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

### **ArtFields Results**

The results are in for the ArtFields visual art competition, held in Lake City, SC - if you haven't heard already:

ArtFields \$50,000 Top Prize! - James Arendt of Conway, SC.

Juried Panel \$25,000 Prize! - Leanna Knapp of Juliette, GA.

People's Chairmanta 1900 Prize - John Cooper of Rumanta 1901, NC

Although many artists - if they heard about this opportunity at all - are still thinking that what they saw or heard was a typo or miss-information. It couldn't have been a \$100,000 in cash prizes and it couldn't be taking place in Lake City, SC. Those people missed a great opportunity and a great event. Learn more at (www.artfieldssc.org).

The organizers of this event and the people of Lake City did a great job presenting this event for the first time, although there are problems to be worked out before next year. I'll offer my 2 cents on those problems on our blog *Carolina Arts Unleashed* found at

(<a href="http://carolinaarts.com/wordpress/">http://carolinaarts.com/wordpress/</a>) in a few days. But for now it's a job well done.

I went to Lake City twice, but still couldn't see all the art offered - as usual I spent way too much time talking with people I met there.

Lake City will be a model on how to revitalize a dying town by offering arts as a cultural draw for development. This is no secret in North Carolina, but it's still a "crazy" concept to most of SC's political leaders.

My big question about this event was

what will someone see in Lake City the day after the festival, a month after the festival or before the 2014 festival? I'm not sure yet what that answer will be and before I went to Lake City my answer was - probably not much, but I learned more in 5 minutes talking with Ray McBride, Executive Director of the Community Museum Society than I heard in two years of marketing this event.

McBride was manning the Jones & Carter Building which was one of the venues during ArtFields. This building will be a permanent space presenting exhibitions on art, agriculture, and history. Along with the ArtFields Gallery at the ArtFields Office on Main Street visitors will have at least two venues to draw visitors to Lake City. And if plans continue to develop, it won't be long before a commercial gallery might pop up in Lake City. Still a risky proposition, but as the Lake City community is exposed to these art events, demand will grow for more home-grown offerings.

So, will the Pee Dee area of South Carolina be the next area of the state to offer cultural tourism - from within and outside the state? I don't know, but I do see folks there working hard to make it so.

Just 20 miles east of Lake City, Johnsonville, SC, will dedicate a larger than life statue of General Francis Marion by Florence, SC, artist Alex Palkovich, at 1pm on Saturday, May 18, 2013, at Venters Landing on the Lynches River. The event is part of the City's Heritage Festival.

If little steps like this keep happening, it won't be long before people can travel along a cultural and heritage trail throughout the Pee Dee - instead of traveling up and down I-26.

I'm glad it's just 52 miles up Hwy. 52 continued above on next column to the right

for me to drive to the Hub at ArtFields. I look forward to many more trips there to see how this development takes place.

### Lack of Info on Piccolo Spoleto Festival Visual Art Offerings

We don't have much info on visual art offering taking place during the Piccolo Spoleto Festival in Charleston, SC. We didn't receive any by deadline or after it passed. As usual the City of Charleston's Office of Cultural Affairs couldn't send out a press release a month or so before the event happens. At least they didn't send any to us. So, if they are trying to keep us in the dark - they're doing a good job of it. The only problem with that is that they are also keeping our readers in the dark too.

### You Say Goodbye, I Say Hello

The Beatles sang that song back in 1968 - was it about change? Were they talking about when one door closes another door opens? Heck, I don't know, but it sounds right for one of our long time supporters - The Pink House Gallery in Charleston, SC. They have been one of our steady supporters - way back when we were *Charleston Arts* in the late 1980's.

The artists/owners of that gallery had to close their doors back in mid-April, not because they had a failing business, but because the owner of the building wanted to sell it as a residence.

I've talked with one of those artists about the future and they, much like *Carolina Arts*, may come back as an e-gallery. It's a challenging transition, but one that can be successful. We'll help you say "Hello" or "Goodbye" when we hear what they work out.

### **Our Covers**

The last couple of months, starting with our cover with works by Peter Scala of North Charleston, SC, we've seen a growth spurt in downloads and views on Facebook. I always think our covers are

attractive, but something changed back in March. And, after Scala helped us blaze a trail into new territories - Jane Filer's (Chapel Hill, NC) cover in April zoomed us to new highs.

Our April 2013 issue broke a new record for downloads from a high of 175,150 for our October 2012 issue by reaching a mark of 178,607 as of Apr. 28. Just a year ago our April 2012 issue saw 112,795 downloads, which was a record.

Now Facebook has to be given some credit for these new highs. I'm glad I'm finally seeing some rewards to being on Facebook and swimming through hundreds and hundreds of posting made each day - sometimes each hour.

Back in March when we posted the notice that the Mar. 2013 issue was ready to be downloaded on Facebook, which was Peter Scala's cover - we saw a big jump in views of that post, from an average of 250-300 per view, to a record 2,410 views with 30 shares for that post. And postings after that got a bump averaging 400-600 views


In April, the post on Facebook that our Apr. 2013 issue was ready to be downloaded soared to 3,691 views and 45 shares. And several postings after that reached the 1,000 mark.

We can't thank those folks who share our postings enough - they help the paper to be seen by more and more people all the time.

We've got another great cover of works by Enid Williams (Upstate SC) for our May issue, but we want everyone to know - this growth can't go on forever. - at least we don't expect it to. There are always peaks and valleys in this process.

The good thing is - there are still lots of people out there in the Carolinas who have never heard of *Carolina Arts*. There are even lots of visual artists who have never heard of us.

