teacher, she began fine art classes. Fantuzzo pursued a degree at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts. In addition to the formal training at the Academy, she has developed her skills by painting en plein aire throughout Europe and the United States.

The artist has explored both abstraction and representation, in still lifes and landscapes. Known for both her small and large scale, especially her decades long study of Kiawah Island, she has built quite a reputation for herself. Fantuzzo captures a moment in time, exploring the fleeting influence of light. She has stated, "Any object or place can be beautiful in the right light."

Fantuzzo creates a tension between the light and the lack of light resulting in "luminous color and atmospheric effects." Dennis Stiles, poet and former feature writer for The Gallery Guide several years ago described the artist's work: "The objects and scenes in Fantuzzo's paintings are often commonplace - a roadway curving through vegetation, a hunk of burnished metal, walls, clouds, a prism but her treatment of them is anything but ordinary. Unexpected juxtapositions give many of her paintings a quietly

surreal quality. She emphasizes texture tone, atmosphere and above all an inner light created by very careful purposeful handling of cool and warm colors, applied with thick and thin paints and glazes. The typical result is haunting.'

Art critic Kristina M. Kutkus wrote of Fantuzzo's work in the catalogue, "In the Dinghy, Lure of the Lowcountry" describing that, "The atmosphere is diffuse and evokes a poetic decay that is eloquent and personal. The beauty of this moment in time is a metaphor for change."

Fantuzzo studied at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in the late 60s and early 70s. Her paintings are represented in corporate and public collections, including the Greenville County Museum of Art, Gibbes Museum of Art, the State Art Collection and Burroughs-Chapin Museum of Myrtle Beach. She has had two major exhibitions at the Gibbes, one in 1992 the other in 2004, and in 2011 a large scale painting was included in Breaking Down Barriers: 300 Years of Women in Art. Her works are in private collections in the US and the UK.

"Six years ago I took 'a little painting class' at the Senior Center taught by Veronique Aniel. My life has not been the same since." Biernbaum quickly realized that painting was something she had been trying to do for quite some time through her clay work. Aniel helped to light a fire in her creative life that has been challenging, yet frustrating, as she has worked in the two mediums as separate entities. "Now, for the first time, I'm attempting to marry my two passions into one expression," adds Biernbaum.

Pieces in this show are first thrown from porcelain and stoneware clay. Black and white pots are covered with a layer of black clay slip. After sketching the initial drawing onto the vessel, sgraffito techniques are used to cut through the top layer to reveal the contrasting color underneath. Many hours of meticulous work are required to complete the images.

"I consider each one to be a 'clay painting.' And, like a painting on canvas, the pieces are signed and individually named to express what goes through my


mind as the work itself guides me to its completion," states Biernbaum. Pieces are then set aside to dry for about two weeks before being bisque-fired to 1800 degrees. Multiple layers of underglaze and glaze are used to create detailed designs on the colored vessels. For the final step, all pieces are fired to 2200 degrees and slowly cooled.

"My love for Charleston increases each time I see or experience a new facet of our beautiful city. As a former Navy wife, I've lived in numerous places and experienced travels in many cultures. However, nothing quite compares to what we have here. Charleston never ceases to amaze me," says Biernbaum.

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College of Charleston Features Works by Motoi Yamamoto for Spoleto Festival

The Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art at the College of Charleston School of the Arts has organized a major traveling exhibition of new work by contemporary Japanese artist Motoi Yamamoto. The exhibition will premiere in Charleston, SC, from May 25 through July 7, 2012, as a featured presentation of the Spoleto Festival USA. Entitled Return to the Sea: Saltworks by Motoi Yamamoto, the centerpiece of the exhibition will be a sitespecific installation created entirely out of salt by the artist during his two-week residency at the Halsey Institute. The public is encouraged to visit the galleries May 14 - 24, 2012 during the residency to watch Motoi create his installation, as well as interact with him in the galleries. An opening reception will be held on May 24, from 5-7pm.



Curated by Mark Sloan, director and senior curator of the Halsey Institute, the exhibition will also feature a series of recent drawings, photography, sketchbooks, a video about the artist, and a 150-page color catalogue documenting fourteen years of the artist's saltworks around the world. The catalogue includes essays by Sloan and Mark Kurlansky, author of the New York Times best seller, Salt: A World History. The video, produced by Sloan and Emmy award-winning videographer John Reynolds, will include interviews with Yamamoto at his studio in Kanazawa, Japan, insight into his creative process, still images and time-lapse videos of many of his previous installations, and an overview of the fascinating history of salt in Japanese culture.

Yamamoto and the Halsey Institute are collaborating with the Clemson Architecture Center in Charleston's (CAC.C) Studio V Design and Build class to create two viewing platforms for the installation. This will be the fifth collaboration between the Halsey Institute and CAC.C's Studio V class. The students, led by Ray Huff and David Pastre, will design and build a large platform in the Halsey's main gallery to provide visitors with multiple vantage points of the large saltwork. Thus far, CAC.C students have done extensive research on viewing platforms around the world with the purpose of creating a structure that is a piece of art within itself.

The students will also build an outdoor viewing platform for the gallery window fronting Calhoun Street, providing curious passers-by with a glimpse of the installation 24 hours per day. These platforms will be in use during the run of the exhibition and also for Yamamoto's residency, May 10-24. Studio V will be keeping a blog of their process and the public can follow their progress by visiting (http://caccstudiov.com/2012/01/).

CBS News journalist Martha Teichner will interview Yamamoto as a part of Spoleto Festival USA's Conversations With series. This free event will take place in the Recital Hall of the Simon's Center for the Arts, 54 St. Philip Street, at 5pm on Saturday, May 26th. There will also be free audio tours, free guided exhibition tours and the opportunity for the public to participate in the ceremonial dismantling of the saltwork at 4pm on the final day of the exhibition, Saturday, July 7.

The Halsey Institute will also produce a free gallery guide that outlines the basic concepts behind Yamamoto's unique work along with a brief curatorial statement by Sloan and a biography of the artist. This project has received support from the Asian Cultural Council, the E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation, and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Motoi Yamamoto has had very little exposure in the United States with the exception of his participation in the Halsey Institute's group exhibition *Force of Nature* in 2006 and a group show at P.S. 1 in New York City in 2003. For *Return*

to the Sea, Yamamoto will travel to each venue on the exhibition tour to create a site-specific salt installation in tandem with the drawings, photography, sketchbooks, video, and catalogue. The Halsey Institute's goal is to introduce the work of this artist to a much broader audience, create a lasting document in the expansive catalogue, and provide an indelible vision of the artist's unique process through the video.

Yamamoto is an internationally renowned artist who calls his native Japan home. He was born in Onomichi, Hiroshima in 1966 and received his BA from Kanazawa College of Art in 1995. He has exhibited his award-winning creations around the globe in such cities as Athens, Cologne, Jerusalem, Mexico City, Seoul, Tokyo, and Toulouse. He was awarded the Philip Morris Art Award in 2002 as well as the Pollock-Krasner Foundation Grant in 2003. Although he participated in a group exhibition that same year at New York's P.S. 1, his work has yet to be widely seen in the United States.

Yamamoto is known for working with salt, often in the form of temporary, intricate, large-scale installations. Salt, a traditional symbol for purification and mourning in Japanese culture is used in funeral rituals and by sumo wrestlers before matches. It is frequently placed in small piles at the entrance to restaurants and other businesses to ward off evil spirits and to attract benevolent ones. Yamamoto forged a connection to the element while mourning the death of his sister, at the age of twenty-four, from brain cancer and began to create art out of salt in an effort to preserve his memories of her. His art radiates an intense beauty and tranquility, but also conveys something ineffable, painful, and endless.