Did you ever think you'd hear a publisher of a newspaper think of that as good news? It's better than knowing that everyone knows about us but only 178,000 showed up to take a look at us. Now how about 200,000?



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

### The 31st North Charleston Arts Festival Takes Place Throughout North Charleston, SC - May 3 - 11

The North Charleston Arts Festival (May 3 - 11) is an annual nine-day event highlighting national, regional, and local artists and performers in the areas of Dance, Music, Theater, Visual Arts, Crafts, Photography, Media Arts, and Literature. For 30 years the festival has made quality arts programming affordable and accessible to the widest spectrum of the public, attracting over 30,000 residents and visitors from throughout the Southeast and beyond to experience over 100 free and modestly priced performances, workshops, exhibitions, and activities in a variety of venues, including libraries, community centers, schools, civic auditoriums, and parks. Named a Top 20 Event by the Southeast Tourism Society, the event has matured into one of the most comprehensive arts festivals in the state of South Carolina



The Arts Festival's Main Event will be held on Saturday, May 4, 10am-4pm, and Sunday, May 5, 2-5pm, at the North Charleston Performing Arts Center and Charleston Area Convention Center, offering free admission and free parking, with over forty performances on four themed stages: General Audience, Cultural Heritage, Youth Entertainment, and Bands. Other features include judged fine art and photography exhibits; the 12th annual South Carolina Palmetto Hands Fine Craft Exhibit; youth art from Charleston, Berkeley and Dorchester county students; the Lowcountry Gem & Mineral Society show and sale; the Village Antiques & Collectibles show; children's activities at Box City and Creation Stations; art & craft vendors, a food court, and much

The Arts Festival continues on May 6, with over sixty events and exhibitions throughout the week at various locations. An array of free and ticketed offerings include street dances, concerts, theater presentations, film screenings, an art walk, children's programs, workshops and demonstrations, a National Outdoor Sculpture Competition & Exhibition, and much more. This year's Grand Final on May 11 features a Tri-County school showcase, music and dance performances, a slam poetry show, children's activities, food trucks, and an evening concert by Rivers & Company. The event concludes with a fantastic fireworks display over the Cooper River.

The North Charleston Arts Festival began at Park Circle in 1982 as a one day community celebration with the goal of enhancing the quality of life of residents through showcasing the arts. As the annual event matured, the festival's reach expanded to include visitors, prompting the addition of tourism development as a goal. In 1995, the Arts Festival moved from Park Circle to the North Charleston Coliseum and expanded to two days. By 2000, the opening of the Charleston Area Convention Center, the North Charleston Performing Arts Center, and additional new venues, provided the springboard for the festival to expand to nine full days of performances and activities for residents and visitors throughout the City. In 2008, the Arts Festival was recognized

by Southeast Tourism Society as a Top 20 Event. Today, the festival maintains the spirit of a public celebration of the arts with the mission of presenting a comprehensive, multidiscipline event schedule that provides an array of performing, visual, media, and literary arts events for people of all ages and backgrounds.

The North Charleston Cultural Arts Department works with the North Charleston Arts Advisory Committee (NCAAC), a volunteer group comprised of a cross section of the community, to develop year round programming for the city, including the Arts Festival. In addition to this core committee, numerous key volunteers work to develop individual components of the festival. Research is conducted on a continual basis and strategic plans and implementation are done ten months out of the year. Annual Festival evaluations by participants, staff, and volunteers are used as a planning tool for the following year.

The target audience for the festival reflects The Cultural Arts Department's mission of increasing awareness of the arts and making arts experiences available to the widest spectrum of the public. The assortment of free and ticketed performances and activities scheduled throughout the festival ensure that there is something for everyone, ranging from seniors to youth and families to individuals. The best example of the festival's broad appeal is the Main Event, where performances and activities attract audiences from every demographic category: male and female; all ages; all cultures; and all economic backgrounds.






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

**Through June 20 -** *Contemporary* Artists of Pinar Del Rio, Cuba - International Group Exhibition, located at the North Charleston City Hall, 3rd floor, 2500 City Hall Lane. Pinar Del Rio, Cuba, is an area steeped in rich culture and history that has been the birthplace and home of many of the country's most outstanding writers, musicians, and visual artists. In this group exhibition, nine professional contemporary artists from this westernmost province of Cuba will present a collection of post Cuban Revolution art in a variety of mediums and styles that capture their unique culture and heritage as is relates to the land, life, and the essence of community. These artists are not tied to the historical 1940's early modern traditions of pre-revolution artistic expressions, or the 1960's revolution presentations of ideological social realism, or the politically sanctioned and government supervised expressions of art of the 1970's and 80's. Rather, these artists are products of the 1990's, creating work based on the ideas of freedom of expression and experimentation in both mediums and styles. Featured works include representational landscapes, figurative expressions, magic surrealism, and abstract expressionism styles of contemporary art in Cuba today that are a clear testament to the artists' creativity and imagination, advanced education, rich cultural bonding, sense of humor, and vitality. Participating artists: Javier Ampudia, Lores (Nelo) Arquimides, Juan Suarez Blanco, Livan Ricardo Hernandez, Reynier Llanes (curator), Yaciel Martinez, Juan Carlos Morales Lemus, Danys Milo Ozuna, and Juan Miguel Suarez. Through June 20 - Wash Over You - Works by Kristy Bishop, located at the North Charleston City Hall, 2nd floor, 2500 City Hall Lane. In this exhibition of abstract fiber works, Bishop presents intricate pieces composed of hand-dyed silk that is cut, gathered, and sewn. Thousands of tiny pieces of fabric are manipulated to create color transitions and gradients that translate human emotions. Bishop currently offers residencies to North Charleston schools and community groups as the City's Artist-in-Residence. Her work has been featured in the pages of *Charleston* Magazine and presented in a number of group exhibitions, both locally and nationally. Hours: daily, April 30-June 20, 8am - 8pm.

cal fiber artist, Kristy Bishop, highlights five contemporary artists whose work is significantly informed or inspired by the materials used to create it. Lauren Frances Moore of Silver Spring, MD, Conrad Guevara of San Francisco, CA, Katya Usvitsky of Brooklyn, NY, and local artists Sarah Boyts Yoder and Camela Guevara will collectively display 20 pieces in both 2 and 3-D. From the typical (watercolor, acrylic) to the atypical (nylon stockings, pig intestines, vintage coloring books, baskets, and rope), the various media featured explores and creates abstract forms, reflecting divergent artistic viewpoints. Hours: Mon.-Fri., 8am - 6pm.

May 3 - 11 - The PODS Project, located in the Greenspace next to DIG in the Park, 1055 East Montague Avenue. Throughout the month of April, three local contemporary artists transformed the insides of portable storage containers, donated by PODS Moving & Storage, into thought-provoking and participatory art installations. The completed installations will be on view throughout the festival, with the artists appearing with their work during the Arts Festival Art Walk on Wednesday, May 8. The Cartographic *Instrumentarium* by Hirona Matsuda and Trever Webster were influenced by the books and sculptures of Chris Ware, among others, Hirona, a found-object artist, and Trever, a mapmaker, will transform their PODS container into a control room full of instruments and diagrams. Surrounded by contraptions that seem familiar, but are not of this time and place, viewers will be transported to an imaginary place – into the heart of a machine that maps a non-existent terrain. Convex/ *Concave* by Kristy Bishop – The walls and ceiling of Bishop's PODS container will be covered with numerous naturally dyed fabric pieces sewn together to create deep sinking holes and bulging protrusions, causing the viewer to feel as though she/he is entering some sort of life form or organic space. The Machines by Phillip Hyman - Inspired by the science fiction movies I, Robot and A.I. Artificial Intelligence, Hyman offers viewers a glimpse of a future where our "throw away" mentality banishes old robots and machines to container cities where they are locked up, never to be used again. Hours: May 3-11,

Through June 1 - Art & Fine Craft Co-Op Gallery & Sale, located at The Meeting Place, 1077 East Montague Avenue. This temporary cooperative gallery is dedicated to presenting many local artists of varied backgrounds working in a diverse array of media and representing a full range of styles. A variety of pieces including paintings, prints, sculpture, fine crafts, jewelry, fiber art and more will be available for sale. The public is invited to a free reception hosted by the artists on Wednesday, May 8, from 5-8pm during the North Charleston Arts Festival Art Walk. Hours: Fri. & Sat., 11am - 7pm.

Through June 20 - Our Next Generation – Jr. Fiber Art Exhibition, located at the Unity Church of Charleston, 2535 Leeds Avenue. This special exhibition offers youth fiber artists, including students from R.B. Stall High School and Charleston Montessori School, an opportunity to display their unique quilt creations based on the same inspiration as the 7th Annual African American Fiber Art Exhibition, Once Upon a Quilt: Welcome to My Quilted Story Book. Hours: daily, 8am-6pm.

May 3 - 11 - Youth Photography Exhibition, located at the North Charleston & American LaFrance Fire Museum and Educational Center Lobby, 4975 Centre Pointe Drive. FREE (does not include Museum admission). Seventh grade students from Jerry Zucker Middle School of Science will display photographic posters inspired by a fieldtrip to the Dorchester #5 Fire Station and created through the Yo Art! Project. Yo Art, Inc. is both an in-school and after-school mentoring program with an academic focus that works to build self-esteem, job skills, and a sense of community through computer

art workshops, exhibitions, and public art projects. Hours: Mon.-Sat., 10am-5pm and Sun., 1-5pm.

Sculpture Installations include: May 3 - 11 - Big Beetle by Edward Byrd, located at the North Charleston & American LaFrance Fire Museum and Educational Center Grounds, 4975 Centre Pointe Drive. This giant steel creation is modeled after a species of rhinoceros beetle from the jungles of Indonesia. While its horns and armored exoskeleton appear threatening, it is actually a harmless herbivore, using its horns to dig for food and engage in non-lethal combat for mates. By enlarging the creature's scale, the viewer can more easily appreciate the fantastic forms that evolution develops in enabling species to successfully compete. In turn, it is a reminder that life for all species involves competition, and that man's great challenge is to use this competitive drive to flourish, without destroying the species. Hours: daylight hours.

May 3 - 11 - Gummy Bear by Kaysia Grow, located in the Green space at intersection of East Montague Ave. and Spruill Ave. While its title alludes to the classic sweet and chewy candy, this bear is quite the opposite - prickly and fierce. Thousands of gumballs, the small, spiked fruit produced by sweetgum trees, cover the sculpture's surface to create the illusion of fur. Other natural materials, like palm fronds, are used to replicate the beast's teeth and claws. Hours: daylight hours.

May 3 - 11 - Level by Allison Koch, located at the Traffic Circle at Wescott Blvd. and Oak Forest Blvd. Inspired by order and rhythm and the general belief that people should "look up" more often, this geometric piece hopes to impose the perspective seen when looking upwards at a tall building. Polished steel rods are used to create line and direction with inserts of fabric imitating colorful windows. Both sides of the structure are approachable to create a curious and playful space with plenty of odd views and angles. Hours: daylight hours.