Yamamoto says, "Drawing a labyrinth with salt is like following a trace of my memory. Memories seem to change and vanish as time goes by; however, what I seek is to capture a frozen moment that cannot be attained through pictures or writings. What I look for at the end of the act of drawing could be a feeling of touching a precious memory."

Yamamoto views his installations as exercises that are at once futile, yet necessary to his healing. An important aspect of the installation is the dismantling of his work at the end of the show and delivering the salt back to water, usually in collaboration with the public; hence, the title *Return to the Sea*. During gallery hours, 11am to 4pm, on the last day of the exhibition, Saturday, July 7, the public can visit the installation and gather a small amount of the salt.

Yamamoto recognizes that salt is a vital part of many living things and that this mineral could conceivably enter and leave multiple organisms throughout the planet over the span of time. According to curator Sloan, "each grain of salt contains its own history and trajectory. Something so seemingly common becomes a metaphor for the evanescence and transience of human life".

The Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art is a non-collecting contemporary art museum located on the campus of the College of Charleston, on the corner of Calhoun and St. Philip Streets. HICA offers a comprehensive contemporary arts program that is committed to providing a direct experience with art works in various media, in an environment that fosters creativity, innovation, and learning. The Halsey Institute serves as an extension of the undergraduate curricula at the College of Charleston and as a cultural resource for the region by producing exhibitions, lectures and panel discussions, film series, publications, and a comprehensive website. In addition, the Halsey Institute seeks to foster meaningful partnerships with local organizations in order to further the reach of contemporary art within the Charleston community. 


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

lovely blue plaid and wide floral chintz borders. Paper-template pieced hexagons are pieced together to form a tessellated pattern of Stars and Rosettes in this eyecatching quilt top from about 1860-1880. It is a delightful compilation of 19th century calicoes.

Pink and blue triangles combine to create a playful "Flutter Wheel" pattern in a little crib quilt, c. 1845. The blue pieces are a subtle ombré print while the double pink dot pattern adds even more movement to the pinwheels.

City of Charleston, SC, Offers Works by David Boatwright

The City of Charleston Office of Cultural Affairs is presenting the exhibit, Look Away, Look Here: Work by David Boatwright, on view at the City Gallery at Waterfront Park through May 13, 2012. The exhibit showcases sketches, paintings and murals by Boatwright.

In this retrospective, of his more than 25-year career, Look Away, Look Here showcases new works alongside studio paintings as well as the Raval murals. The new works include depictions of a mythological Charleston to be created by the artist in two, large-scale murals on the gallery's center walls. The public is invited to visit the gallery to watch Boatwright produce these murals for the duration of the exhibit on Wednesdays and Fridays from 10am to noon. In addition, Boatwright will host an artist's lecture on May 5 at 4pm following the lecture, the public is also invited to a closing reception to view the completed murals from 5

The title of the exhibit, *Look Away*, Look Here, refers to the subject of the murals that Boatwright will create during the exhibit. These murals will depict past and future versions of Charleston, one showing a Charleston street filled with archetypal Charlestonians from the distant past, while the other wall will depict the same locale, but projected into the future, portraying a fantasy of what the city could become. Neither era will be fixed in a specific time. Boatwright explains that the future may show some disturbing outcomes, but it will contain a hopeful element of promise, and as with all his work, will deliver the message with a dose of sly humor.

At the conclusion of this exhibition, Boatwright would like for the murals, painted on removable panels, to find homes in a public venue. The panel system while appearing to be a solid wall will break down and be easily transportable and easily reassembled in another place.

One section of the gallery is devoted to Boatwright's murals and paintings from one of Charleston's most mysterious and glamorous bars, Raval, no longer located on upper King Street. These murals, painted on canvas, were saved, kept in storage and the paintings, which are in private collections, will be shown together recreating the atmosphere and look of that not so distant era.

After graduating from San Francisco Art Institute as a painting major, Boatwright spent several years making short experimental films which he showed at many of the cinematheques in Europe. Upon returning to his home state of South Carolina in 1977, Boatwright was awarded a National Endowment for the Arts individual artist grant to make documentary films in Charleston. He then traveled to Los Angeles where he became a graduate fellow at the American Film Institute, and later co-founded a film production company and directed more than 100 commercials and made several documentaries. While a filmmaker he maintained an interest in studio painting and was fortunate to return to Charleston in 1984 as it began to expand culturally and demographically, and found he could support himself and a growing family by working as a designer, painter, filmmaker and musician.

Studio painting evolved into a subspecialty as Boatwright began creating large murals and mural-like signs on many building exteriors around the Lowcountry. In addition to the signs, he has been commissioned to make murals and paintings for the interiors of restaurants and was able to sell studio pieces to collectors and commercial establishments. Producing public murals for clients with a rigorous city approval process while maintaining artistic integrity has at times been challenging in light of Charleston's well-known historic preservation policies which over the years, has preserved and protected the 18th century architecture in its beautiful and revered historic district. Over time his clients began to give him wider latitude, and he has been able to merge personal expression with the specific needs of a project in a balanced way and to grow as a painter through the experience.

Meanwhile, his studio painting has followed a steady path from his student days under the sway of the West Coast Funk Art movement. That is to say, he produces figurative imagery, that has a provocative edge, but still allows him to connect with his southern storytelling roots.

The Virginia Museum of Contemporary Art (MOCA) in Virginia Beach, VA, will unveil a pop art blockbuster, *Andy Warhol: Portraits*, featuring original works from the Andy Warhol Museum in Pittsburgh, on view May 26 through Aug. 19, 2012.

This notoriously private artist is revealed in the company he keeps. Including screenprints, drawings, paintings, Polaroids, and vintage family photos, this exhibition explores the phenomenon that is Warhol's work on a deeply personal level.

Andy Warhol: Portraits includes more than 130 portraits produced by Warhol from the 1940s to the 1980s. This exhibition contains portraits of Warhol in his youth, a reproduction of Warhol's first celebrity autograph (from Shirley Temple

in 1941), early portrait drawings from the 1940s, samples of Warhol's commercial work from the 1950s, movie star portraits from the 1960s, and more than 100 portrait paintings from the 1970s and 1980s. The most comprehensive exhibition of portraiture by Warhol, this show debuted at the Warhol Museum in Spring 2010 and is exhibiting at MOCA for the first time in the US since then.

Celebrities including Liza Minnelli, Prince, Arnold Schwarzenegger and artist Robert Mapplethorpe are just a few of the personalities represented in the exhibition.

One section of MOCA's galleries will be devoted to the "Silver Clouds" installation, in which silver Mylar balloons float in an interactive space for visitors. This is a re-creation of a Warhol installation dating back to 1966. MOCA also plans to show some of Warhol's films in the gallery, including one of his famous "Screen Tests" and "Eat."

In the Butler Gallery, MOCA will feature an exhibition titled, *I Like Soup*, in which 46 contemporary artists from across the country have re-interpreted the iconic soup can. These items will be sold online to benefit MOCA's educational programs and the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia. MOCA will be collecting canned goods for the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia, and patrons are invited to drop off items during the exhibition's run.

A Studio 54-themed celebration is scheduled to kick off the exhibition on May 25. More details will be available as the event draws near.