May 3 - 11 - Plane Garden by Malcolm Knight, located at the Median at Lackawanna Boulevard. Airplanes are a common site in the North Charleston skies, as the city is home to the Charleston International Airport and Joint Base Charleston. With the recent expansion of Boeing's operations in the area, they are

also a common topic when discussing the City's growth and prosperity. It is this connection between airplanes and growth that inspired this installation. Using styrofoam and steel, the artist creates the illusion of airplanes emerging from the earth, much like flowers blooming in a garden. Hours: daylight hours.

May 3 - 11 - Polyphemus by Kevin Mclean, located at Palmetto Gardens Park, East Montague Avenue. Referencing Homer's Odyssey and the Classical culture associated with it, this installation seeks to link Charleston to the birthplace of western civilization. A large one-eyed giant approximately ten feet tall and seemingly made of stone will loom over observers with his gigantic stature and intimidating glare. Hours: daylight hours.

May 3 - 11 - Walking Cage Birdfeeder by Victoria Honick, located at Northwoods Park Community Center, 8348 Greenridge Road. This playful steel design depicting a birdcage sitting upon two feminine, human-like legs plays on both the relationship between people and nature and the concept of freedom. The artist hopes to create a literal interaction between nature and the piece by filling the open cage with birdseed. The sight of wild birds flying in and out of the cage to feed is meant to illustrate the idea of openness and also encourages viewers to reflect on the nature within and around them. Hours: daylight hours.

May 3 - 11 - Student Sculptures, located at the North Charleston City Hall Lobby, 2500 City Hall Lane. Cultural Arts Department student interns, Caroline Guerotto and Allison Koch, will create and display contemporary sculpture pieces on pedestals. Drawn to the beauty of the simple replication of a single form, Guerotto's piece incorporates over 50 horse-shoe shaped pieces of wood geometrically placed to create an organic, spherical structure. Through the manipulation of thin steel rods and glass, Koch's whimsical piece imitates intertwined kites moving in the wind. Guerotto and Koch are both pursuing a degree in Studio Art at the College of Charleston. Hours: daily 8am-8pm.


### City of North Charleston, SC, Features Works by Linda Elksnin

Born in Pennsylvania, Elksnin's passion for art began in elementary school when she took classes at the Philadelphia

### Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Stephen Mueller and Carl Palazzolo for Spoleto Festival

The Gibbes Museum of Art in Charleston, SC, will present Spoleto Watercolors of Stephen Mueller and Carl Palazzolo From the Collection of David and Carol Rawle, on view in the Rotunda Galleries, from May 24 through Sept. 15, 2013.

The Gibbes Museum of Art in conjunction with the Spoleto Festival USA will present the extraordinary body of work created in Charleston by two significant contemporary artists: Stephen Mueller and Carl Palazzolo. Mueller and Palazzolo began visiting Charleston during the Festival in the early 1990s and created paintings inspired by their experiences in the city. We are delighted to have the opportunity to display the fruits of this twenty-year collaboration between collector and artist inspired by Charleston and Spoleto Festival USA.

Stephen Mueller's abstract paintings create a tension between background and foreground through the juxtaposition of delicate washes of color and bold, simplified shapes. The geometric abstractions were inspired by Mueller's interest in Eastern philosophy. Many of the shapes evoke mandalas, Buddha, bodhisattva figures, and items associated with these figures such as lightning bolts, mirrors, and prayer beads.

Mueller lived and worked in New York City, where he passed away in 2011.

Carl Palazzolo's unique paintings include recognizable imagery stripped of any context. This results in mysterious, abstract works evoking memories and dreams. Palazzolo often employs trompe l'oeil techniques to fool the eye and create a playful interaction with the viewer.

Curated by Karen Ann Myers, Assistant Director of the Halsey Institute, the exhibition brings together the work of five mixed-media artists from around the world who transform various types of literature and/or printed books through sculptural intervention. Despite the individual and exclusive perspective of each artist, there are remarkable connections in the themes and ideas they respectively mourn and celebrate. The fascinating range of examples, as diverse as books themselves, offers eloquent proof that-despite or because of the advance of digital media for sources of informationthe book's legacy as a carrier of ideas and communication is being expanded today

For generations, our society has been lamenting the loss of natural beauty and the dwindling of Earth's resources to the rising tide of industrial and technological "progress," all in the name of greater efficiency and luxury. With this emphasis on technology, the relevance of physical books in our culture is diminishing. Books as a vessel for accessible and easily communicated knowledge are becoming somewhat antiquated. The tangible, permanent information presented in books is quickly being replaced with digital media and the Internet, which exemplify fluidity and constant change. In our everevolving digital present, we see a variety of once-cherished technologies losing their importance and luster at an increasingly rapid rate.

Because of the confusion and sense of loss that emerge from this state, the artists in this exhibition have created their own responses. Some, like Laramée and Chen, directly address the parallels between the disappearance of natural spaces and books as an outdated mode of expression;

as a result, they carve landscapes from the pages and bindings. Deep crevasses, hidden caves, and awe-inspiring phenomena and landscapes emerge from chiseled pages. Alternately, some artists, like Beube, Pastine, and Dettmer, seek to find a place for books in the future, by digitizing or technologizing them. Here, images are created that are reminiscent of topographical maps, weather maps, readings from seismographs, or cross sections of the "bodies" of the books. These works are treated as surgeries or dissections; scalpels and needles are used to carve away the books' exteriors.

Brian Dettmer's precise excavation of books, page by page, focuses on taking something that already exists and introducing alternate histories and memories that reveal and illuminate new relationships. Long-Bin Chen combines the cultures of the East and West in his blend of sculpture and literature. Through this, we are prompted to examine the eternal vexation of communication and the social relationship we enjoy with books. Guy Laramée's work plays heavily on the idea of erosion, in that knowledge could very well be an erosive process rather than an accretion. In that light, he brings up the human fascination with the content of consciousness. In turn, he examines not what we think about but that we think. Utilizing the glossy publication Artforum, Francesca Pastine reveals the visceral topography of art trends by means of an unsolicited collaboration with the magazine and the cover artist. Doug Beube explores the book as an object, a seemcontinued on Page 14

ingly antiquated technology that is still purposeful in the digital age. He accepts its limited capacity as a personality flaw, but, moreover, acknowledges its elegance.

The importance of the book is remarkably ingrained in human psychology. It may be a simple carrier of information, yet even today it is treated as an object of great value. Books represent our desire to record, organize, and preserve the details of our existence. Through each artist's interventions, the book becomes even more sacred. For many of the artists, the historical and narrative value of the chosen material drives the pieces, and, by intimately getting to know the book they are working with, they are able to return it to a new life without destroying it.

In the face of unsettling changes, these artists appeal to a sense of monumentality in their work. The references to nature, religion, science, or cultural complexity allude to the idea that only concepts of the greatest importance stand the test of time. Despite the emphasis on the precariousness of human invention, these works do not display a completely bleak outlook on society's changes. The variety of color, form, and openness of composition among the works also celebrates the ingenuity of creating something new from something old. Books may seem under siege, but they are more realistically at a moment of transition. The artworks in this exhibition simultaneously celebrate and forewarn the viewers of the fine line between monuments and ruins

Butler considers himself an artist who teaches and shares his knowledge with other aspiring artists. He has taught at various art schools including Braitman Studio, Gaston Day School, Gaston College, and Gaston School of the Arts. In 2002, he was honored with the Teacher of the Year Award at Gaston Day School for his outstanding teaching abilities.

Butler's current work is a mixture of oil paint and encaustic painting techniques. These techniques have afforded

him the opportunity to experiment within the realm of mixed media. His paintings are often layered with multiple colors combinations that enhance the surface, creating a tactile effect. The textures are rich with both brushstroke and palette knife work. His paintings seem to come together at a distance with his imagery, and yet, work on a purely abstract level as you approach them.

Most of Butler's work is based in landscape yet it is not rooted in a particular place, but instead speaks to a general mood or feeling he has experienced from being surrounded by nature. His style is contemporary focusing on the flat abstract nature of the picture plane versus the illusion of space; and he skillfully balances both of these ideas into a singular piece. He is well known for his encaustic style.

The word encaustic literally means "to burn in" and involves heating wax and mixing in colored pigments or oil paints. This technique was originally developed by the ancient Greeks and experienced a resurgence in the 20th-century.

repetitive, small, large, tight, scattered, mark making mark making marks made, make a mark, do it again – automatic writing, automatic drawing, thought, no thought, control, not controlled - like many things going on in today's world. Straight curved waves nature manmade imitate nature – presentations of human touch on wood or paper illuminated by graphite or ink.

Automatic drawing was considered a form of expression by the subconscious created without consistent, rational control. André Breton, the French artist, defined surrealism as "pure psychic automatism." André Masson, Miro, Dali, Jean Arp all practiced automatic drawing. There was an artistic movement in Canada in the 1940s called "Automatism." One reads more often of automatic writing, although we know that mark making is just that, whether it creates a word or image - representational or not. Many believed the results express something of either the psyche or provided by "spirits" using the "artist" as a medium.

Spontaneity in approach would likely be the word used today and most would shy away from discussions of the psyche taking control or a "spirit" separate from the human making the creation as that intimates mumbo jumbo far from the general viewer's comfort level. Picasso would perhaps discuss getting back to our childhood level of letting go of control. In pure form, automatic writings or drawings are not corrected but the material can be the springboard for work where some control is introduced or the automated work suggests images. But in a world where control seems to be the buzzword and freedom seems protected for the wrong things and not for pure reasons, the simplicity of mark making without complete formal intent is a breath of fresh air.

The lack of color in these works provides a place of relief also. Ink is the substance of choice for Jackson and graphite for Wendt. From large to very small, variety yet similarity provides a resting place for the spirit of the viewer.

Wendt's current thoughts on his work

are that, "A particular discipline is practiced here determined by an immediate mental and emotional state allowing an idea to express itself in communication with the hands in a direct way without the interference of pre-determined deliberation resulting in drawings participating in their own making that elude representative or abstract art to the extent that those who look will see something captured that escapes explanation and is comprehended without analysis."

Jackson states, "Borrowing from my training as an architect these non-representational pen and ink compositions include elements of both hard line drafting and freehand sketching. They were initiated as a creative counterpoint to the rigid, representational work required in architectural rendering. The aim of this series of drawings was to examine texture, tone and precision through line work. Each piece is conceived with self-invented constraints while the execution is intended to be a spontaneous and creative process allowing for progression and innovation. Uninterrupted, straight lines are executed with a

continuous vertical stroke not unlike the vertical cut of a Japanese sword."