"More importantly, it offers an intimate glimpse into a private collection that informs and enlivens the everyday lives of Emily and Zach Smith, two of our region's most important cultural supporters. Smiths for making this work available for display at the Mint for the benefit of our community."

For over three decades, the Smiths have tirelessly dedicated themselves to improving the cultural infrastructure of this region. Through their patronage and extensive service on various boards including the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra. The Mint Museum, Opera Carolina. and Penland School of Crafts, to name a few, their community investment has touched the lives of countless individuals.

This intimate display of works illuminates a decidedly more personal side of the couple's relationship to art. One small landscape painting on view by North Carolina artist Claude Howell (1915 - 1997) was selected jointly even before their marriage. It was an auspicious beginning for lives that would be bound by a devot family, community, and the arts.

As for their own personal taste in visual art, the Smiths confess a shared love of color. Works by Pop artists Jasper Johns, Robert Rauschenberg, and Wayne Thiebaud play alongside geometric abstractions by Peter Halley, Sol Lewitt, and Sean Scully - vibrant color binding each creative voice into the collectors' unified vision.

This exhibition is organized by The Mint Museum.

Matthew Weinstein, a visual artist currently living and working in Brooklyn, NY, has achieved notoriety in the art world as the first artist to focus exclusively on 3D animation. Beginning with a self-written dialogue or lyrics, Weinstein uses musical scores and written text to develop characters which he then renders by means of the animation program MAYA. Weinstein then casts actors to vocalize the dialogue, and musicians to create an auditory backdrop for the already visually-developed environments. Using

precision airbrush techniques and singlehair paintbrushes, Weinstein also creates paintings, essentially abstractions of his animated worlds. These paintings accompany the digital installations and enable the artist to explore the often-tenuous boundary between the real and the virtual in contemporary culture.

The Charlotte Symphony Orchestra commissioned Weinstein to create a digital accompaniment to debut with their performance of Maurice Ravel's Bolero on May 4. The Mint Museum has organized a spotlight exhibition of Weinstein's art, including four paintings and two videos. Weinstein's Chariots of the Gods features a mechanized female koi, voiced by Tonyaward winning actress Natasha Richardson, who dangles from a golden chain in an empty restaurant. While she seems to carelessly meander through her environment with a smiling disposition, she offers discourse on such weighty subjects as the future, devolution, technology, aliens, and the impossibility of progress. A second video, Cruising 1980, is an homage to writer-director William Friedkin's iconic film "Cruising" (1980).

This exhibition is organized by The

May brings the opening of the next exciting exhibition from the Mint's nationally-renowned collection of fashion. The Mint has recently renamed its Historic Costume & Fashionable Dress collection the Fashion Collection.

And the Bead Goes On pays tribute to a form of ornamentation that has been used to enliven fashion designs since


ancient times. Originally restricted to the wardrobes of aristocrats and made of precious materials, beads indicated wealth and status in numerous cultures throughout the globe. Sometimes beadwork was employed on garments to convey rank, spiritual significance, or protection of the wearer. Colorful and sparkling beads appeared on articles of clothing, ceremonial dress, ritual masks, and everyday objects.

And the Bead Goes On features 20thand 21st-century women's fashions, which display inventive beadwork embroidery. This seemingly modern surface decoration, the variety of bead materials and shapes, and the basic sewing techniques used to embellish the works on view were developed in Paris workshops in the 18th century. Talented designers and skillful artisans collaborate to achieve dazzling fashions that are comfortable and durable. Glass beads, metallic sequins, metal filigree beads, faux pearls, and faceted

crystal rhinestones hand-sewn onto the cloth impart beauty, opulence, and artful originality.

Fashion was democratized in the 1960s, and previously exclusive beaded style became available to all. The fashion industry today, while still centered in Paris, includes major designers from India, Lebanon, and Nigeria, and elsewhere. The exhibition presents evening gowns, cocktail dresses, and ensembles from the museum's Fashion Collection, complemented with exciting new works on loan from contemporary designers. As the land opened up and the sky overhead became more vast and brilliant, I understood what I had been deprived of in the dense confines of New York City," says Skinner.

The artist interprets the relationship of natural light with the land through a lens

of diverse shades and tones. Vast, soothing color fields punctuated with daring, bold elements of flora are quintessential characteristics of Skinner's unique vision. Skinner's fine art training includes the University of California at Santa Barbara and the Master of Fine Arts program at the School of Visual Arts in Manhattan.






Her style is realistic with as much impressionistic color as possible. She likes to combine wide sweeping strokes in the background with small, subtle details in the center of interest. Lyon's technique uses wet paint on wet to start and wet on dry for finishing touches. from her travels to Europe.

Lyon moved to King, NC, with her artist husband Scott Burdick to escape the hectic city life and experience a different part of the country. Surrounded by nature, her studio allows her the space and privacy to grow as an artist.

Painter and mixed media artist Terry Thirion's (Charlotte, NC) abstract body of work intrigues the viewer and invites them to discover the little surprises embedded in each piece. Growing up on the farmlands of Belgium, she spent a lot of time on sites with her father who was a stonecarver. She now works from her studio in Charlotte.

Thirion graduated from Parmentier School of Design in Brussels, Belgium. She collects reference materials by sketching and photographing on site. Through her work, she expresses a fundamental sentiment of light and joy, represented in bold colors, a sudden curve, or random marks. Her subjects range from the high spirits of drumming circles to the silent play of light on a secluded river's edge, or the intimacy of a single tree in a community park.

Exuberance is balanced by a certain melancholy for the disappearance of older architecture, natural landscapes, and traditional communities. This sensitivity is revealed in her realistic and representational works that are driven by world events and common life experiences. They include the human figure, architectural elements, and found objects in nature.

Thirion states, "Each piece has its own challenges. Sometimes it's a mood I want to convey, sometimes an unwillingness to stick to the norm."

Encaustic artist Felicia van Bork (Davidson, NC) creates artwork that explores origin and evolution of consciousness. Her encaustic portraits featured in her body of work Portraits Just In Time use exquisite color and texture, drawn from observation, that result in spirit and energy.

van Bork received her MFA from the Massachusetts College of Art and Design. She studied at the Ontario College of Art and Design; in Florence, Italy; and at Columbia University in New York. She has had residencies at Byrdcliff, the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, and at the McColl Center for Visual Arts in Charlotte where she is currently an 11-month Affiliate Artist. van Bork has taught art at Davidson College, the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, and Penn State University.







Tom Starland, Editor and Publisher of Carolina Arts had this to say about Denise L. Greer, after "discovering" her on a trip to the North Charleston Arts Festival in May 2011: "In viewing the fine art show we started to notice that there was a new sheriff in town - so to speak - named Denise L. Greer. She had won the Best of Show award for a mixed media work, the First Place award for another of her works in the mixed media category, and First Place in the watercolor category. Who was this new queen? And, to top it off she was doing abstracts - my favorite kind of art. So, who is this Denise L. Greer? I found the folks who had the check-in sheets for the various competitions and when we located Greer's entry form in the first category - her address was left blank. But, before I left the convention center, I went and looked on the back of one of

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her works and saw that the tag showed she was from Rembert, SC. When I got home I did a Google search and was I surprised what I found there. This artist was on fire in competitions all over South Carolina. She won First Place in the 22nd Annual Friends of the Florence Museum Miniature Art Competition; Best in Show at the latest Trenholm Artist Guild show at HoFP Art Gallery in Columbia; and she won the second top award at the SC Watermedia Society's annual show last year in Rock Hill. 



Jean and Wally hit the ground running after moving to Hilton Head in 1987. They selected space in the Village at Wexford shopping center, hired an architect and a contractor to design and build the gallery. While the construction was going on, Wally was busy building all the custom display fixtures for the gallery. "Those were busy days," says Jean, "but we worked hard and opened the gallery on May 14, 1988."

Much has changed in the gallery business since that opening day for Smith Galleries. Wally says, "we still do everything we did 24 years ago but now we have the technology of the internet which began for us with a web site in 1998. But that was only the beginning. Now, we have two blogs, e-letters, Facebook, Pinterest, Twitter and perhaps a couple more things I can't remember at the moment. The world expects businesses to communicate in all these new ways in addition to the old methods of print advertising. When we opened our first business in 1972, our only piece of technology was a rotary dial wall mount telephone and the most interesting thing was that it was a party line. It took more than a year to get a private line. Can you imagine that today? Even this article is being prepared as a virtual presenta-

The gallery will be celebrating their 24th anniversary during May with two special jewelry exhibitions by Judith Neugebauer and Bree Richey.

Bree Richey's jewelry collection pulls directly from her love for Art Deco and modern architectural design. She often finds inspiration for her work in the clean lines of modern furniture, the fluid pattern of fabric, and the vibrant color of fine gems and pearls. The contest was judged live at MJSA Expo New York by Cindy Edelstein; Andrea Hill; Kate Peterson, owner of Performance Concepts; Jim DeMattei, founder of ViewPoint; and Mendel Rotenberg, a longtime jewelry manufacturer.

Richey's "laser-like" vision for the future of her eight-year-old design studio gave her the edge in the competition, judges said.

As the winner, Richey will receive more than \$250,000 in business services and support.

Richey's exhibit will be on view through May 31, 2012.

Judith Neugebauer's jewelry is a favorite at Smith Galleries. The gallery will feature this special exhibition titled *Leaves of Gold* through June 30, 2012.

Neugebauer writes, "A previous career in classical ballet and theater instilled within me a deep awareness and appreciation for movement, line and balance. These are the classical qualities I have always tried to incorporate into my jewelry designs...and in my life."

"My work is individually fabricated using sterling silver with an overlay of 23K gold leaf. Many pieces also incorporate freshwater pearls and Australian boulder opals set in 22kt gold. Die-formed hollow elements create visual depth, yet the overall concern with lightness and movement remain central to my approach. A recent development has been the use of oxidized, sandblasted sterling silver with 23kt gold leaf to create an even more dramatic surface."

These two outstanding jewelers are only two of many featured in the gallery on a continuing basis. The gallery also shows fine craft in many media, as well as two dimensional art. And Wally offers custom picture framing with a special focus on conservation practices.

Her contributions were very popular when we first ran them and continue to be popular on our website's archives. We've decide to revisit them from time to time.

A Few Words from Down Under Exposing Naked Emperors

by Judith McGrath, first run in our Aug. 2002 issue

In my capacity as an art critic, I approached an exhibition of celebrated contemporary artists from around this state with the expectation of enjoying some thought provoking examples of cutting edge art. CRASH! Big let down. The exhibition was full of mindless stuff flung around the floor, dangling from the walls, teetering on plinths. It was visually painful and I wanted to weep. But there was a job to do, so I fought past the disappointed "me" to reach the objective, analytical "we" to properly critique the exhibition.

One exhibit consisted of a photodocumentation of a week in the life of the artist. Not one image ignited interest as there was nothing creative about them; no play with light and shadow, no thought to cropping or framing the shot, no manipulation of scale or depth perception, no experimenting with the developing process. Actually there was nothing about these pictures that differentiated them from the normal collection of happy snaps, processed at the local mall and found in every family album. The pictures showed people and places that were somehow meaningful to the exhibitor but we weren't privy to their significance.

There was an installation that involved a standard ironing board, opened in the work position with the iron standing upright on the floor beneath it. It was titled "Untitled". We suppose the artist was making a statement about the domestic environment so we looked for something, anything that could be interpreted as credible. All we saw was a collection of opposites - large/small, wood/metal, vertical/ horizontal - and all we could reference was some salient segment on Sesame Street we remembered from our formative years.

Then there was a series of landscape paintings by one artist. The initial response was 'bad' but we must not judge before making a thorough investigation; look beyond the surface, discover what is being communicated, define its relevance, seek originality, evaluate skills. We read the "artist's statement" posted on the wall. It was a well-written document, doublespaced and typed in large font for easy reading. It commented on the ephemeral aspects of nature and how all great landscape paintings of the past were myth making. The exhibitor had a valid opinion, one that could be argued if relevant examples were used to back it up. Instead we were faced with four clumsy images painted on flattened cardboard cartons. The paint used was house paint, cans of incorrectly mixed colours deemed unsaleable by the paint store and gladly given away. The images were poorly composed, badly drawn and the paint slapped on with a lack of finesse.

A charitable person might say these pictures are examples of naïve style, except in art terms naïve means "untutored" and "honest". This guy has a Masters in Fine Art and attends art workshops. Is that

untutored? In defence of his ghastly work the artist wrote how all paintings are lies and if art really wanted to imitate nature it too should be ephemeral. His argument would have been more plausible if he weren't trying to sell the already decaying exhibits for such exorbitant prices. Is that honest? Critical Judgement: Good statement, too bad about the art.

We were surrounded by pretentious examples of self-absorption, bad kitsch and poorly presented exhibits that were totally mute and needed written explanations to hold them together. There wasn't a work of art in the place so "we" became "me" and instead of viewing the exhibits I began my usual practice of watching the lookers to observe their reactions to the display. It soon became evident I was experiencing a clear-cut case of the Emperor's New Clothes' syndrome. Although different people reacted differently to the artless stuff, all seemed to accept what they viewed as "good art". It had to be; after all it was done by artists and exhibited in a public gallery.

I enjoyed following two mature ladies around the show. They stopped every so often in front of an exhibit, declared it "very contemporary" and spoke knowingly in church whispers about various art movements in relation to their times. They were more involved with their discussion then the exhibits as their conversation was in no way related to the work on display. It was as if they considered a gallery the proper place to talk about art, no matter what's on show. I gathered they weren't sure if they liked the work or not. They would wait and see if it stood the test of time then with hindsight, they'd know if it was good or not. I must admit, their judgement had merit.

One retired couple lingered at each exhibit. They looked from object to catalogue to object again with shaking heads bent close in a conspiratorial manner. When engaged in conversation, they admitted to being impressed by the information in the catalogue, which assured them the artists must be important but confessed in apologetic voices to not liking the work. They found no rhyme or reason for the exhibition and nothing significant in any of the exhibits. Although they reiterated how they didn't know about art, I believe, of all the visitors to the gallery, this couple saw the exhibition in its true light.

The work on show lacked the mantle of creativity and as such disrobed the artists of any respect earned in their early years. The emperors of the new art world are all naked. So "I" turned around and "we" decided to head off to another gallery to review a different exhibition. Why bother writing about this stuff, no matter what is said about the work it cannot be validated much less made to seem important as no one will even remember it next week. Besides there is nothing to be gained by exposing Naked Emperors, it only embarrasses those who see the barrasses!

Dudik comments, "This collection of



"My work is influenced by the snapshot and documentational imagery. 'PreOccupied' is a commentary on the disconnect between the consumer of Ameri-





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

"Without initial intention, I created the space where my mind resided. Just as people see subject in a Rorschach blot test, giving psychologists insight as to the inner workings of their client's mind, I inadvertently took my paintings where they needed to be at that time."





rising skyward, its serpentine tail weaving out from the center.