Alan Jackson is originally from Savannah, GA. He graduated from the University of Florida in 1975 and worked in architectural offices in Savannah, Beaufort, Kiawah Island and Charleston. He has lived in Charleston since 1979. He is a LEED accredited professional. He is a self taught black & white photographer. His work was featured in a solo exhibits at the Charleston City Gallery in 1989 and his photographs have been featured at the Charleston County Public Library and local businesses. He has studied the Japanese martial art of Aikido since 1984 and the Japanese sword arts of Kendo. These studies have influenced his artwork.

Primarily a self-taught artist, Allan Wendt has been drawing all his life. He was born in Columbia and has lived in Charleston for 35 years. "I was an artist as a girl and then began oil painting in my teenage years. By the time I went to college, I decided I already knew how to paint, so I did not major in art. This may have been better for me than I thought, for through the years my older female students who studied art found they were required to paint soup cans and were often taken advantage of by others. I now realize that in learning to paint, even this lifetime will not be enough. I have 55 ribbons in a back drawer, including 10 best of shows. Entering art shows taught

me a lot, including how to look at myself and grow and to become more self-confident, realizing one can be a winner without the ribbon or prize. I have studied through the years with artists I admire in the US and Europe. I lived in France for six months, painting *plein aire*. I spent many years teaching. I find it rewarding to share my knowledge and try to help create in my students new ways to solve problems and learn "to see."

"A journey that I have taken for some years was to combine art and theology. It began a few years ago when I published a children's book, entitled *Can We See God?*, having done both the writing and the illustrations. When I moved to Charleston ten years ago, continuing my

journey, I entered an art show entitled *Witness*. I immediately knew where I wanted to go to paint - Crisis Ministries in Charleston, also known as the homeless shelter. I sat my easel right there in the courtyard. I have many stories I have collected from these people. Both men and women talked with me and allowed me to paint them."

Poorten goes on to say, "I moved here from Dallas, where I also spent time at a homeless shelter, and was known as the Bar-B-Q lady, since I made lots of sandwiches for them. Here in Charleston I became known as the paint lady. These pictures were painted on location, with my sitters hired by me to sit, much to their surprise. Along with these pictures came a new path. I believe the spirit always moves us if we take the chance and follow."

"I married a man from Charleston, long after my first husband died of cancer. I had just obtained a master's degree in theology. I wondered what I would do with my art and theology from Texas. I decided not to worry about this small detail. I very much wanted to continue painting at the shelter, and since I got to know the staff, they offered me a job as the chaplain!"

"The guests at the shelter were naturally drawn to me. They all volunteered to be painted. I knew this would bring a new sense of dignity to them. They teased each other a lot: "Man, she has you looking much better than you really look!" "Paint me, I am better looking than he is!" These paintings afforded something that is not easy to come by: people who have little in common get to know each other; people who are often fearful of each other get to know each other; people from sometimes different ethnic cultures get to know each other. They liked me and I liked them. Visiting this shelter comforts the afflicted

and afflicts the comfortable."

"It was amazing to hear their stories, some of which are shared in this show. In these faces we see the deep gravity of every human being. I expressed my almost religious awe towards life as I discovered the essential qualities of their lives. I tried to convey an impression of the person and the place. For me the figure comes first and color is an adjunct to form. I use color more to convey the psychological states of the figures. The colors can be toned down, even silenced, depending on the thing you are portraying. The sea or the open air may come into my paintings but they are a backdrop to the figures and I like to encapsulate figures in small spaces with a little or a lot of depth. Form takes precedence; color is an element that supports form and the whole point is to convey the psychological states of the figures. Relations between them are created by means of hands, bodies and glances."

"The proceeds of this show will be donated to our homeless and will directly affect the lives of the people for whom I deeply care."



# Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC, Offers Installation Exhibit in Conjunction with NC Museum of Art

The Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC, is offering a group of four art installations on the Penland campus, on view through Aug. 31, 2013. The installations are the work of Dan Bailey, Alison Collins, Kyoung Ae Cho, and Anne Lemanski, and they are part of a project called "0 to 60: The Experience of Time through Contemporary Art," which is a collaboration between Penland School and the North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC.

Filmmaker, animator, and photographer Dan Bailey has created a two-part work using time-lapse and low-altitude aerial balloon photography. *Looking Up* is a slow-moving time-lapse video of the sky over Penland. The vantage point is reversed in *Looking Down*, a large printed wall piece that is a collage of photographs of the campus made over many months using a camera attached to a helium balloon.

Alison Collins's *Temps Perdu* will fill the Dye Shed, a historic log structure at Penland, with hundreds of yards of muslin and hundreds of muslin leaves. On the yardage is text from Marcel Proust's novel "In Search of Lost Time". On the leaves are words that refer the things the artist herself has lost. The text is written using a dye Alison made from the rust that collected under some of her steel sculptures.

Anne Lemanski's *Extirpated* is about animal species that once inhabited this region but have disappeared with no hope of return. The format of Lemanski's piece is a series of clotheslines suspended between steel supports based on the contour of Kentucky long rifles. Hanging from the lines will be silhouette images of species that have disappeared from Mitchell County.

Kyoung Ae Cho's *Shining Ground*, Page 24 - Carolina Arts, May 2013 memorializes her discovery of mica the first time she visited Penland in 2000. The piece incorporates mica collected from the banks of the Toe River into vertical panels made of cloth, pins, and wood, which will be installed on the outside of the Northlight building. The piece is her attempt to recapture, many years later, the moment of quiet surprise when she first saw the ground covered with the sheen of mica sand.

The other component of the "0 to 60" project is a major exhibition at the North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC. The exhibition, which is open now and runs through Aug. 11, 2013, includes work by the four installation artists along with twenty-eight other artists, many of whom have connections to Penland. This exhibition engages the viewer in an experiential and conceptual journey through time, looking at how time can be used as form, content, and material, and how art is used to represent, evoke, manipulate, or transform time.