A closer look at Holsenbeck's STUFF: Where does it come from and where does it go? reveals truths both fanciful and profound.

"I've been documenting the "stuff" of American life for over 20 years - the things we use once and throw away,' says Holsenbeck, an environmental artist whose large-scale installations raises awareness of environmental issues and inspires sustainable living.

We Americans create more garbage per capita than any other culture, yet we're blind to it," she said. "My job as an artist is to transform materials I find in the environment into something beautiful, so when people see it they begin to think about these issues.'

Thus, plastic and glass bottles strung with bamboo chopsticks form the trunks and branches of a forest; countless metal and plastic caps and lids become the tail of the mandala, itself made of multi-colored jars, bottles and cartons.

In conjunction with the exhibition, Holsenbeck took part in a residency at

Appalachian in February that included classroom visits, lectures and workshops. Students and community volunteers helped to collect materials and construct creations for the installation. During the week prior to opening this exhibition 200 volunteers pitched in with Holsenbeck and Turchin Center staff to prepare for use 30,000 plastic bottles collected from around campus.

"They say a picture is worth a thousand words... We created a picture in the gallery windows with 10,000 plastic and glass bottles - that's the number of bottled drinks sold on campus in one week," said Ben Wesemann, project coordinator and acting director of the Catherine Smith Gallery. He describes Holsenbeck as a master at making this type of community project successful, and at using society's aste to create provocative works of art.

"In viewing Bryant's work people are being educated about what it represents," Wesemann said. "It's a more tangible and powerful message than reading statistics on a website."

Jennifer Maxwell, a resource conservation specialist with Appalachian's Office of Sustainability says the connection Holsenbeck's work makes between art and environmental awareness is an excellent fit for the university.

'At Appalachian, we're committed to being a zero-waste campus, so Bryant's message is very relevant here," Maxwell said. "It calls attention to our consumption habits while highlighting the importance of reducing that impact through the choices we make every day," she said.

For Holsenbeck, the act of collecting thousands of plastic bottles on campus for her installation represents an issue that has added a deeper dimension to her work and her life: single-use plastics.

"Grocery bags, soda lids, straws, water and soda bottles, food containers

and packaging - all are single-use plastic - made to use once and designed to last forever," said Holsenbeck.

And "last forever" they appear to do. Worldwide pollution stats indicate that since the 1950s one billion tons of plastic have been discarded, and can be expected to persist in the environment for thousands of years.

The Great Pacific Garbage Patch, an enormous litter zone in the North Pacific, is reported to span an area twice the size of the continental United States. Composed primarily of plastics, the chemical breakdown is killing sea life and birds in the region.

Discouraged by such environmental truths and determined to change her own consumption habits, Holsenbeck challenged herself to live without single-use plastics. That was two years ago, and she hasn't waivered. She documents her experience in a blog: "THE LAST STRAW: A

continued quest for life without disposable

In an entry from February 2010, she writes, "What I only slightly understood when I began this journey was how saturated we are with plastics. Paying attention to what is in front of me is what I try to do when I get near any sort of commerce. The minute I forget, voilà! I get plastic I didn't bargain for.'

For Holsenbeck, life without single-use plastics is worth the effort, "Especially once you understand that what we all do - the decisions we make - really matter," she said. "This installation at the Turchin Center has been my biggest opportunity yet to share that message."

So, the next time you see a plastic bag caught in a tree or a gutter full of plastic bottles, straws and lids, think about Holsenbeck and ask yourself, "Where is this



create."

Specializing in prototypes, one-offs and custom fabrication in a variety of mediums. Roger Carter produces functional and static mixed media works using reclaimed/repurposed materials. He currently lives and works in Morganton.

Tom Denne is a lifelong woodworker and native of Lancaster, NY. He holds both BS and MS degrees in Industrial Arts Education from Buffalo State, Buffalo, NY and taught woodworking at Washington Park High School in Racine, WI, for 30 years.

For many years Denne has enjoyed turning and making wooden furniture for friends and family. He has been practicing segmented turning since 2005.

"These turnings involve 100s of pieces using varied woods combining the use of color and intricate designs," says Denne.

John Ferguson says, "From 1977 to 1987 my late teens and early twenties were steeped in an old Appalachian mountain culture. The cabinet shop where I apprenticed for 8 of those 10 years was founded in 1872 by Felix Barr after he walked from Jefferson, NC, to Galax, VA, bought a lathe head and tail stock, strapped it on his back and walked home. When I arrived in 1979, Barr Cabinet Shop was owned and run by his son Basil Barr. He was 85 years old and referred to by some as "Colonel", which had been his retiring rank from the army.

Ferguson has enjoyed a lifelong love of woodworking and has been designing and building furniture for over 20 years.

Blaine Johnston grew up surrounded by wood. His father ran a sawmill; two of his uncles run furniture companies; and his grandfather and great grandfather ran another. He also spent much of the time in his youth in the forest. During a break from college he went to work for Habitat for Humanity and ended up working for them for two years. During this time he worked on more than 25 houses and found his passions for working wood and for helping others. Before he left, a friend let him build a table in his cabinet shop and his interest in furniture was piqued. His furniture education came from Haywood Community College and was complimented by his sculpture studies at Western Carolina University.

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
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



SECCA in Winston-Salem, NC, Features Works by Stanislav Libenský & Jaroslava Brychtová From Anderson Collection

Their relationship could have ended as a story of opposites, but instead it lead to an international give-and-take between two couples - one collaborating artists and one collaborating collectors. The opposites of freedom and Communism, smooth and rough edges, polish and matte, colored and clear, narrow spaces and massive bases, filled and hollow, spiritual and stark.

These opposites exist in the spectrum of cast-glass sculptures created by Professor Stanislav Libenský and Jaroslava Brychtová that have been collected for more than 25 years by Lisa and Dudley Anderson.

Twenty pieces of the the Andersons' collection are being featured in the exhibit, Light and Space: The Sculpture of Stanislav Libenský and Jaroslava Brychtová, on view through Aug. 5, 2012.

The cast-glass sculptures assembled for this exhibition highlight the couples' intrigue with the optical qualities that three-dimensional, geometric glass forms possess. Libenský-Brychtová were influenced by the Cubism movement which emphasized shapes, space and light

SECCA Executive Director Mark Leach, who curated this show, said, "This exhibition shows the remarkable brilliance of Stanislav Libenský and Jaroslava Brychtová as leaders of the molded-glass sculpture. Expert gallery lighting for this exhibition is crucial because it changes the planar glass surfaces, creating perceptually ambiguous and visually engaging art works for viewers. We're extremely grateful to the Andersons for allowing us to

exhibit pieces of their collection offering the public this rare opportunity.'

Dr. Dudley Anderson said with a chuckle, "This collecting thing is all Lisa's fault."

Lisa came by her passion honestly. She started with a degree in Art History from Mount Holyoke College and has used this education throughout her many years of active community and support-for-the-arts activism and patronage. Currently she is on the Board of the North Carolina Arts Council and SECCA, among others. She also has had a career in visual art as a gallery owner, director and curator.

The fun part of creating an art collection," Dudley said, "is getting to know the artists and their techniques and sharing that with friends."

Libenský and Brychtová collaborated for 47 years in their glass artistry, ending with the death of Professor Libenský in 2002. Both were classically trained in drawing, painting and sculpture. These skills became the tools they used to create their signature moulded or cast glass sculptures. In addition, Libenský-Brychtová were brilliant technicians. The couple used colored and colorless glass in their work depending on the impact they were instilling in the work.

Many art experts have said that Libenský-Brychtová discovered the expressive potential of glass. One of the characteristics of their work is that the glass in each sculpture is all the same, but the thickness in any one area of the sculpture determines the the amount of light that is able to penetrate the glass which, in turn, changes the refraction of that light. single mass of glass by varying the thickness of the layers of glass at any one point in the sculpture.

Many of their pieces have angles that lead to points not much bigger than a pencil point. In the same work, the base may be massive causing the work to appear to be two different colors. The edges of many of their later free standing sculptures have ragged edges which also set them apart.

Working together for the first time in 1955, Libenský drew a simple sketch of a woman's profile on the outside surface of a gently curving zeppelin-shaped bowl, and Brychtová used this sketch to create a three-dimensional glass piece called Miska. Today this piece remains a public favorite. The process used on this beginning piece was continued throughout much of their collaboration.

The couple also produced modular curtain walls for buildings such as the State Theatre in Prague. In 1970, they showed the completeness of their mastery when they created The River of Life cre-

ated for the World Exposition in Osaka. This wall was massive - about 22 yards long consisting of 200 relief panels. The work was so large that visitors could walk beneath it.

Other architectural walls were commissioned for many venues including the Old Town Hall and the Metro Station in Prague. The only example of their architectural work that exists in the United States is located in Charlotte, NC, at the Mint Museum of Craft + Design.

'We never had a direct conversation - we didn't know Czech, and they didn't know English. We spoke through a wonderful interpreter Katya Heller," said Dudley, thinking back. "Their positive energy transcended language. Libenský and Brychtová were just people magnets.'

Lisa adds, "They understood that we respected their country, their breathtaking art and the spirituality of their work, and they respected us as collectors for that."

Libenský and Brychtová discovered a fourth dimension - the inner life of glass," Dudley explained. "The inner light of the sculpture, is truly the soul of it."

"Also, the deeper meaning of each piece evolves the longer you live with it," Lisa says. Currently, she finds the greyhaze sculptures such as *Spaces 1* are the most meaningful to her. "They lose their solidarity and feel like they become one

with the air," she said. "The grey sculptures are humble like Libenský and Brychtová were as people, and they fill me with a quiet serenity."

Over the years in his medical oncology practice, Dudley has learned that the Libenský-Brychtová pieces also help the healing process. "When someone has cancer, they tend to emotionally turn inward," he said. "These sculptures have a calming effect which encourages patients to think about something outside themselves, and that may be their first step toward true healing.

His medical office is filled with contemporary art, much of it Libenský-Brychtová sculptures, and dog toys for the other member of his medical team Barton, a West Highland white terrier who holds office hours for Dr. Anderson's patients.

As the Anderson's collection grew, space became a premium both at Dudley's office and even more so in the Anderson home. Barton, the dog, said, "You couldn't chase a cat in here without hitting Libenský-Brychtová sculpture.

Realizing the collection was more important to them than a den or garage, they remodeled these spaces into a gallery so they could properly exhibit some of the bigger Libenský-Brychtová work, as well as that of other glass artists.

"We respect Stanislav Libenský and Jaroslava Brychtová both as people and artists so much that we feel we owe it to them to loan their work to museums for exhibitions such as this SECCA exhibit, so that a larger public audience can appreciate it," Lisa said.

Some people cannot believe that they would risk having these fragile glass sculptures in public view. Once again, it is a story of opposites - for the Andersons' it is simply public enlightenment verses private enjoyment.

I was not prepared for the phone calls that I received from patients and staff over the next 6 weeks. Those phone calls brought me to the realization that I did not want to just be a good artist, but I wanted to be an artist with purpose that could benefit my community and the people around me."

Works with titles such as Stillness, Moving Forward, Warrior, Out of the Depths, and I Will Dream will be on display in the Welborn Gallery. Cameron Arts Museum in Wilmington, NC, Offers Exhibits Based on Fashion

The Cameron Arts Museum in Wilmington, NC, is presenting two new exhibits including: *Out of Fashion*, on view in the Hughes Wing through Aug. 19, 2012, and *Julie VonDerVellen*, on view in the Hughes Wing through Aug. 19, 2012.

In 1815, when the first cotton mill was established in Lincoln County, NC, it stood as one of the physical and symbolic cornerstones of an industry that would come to define the economic and cultural being of North Carolina. Following the offshore exodus of the 1990s, today North Carolina is rebuilding through hybrid development, with one of the fastest growing markets in the state being the export of intermediate/unfinished goods that overseas firms turn into finished products. These materials are in a raw, in-between state - their promise yet to be realized much like the textile industry of the 21st century, and our current understanding of

The evolving enterprise of textiles provides the impetus and inspiration for *Out of Fashion*. Gathering thirteen artists and designers from across the state - and across generations - this exhibition is a platform to reimagine the possibilities of a once fundamental industrial staple of North Carolina. Featuring performance art, large scale and site-specific work installed in both the museum's galleries and on the grounds, *Out of Fashion* mines the histories of fashion to consider regenerative practices from the mountains to the coast.

Out of Fashion was organized by the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art (SECCA), in Winston-Salem, NC, and was curated by Steven Matijcio, Curator of Contemporary Art, SECCA. SECCA, an affiliate of the North Carolina Museum of Art, a division of the North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources. SECCA is also a funded member of The Arts

Council of Winston-Salem and Forsyth County. Additional funding is provided by the James G. Hanes Foundation.

The exhibition *Julie VonDerVellen* represents the first museum exhibition featuring work by this emerging artist, a recent MFA graduate from the University of Wisconsin at Madison. A close inspection of these seemingly pedestrian garments of everyday wear reveal highly crafted, intricate constructions made entirely of handmade paper derived from recycled cotton clothing.

This thoughtful reuse of materials is given additional layers of meaning through the words and sentences found on many of the paper components. They tell stories of identity, status, humanity and memory, of which the artist writes: "Along the way to redefining the commonplace book structure – I have developed a body of work that encompasses everything from posters to newsletters to dresses to shoes."

"Garments evoke memories; memories evoke garments," adds VonDerVellen. "My research expands upon traditional storytelling and memoir presentation. Significant moments - personal stories and those of friends and families - are interwoven into handmade paper crafted from recycled cotton clothing. The paper, acting as fabric, is layered with a narrative specifically tailored to the event. The garments are re-creations of actual attire surrounding each of the significant moments. My paper weaving technique - a process of interlacing objects with memories . .

. . Memories evoke garments; garments evoke memories."



1930's have influenced Colleen Ringrose's new body of work. Like Connolly she is a "digger" finding her images in old and discarded books. The inspiration for these new paintings comes from an unlikely source, a book for stamp collectors from 1936. Originally thinking it would be the stamps that would inspire her new work, it was the pictures of the watermarks in the paper used to authenticate the stamps from around the world that caught her eye. The watermark is a thin place in the paper and can only be seen by turning the stamp over and washing it with Benzene. Only then will these small designs appear.

In Ringrose's new paintings she presents them as modern icons set off by the explosions of color. This work is part ancient wax painting and part computer technology. These paintings juxtapose the fluid colorful textures created by the encaustic wax and the more formal graphic quality of the watermarks. Blowing up the watermarks allows for a closer look at what is invisible in daily life.

early design career have helped shape Linssen's recent work as she explores the delicacy of nature, the crossroad of textiles and paper, the interaction of light and shadow, and the beauty of line.