Penland School of Crafts is an international center for craft education dedicated to helping people live creative lives. Located in Western North Carolina, Penland offers workshops in books and paper, clay, drawing and painting, glass, iron, metals, printmaking and letterpress, photography, textiles, and wood. The school also sponsors artists' residencies, an outreach program, and a gallery and visitors center. Penland is a nonprofit, tax-exempt institution which receives support from the North Carolina Arts Council, an agency funded by the State of North Carolina and the National Endowment for the Arts, which believes that a great nation deserves


### Mica Gallery in Bakersville, NC, Features Works by Sondra Dorn



Also on view will be works by Seattle artist, Carol Milne, who is new to the gallery. Several of her knitted glass sculptures





"It's hard to pinpoint influences," Walker says, "and I hate doing it because you get categorized so easily. But Conrad Marca-Relli is a major influence, and maybe Helen Frankenthaler. I admire her work though I think that my work looks very different. But I like to work with watered-down paint, like her, and I pour paint. I like Robert Motherwell, too, but I

don't study him. In my small pieces I like to play with scale, like he did. The small pieces seem monumental because the shape in them is so large."

Walker works with brayers, spackling scrapers and her hands. And she pours and squirts from plastic bottles, sometimes with two or more holes to create multiple streams, parallel lines. She mostly uses unprimed canvas, applying thin layers of acrylic paint, though her small pieces are often on wood, painted with oils.

The Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, will present *Found in Translation: The Art of Steven Naifeh*, featuring the first retrospective exhibition of contemporary works by this SC based artist, on view from May 17 through Sept. 1, 2013.

with intellectual discipline, rigorous skill and authentic joy in the process of communication.

Found in Translation is destined to inspire our community and open doors to understanding cultures beyond our own. It shows visitors that what we share culturally is perhaps greater than what separates us. Abstract art is capable of expressing complex ideas like unity and continuity.

"We all need to understand more about the world in which we live, and Naifeh's exhibition is a smart, vibrant way of encountering Middle Eastern ideas," CMA Chief Curator, Will South, said.

Naifeh has exhibited work throughout the Islamic world including Abu Dhabi, Jordan, Pakistan and the Muslim cities of Kano and Kaduna in Nigeria. He studied art with the Nigerian artist Bruce Onobrakpeya. He also studied contemporary art with Sam Hunter, former curator of the Museum of Modern Art and the Jewish Museum, and he studied Islamic art with Oleg Grabar and Cary Welch.

Gerard Erley, an Illinois native currently living in South Carolina, has had over two dozen solo exhibits throughout the United States. Erley creates his imaginary landscapes in oil paint on canvas and panels. He rarely refers to photos or sketches, preferring to paint in the studio from memory and intuition. The artist is influenced by such 19th-century American and European painters as George Inness, Corot, and Turner. Like them, he seeks a sublime quality of light in his romantic landscapes.

"The oil paintings on display are divided into two distinct bodies of work, thus the title of the exhibit, *From Vistas to Vases*," says Erley.

The landscape paintings (the Vistas) represent a direction to which I have been committed for a number of years. Although these paintings present the landscape, I do not paint nature in an attempt to duplicate

what the eye sees. Rather, landscape imagery is explored for its expressive potential, its unique emotional language. The oil paintings are created without the aid of photographs or on-site sketches. Instead, I rely on a mixture of impressions from nature, an awareness of art history, and a healthy dose of intuition. What I hope to realize in paint is something both poetic and persuasively real.

The floral paintings (or Vases) are a recent exploration. In them, I reference actual flowers as I paint. The blooms provide intense colors, unique shapes, and sometime potent aromas, all of which inspire my visual journey. On the canvas, a playful arrangement of elements results, not unlike a jazz improvisation on a given melody.

"I find that painting the landscapes (with no real land in sight) leads to a seemingly more 'literal' take on the subject, presenting views that just might actually exist. In contrast, in working from life with the flowers, I am prompted to work in a less "realistic" manner, leading to a free form approach to color and shape. I am surprised that this should be the case. Oh, the vagaries of art!," says Erley.

# South Carolina State Museum in Columbia, SC, Offers Advertising Art

The South Carolina State Museum in Columbia, SC, is presenting *Between the Springmaid Sheets*, featuring advertising art used in a controversial ad campaign which helped turn a struggling Springs Mills into one of the giants of the textile industry, on view through Sept. 8, 2013.

Through dozens of works of art, the exhibition tells the story of Springs, a struggling enterprise in 1931 when dashing World War I flying ace Col. Elliott Springs inherited his father's business. The exhibition explains how the brilliant and daring Springs used racy images and innuendo-laced text to catapult his struggling cloth business to prominence following World War II.

"The principle focus of the exhibition and accompanying catalogue is the collection of original maquettes (illustrations) and associated advertisements by internationally known illustrators such as James Montgomery Flagg, George Petty and Rockwell Kent," said Karen Derksen, director of Winthrop University Galleries, who curated the exhibit for Winthrop University Galleries in 2012.

"Through these illustrative works, Between the Springmaid Sheets explores the motivations and societal circumstances that built the successful brand still known today as Springmaid."

Springs began commissioning artwork depicting attractive young women as his "Springmaids." The ads were considered risqué at the time (and some still are), but the controversy only promoted the product even more, and the legendary marketing savant restored Springs Mills to prosperity by the 1950s.