At First Light's works underscore Linssen's continued interest in revealing both our own inner nature and that of the world around us by showcasing the ever present movement, drive, and undeniable, unstoppable forces around us and within us. With her work she is testing the boundary between object and shadow, real and unreal - emphasizing the fact that the space around the object is just as important as the object itself. Through her work she brings new attention to often overlooked aspects of nature and our connection to it.

"I bridge the gap between our own human scale, the minute and intimate, and the vast and grand by freezing a moment in time, immortalizing it in pattern, light, and shadow," Linssen notes in her artist statement.

"My childhood was hard; when I was six my parents learned of my MD, we all had no idea that anything was wrong, by the time I was 7, I was fully wheelchair bound and couldn't stand, as MD goes it progressively gets worse to where now its hard for me to draw. At the age of 10 my hands started getting worse, luckily I still have as much movement as I do. I broke both of my legs in 7th grade by falling out of my wheelchair. I've had a rough time growing up. I went through a deep depression last year but now I'm out and happier than ever. I have the greatest friends in the world and the most amazing family possible; I'll do anything for all of them."

Jones adds, "I've been through two surgeries, one was a muscle biopsy, the

other cut a lot of my tendons so I wouldn't tighten up. I've been through a lot and it's made me mature quickly; mostly what's done it is all the losses at SNHS this past two years, four schoolmates have passed, all of which I knew in some way. It was hard when one friend was tragically killed in a car wreck. Me and her used to speak some; she was a true Christian and was in my 1st period class. It's still hard to see that empty seat in class."

"Drawing is everything to me, I honestly don't know what I will do if my hands completely go, it hurts my hands to draw but I'm passionate about it and it's

Tinka Jordy has been a professional artist for the past 35 years and works in high-fired stoneware clay. She moved here with her husband from New Orleans in 1987. "Growing up in New Orleans I was used to small controllable patio gardens. I had not gardened much. My husband, Mark Donley, whom I met in New Orleans, had grown up in Massachusetts so he had a very different concept of gardening than mine. He also had more experience than I did. As we slowly cleared places for beds we were hit with the gardening bug in a serious way. I soon discovered those spots in the garden that nothing seems to want to grow in."

'Creating sculpture for the spaces was an obvious next step," adds Jordy. "Mark believed in (and still does) developing the 'bones' of the garden first. Bones are the evergreens and plants that form the structure, that are very evident in the winter landscape. While these trees were first starting out they needed room and it was the perfect place, again, for sculpture that could be moved once the space was needed. I was hooked, and my work eventually went from indoor sculptural vessels to full size figures. We started to

garden with the placement of sculptures in mind. I have been told by our patrons that seeing the work in a natural home setting really helps one envision their own garden with art in it."

They decided to have a joint art and plant sale in 1994 with their neighbors Val Tyson and Richard Erhardt and invited another sculptor William Moore to join them. That was the beginning. Although there is no longer a plant sale, you can still enjoy the sculptures that flow from the more intimate garden beds to the pastures



as the ultimate artist. "Every time I walk out the door, there is something new to see, something I might not have paid attention to before but that grabs me," Kossoff says.

"For me, the theme 'mystic chords' represents our connection to the earth, its inhabitants, and our creative impulses within. Like my two-dimensional mixed media work, my jewelry is often layered. I recently finished a fine silver pendant that represents my awe at the precise arrangement of layered petals at the center of a sunflower. Of course, I can't approach nature's perfection, but I can put my own spin on it," she says. "Out of respect and care for the earth, I use a high percentage of recycled fine silver, and I frequently upcycle pieces of vintage jewelry into a new design, adding my original metal work to the final product. Giving new life and purpose to an old, sometimes battered, piece of silver is quite satisfying."



It has traveled extensively since 2004 in galleries, universities, art centers, and hospitals in the DC Metro area."

"In May 2009, the weekend of my return to Chapel Hill from a 25-year career in the DC metro area, I opened *Beijing Impressions* through the town's arts program so that my aging mother could finally experience the work. It was to her delight for the first time to be able to view the collection that featured my journey to China to visit our daughter on a Fulbright to study migration and women's labor practices."

"My mom passed away in August 2011, so it was particularly meaningful to show in these local venues, close to home. The exhibition at the FedEx Global Education Center on the UNC campus offers yet another transformation, expanding the work with 10 new images, a silk installation by fiber artist Peg Gignoux, and impressions, translations, and stories from

UNC Chinese students."

"I am currently working with two young Chinese undergraduates, Manchen Hao and LeTian Dong. Manchen arrived in the US alone, for the first time to study at UNC. She quickly learned English and has accelerated in all her studies. We have spent many hours exploring the photographs and relating them to her experiences as a child growing up in China and now as a young adult in the US. She is contemplating her own issues of transition, family, and identity. She wishes to be photographed at an airport and says this represents her journey of acclimation."

"LeTian Dong, a young business and economics undergraduate describes herself as Asian American. She has lived here since the age of 4. Her mother came first to find a job as a nurse while the father raised the family in China. As they raised her in America, her parents felt very strongly that she speak Chinese. She has a very different view of herself in relation to her heritage. She asked to be photographed in a studio with modern dance movement and a traditional Chinese costume."

"LeTian and Manchen are translating the titles for the exhibition walls and adding their stories in Chinese and English to the photographs. These will be combined in a book and exhibited during the show. We hope to encourage others to add to this with personal photographs from China and blog-like impressions in Chinese and English."

course a child to a carpet," Lerma says.

The hypnotic musical tones of the electronic keyboard and the meditative swirls of the doodles seem to counterbalance the stiff regulations of the wigged French bankers and the very controlled atmosphere of both the four-sides of the canvas and the white-walls of the gallery. Lerma effectively describes them as "paintings and works about paintings, which attempt to collapse the historical and the autobiographical within a single frame."

CAM Raleigh in Raleigh, NC, Features Works by José Lerma

CAM Raleigh in Raleigh, NC, will present the exhibit, *The Credentialist*, featuring a Museum premiere of newly commissioned works by José Lerma, on view from May 19 through Sept. 2, 2012.

Lerma currently lives and works in New York and Chicago, where he is a faculty member at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Lerma creates intricate installations that combine painting and non-traditional materials such as reflective fabrics and commercial carpet, relying on a compendium of mediums, references, and elements that combine his personal history and extensive academic accolades with his awareness of social history.

Lerma originally migrated from Spain to Puerto Rico and now lives between Chicago and Brooklyn, and has multiple degrees in law and art. *The Credentialist* is a new body of 18 artworks commissioned for the main gallery at CAM Raleigh highlighting his ability to combine and collapse facets of history from his personal viewpoint. Central to the exhibition is the notion of rising and falling, particularly the precipitous demise of great historical figures. The records of these fluctuations are played out on various paintings, curtains, and carpets that

will occupy the space. 4 large canvases, which imitate ballpoint pen doodle, depict themes such as war, love, and paradise while referencing paintings on the subject by Tintoretto and Piero De La Francesca.

In his paintings, Lerma employs images of Baroque style portraits of historical, famous French Bankers from the 18th Century, which are signified by wigged portraits. The artworks in this exhibition are monumental, featuring a liberal use of brush strokes, doodles, and highlights of paint to underscore the sketch-like quality of the drawings. By distorting and often erasing the features of the faces, only leaving profiles or frontal views of wigs, Lerma's work also references the paintings of Francis Bacon and Philip Guston.

Lerma places his large works on electronic keyboards as a way of combining previous elements of his oeuvre. This provides a soundtrack to each painting - making the paintings active participants in the art. Through the use of acrylic spray paint on canvas, he is able to reproduce the aesthetic of highlighters and pen scratchings on a paper pad. His swirled scribbles are reminiscent of graffiti while doodles reference French political cartoon drawings.

Lerma's paintings meld these several diverse mediums to create works that resemble portraits of bureaucratic figures while simultaneously appearing to be topographical landscapes. He builds up hues of paint and juxtaposes them alongside flat planes of white paint or 'doodles' of spray paint. Lerma's paintings are experimental and expand the notion of painting.

The main gallery of CAM Raleigh features a large-scale carpet installation. Lerma paints directly on inexpensive commercial grade carpets. The scale of the rugs affects the physical relationship of the viewer to the work. "I like the thought of people walking over my ideas, convoluted and preliminary as they often are, and examining and stepping over an intimate space while simultaneously feeling small. Like having the same relationship an insect would have to a drawing - or of

Sewing and textiles were an important part of her community and a skill that was emphasized throughout her childhood. These interests have played a part in the physical and conceptual components of her work.

Upon moving to The University of Wisconsin at Madison for graduate school she continued her interests in combining

sewing and building. While in Madison she began an apprenticeship with a traditional European style upholstery shop, The Straight Thread. There she learned to build forms and do upholstery. She has been making work and delving into the connection between decorative interiors, sexuality, gender, and architecture for the past ten years.

As a child Sharron Parker "chased butterflies, scrambled over rocks, and read romantic tales of faraway places." Years later, she has studied butterflies and rocks, and traveled to many of the places – the Amazon rain forest, craggy cliffs with castle ruins, remote island beaches – never losing the wonder of them. For Parker, exotic beauty can be found everywhere.

Using the ancient technique of feltmaking, Parker does not capture exactly what she has seen, but rather, through her work she aims to create something new. The simplicity of the technique – combing, layering, and working dyed un-spun wool in hot water until the fibers lock – allows the artist to work spontaneously, and often experimentally. Parker notes, "The shape of a piece might come from a bird's wing, the color from crystals under a microscope, and the texture from the bark of a birch tree. I wish to celebrate nature, not to mirror it."

Looking Back: 25 Years at Artspace includes works Parker created through-out the 25 years she has maintained a studio at Artspace. In addition to the works on view in the Upfront Gallery, the exhibition continues in Artspace Studio 217.

Parker received an undergraduate degree from Duke University and a master's degree from UNC-Greensboro, studying education, art, and interior design. She continued her study in textiles with classes at Penland School of Crafts and Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts, where she has returned to teach workshops in felting. Parker's work has been exhibited throughout the US, and through the Art in Embassies program, in Turkmenistan and Armenia. She has been a feltmaker for 30 years.

Stone Works presents an exhibition of award winning sculptures carved by Paris Alexander. He has brought together a collection of his works that have been among those chosen for numerous honorariums and awards throughout the Southeast.

Alexander was born and raised in New York City where he began studying art during early childhood. from the Middle East to Central and South America. She has researched, studied and experienced these cultures and their traditional adornments in order to understand and work upon the age long tradition of bodily adornment. At 22, she traveled to Qatar, where she conducted a six-month field research project on the history of pearl diving in the Persian Gulf. Her initial intent was to gain a true understanding of history's most mysterious and perplex-

ing jewel: the pearl. Nowhere does its history speak volumes than in the Persian Gulf. de Soria's experience as a field researcher in Qatar provided a newfound respect and awe for the pearl, and took her creativity to an entirely new level.

de Soria's creative process takes objects that exist in the world and assembles them through the imagination to present them as wearable art. She extracts sensual shapes and patterns from ordinary structures and life forms that surround her, and reconstitutes them to adom and accentuate the female figure. The design process is complete when the audience wears de Soria's jewelry and contributes their own individual interpretation of it, partaking in the cyclical life and experience of the work

Edward Bent, also known as Red Ute, was born on the Southern Ute Indian Reservation of Colorado. His interest in flutes began at age 7 or 8 when he was drawn to the captivating sound of the instruments that were being made by the Elders in his tribe. Now 92, he divides his time between making flutes and getting kidney dialysis treatments several times each week. He courted now-wife Diane Box in 1990, who still remembers the first time Red Ute played the flute for her at a celebration at Ute Park in Ignacio, Colorado. "All of the folding chairs had been taken away except the one I was sitting on. Red Ute came over and played his flute just for me. A Ute woman walked by and remarked, 'Eddie is trying to get himself a wife!" It worked, and now Diane's elaborate Plains Indian-style beadwork is often included

on Edward's flutes.

Ann and Sandy Batton are another husband-and-wife team, operating a busy pottery business out of their home while raising two small children. Being lovers of nature, the Battons produce forms that are based on the organic shapes that surround them. Customers, friends and art lovers alike frequently comment on the "Dr. Seuss" or "Alice in Wonderland" aspect of their work. When asked, they say that it was not intentional, but they do live their lives with a sense of spontaneity and whimsy. Other neighborhood artist couples are Diana Gillispie [ceramic tiles] and Michael Robinson [oil paintings] at Asheville Tileworks and Kathie [pottery] and Robert Kline [turned wooden bowls] at Centerpoint Studios.

Each year, the Kenilworth Art Studio Tour is planned by participating artists and sponsored by local businesses. 

North Carolina Arboretum in Asheville, NC, Offers Exhibit Based on Ferns of the Smoky Mountains


A new exhibition created by Discover Life in America, a non-profit based in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, is now open at The North Carolina Arboretum in Asheville, NC. Ferns of the Smokies reveals the beauty and diversity of ferns and their allies through 20 high resolution scans, on view in the Education Center through July 2, 2012.

Developed with funding from the Knoxville Garden Club, the exhibit showcases almost half of the 49 ferns and fern allies that exist in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Though black bears and white-tailed deer are commonly recognized as the mascots of the Smokies, visitors are encouraged to take a closer look through the images of the exhibit to discover another world within the Park.

Discover Life in America (DLIA) is involved in a quest to identify and understand all species of life within the 800-square-mile ecosystem of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. DLIA researchers seek to learn more about the components, abundance, and diversity of life, from spiders in the soil to slime molds in the forest canopy. The primary tool of DLIA is the All Taxa Biodiversity Inventory (ATBI), which brings scientists from around the world to inventory the estimated 80,000 species of living organisms in the Park. The project develops checklists, reports, maps, databases, and natural history profiles that describe the biology of this rich landscape to a wide

audience. DLIA's mission is to help the ATBI identify and develop resources and partnerships to conduct the inventory and related educational activities.

Considered by many to be one of the world's biggest and most ambitious science projects, the All Taxa Biodiversity Inventory aims to decipher the mysteries of the Smokies' intricate ecosystem by finding and cataloging every species of plant, animal, and microorganism in the park. Since collecting began in 1998, the ATBI has uncovered over 900 species new to science, as well as over 7,300 species that are newly documented to exist in the Park. The ATBI project involves hundreds of "citizen scientists," volunteers who collect specimens for the scientists to analyze, thereby keeping the project costeffective.

The central mission of The North Carolina Arboretum, an affiliate institution of the 17-campus University of North Carolina system, is to cultivate connections between people and plants.