While the advertising industry initially called Springs's ads "degrading," today his potpourri of risqué images, puns and double entendres is studied at major universities around the world.

"These illustrations and their slogans have become part of the visual culture of

our state and beyond," said State Museum Curator of Art Paul Matheny. "The artwork and its use in advertisements in nationally published magazines has become an important and influential part of our cultural history."

Advertising alone didn't turn the company's fortunes around, however. Savvy business moves on Springs's part had the mill manufacturing not just cloth, but finished textile goods, primarily bed sheets, after World War II. Springs also modernized and expanded the company.

Realizing that the success of this new structure depended on a national market for his finished textiles, Springs devised a nationwide ad campaign that provoked but with humor, that combined the ridiculous with the sublime by transforming a typical sexy ad into a cartoon.

Nearly 20 years earlier, Springs had proposed the idea to his father, and in the post-war world he brought out his concept of cartoons laced with witty double entendres. It was as clever as it was provocative, and its intellectual properties caught the public's imagination, and its dollars. Captions often described the action in the cartoon, and the images became known by these descriptions: "A Buck Well Spent," "Clothes Make the Man, or How to Put the Broad in Broadcloth," or "You Can't Go Wrong on Fort Mill Sheets." The attractive "Springmaids" depicted in the ads

often were modeled for the paintings by female employees of the company.

"Winthrop Galleries is grateful to the South Carolina State Museum for its support of this exhibition and excited that Springs's important legacy in advertising history is reaching a greater audience," said Derksen.

### Columbia Museum of Art Features Prints by Pablo Picasso

The Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, is presenting *Picasso: Master Prints*, featuring some of the artist's greatest prints, on view in the Mamie and William Andrew Treadway, Jr., Gallery 15 through August 11, 2013.

Picasso: Master Prints showcases etchings, lithographs and silkscreens by Pablo Picasso, the most influential artist of the 20th century. the Weatherspoon Museum. This selection includes a set of 10 color pochoirs continued above on next column to the right (silkscreens) made in the early 1920s. The set of pochoirs in *Master Prints* was published by Picasso's dealer of that time, Paul Rosenberg.

Picasso's images were inspired by his work for the famous Ballets Russe (Russian Ballet) and the Commedia dell'Arte, a 16th century form of Italian theatre characterized by masks. Themes from these two theatrical sources made their way into the prints through the characters of Harlequin (a clown) and Pulcinella (the ancestor of Punch). Visitors also see the guitar-the instrument of the wandering troubadour-reconfigured by way of

In addition to the brilliantly colored pochoirs, this exhibition includes classic black and white work by the master. One is *The Coiffure of 1923*. In his neoclassical style, Picasso transforms the visual solidity of Greek sculpture into minimalist modern lines. Though this image is small in scale and the artist uses almost no detail, a sense of classical grandeur is realized by positioning the figures in a pyramid.

"In *Picasso: Master Prints*, we see that the creativity of Picasso knew no bounds, making this small but dynamic exhibition a true must-see show," CMA Chief Curator Will South said.



### Johnsonville, SC, Dedicates **Statue of Francis Marion by** Alex Palkovich - May 18, 2013

Johnsonville, SC, Mayor Steve Dukes and city council members have announced that the long-awaited dedication of the statue of General Francis Marion by Florence, SC, artist Alex Palkovich, will be held at 1pm on Saturday, May 18, 2013, during the City's Heritage Festival. The dedication also coincides with the 100th anniversary of the founding of Johnson-

The seven-foot-tall statue of the Revolutionary War hero is ten feet wide and features General Marion's torso and the head of his Marsh Tacky horse. It will be erected on a 12-foot base at the very site in Johnsonville where the General received his commission to lead the militia of patriots from the Johnsonville area.

"We are excited that the statue will finally be placed on the property where General Marion actually served our nation," said Dukes. "That it falls on the 100th anniversary of our City's founding and during our exceptional Heritage Festival is an even greater plus."

'This lasting homage to our area's rich history could not have happened without the financial and emotional support of our



fine citizens and area friends," Dukes said. He added that the area where the statue will be placed will be hailed as a Veterans' Park that will feature ongoing ways to honor the area's veterans, of which Francis Marion is among the most notable. The ceremony on May 18 will also honor the Hemingway 1-178th National Guard unit dubbed "the Swamp Fox Brigade" - who recently served in Afghanistan.

Marion, a French Huguenot from the Berkeley County region of the state, spent lots of time during the war maneuvering the swamps and rivers in what was then referred to as Williamsburg Township which covered most of the Pee Dee region of the state. He was commissioned to lead the Williamsburg Militia on the banks of the Lynches River at the location just outside of Johnsonville then called Witherspoon's Ferry - now Venters Landing, the actual location where the statue bearing his likeness will be placed.

The NC Pottery Center in Seagrove, NC, will present BIG RED: Chrome Red and Other Red Glazes of the North Carolina Piedmont, an exhibit co-curated by Fred Johnston and Tommy and Cindy Edwards, on view from May 10 through July 27, 2013. A reception will be held on May 10, starting at 5:30pm, where a brief lecture by co-curator and potter, Fred Johnston, of Johnston and Gentithes Studio will be given.

From the earliest days of North Carolina's traditional art pottery production, potters sought to achieve a vibrant red glaze. The most successful red glazes fashioned in the 1930s are today referred to by the name, "chrome red." Their reddish-orange color was created by the addition of chromium oxide to the potters' usual lead glaze, a coating that was used Page 34 - Carolina Arts, May 2013

by area potters for centuries before on utilitarian wares. The red glaze was a hit with customers, and essentially every art pottery shop, including J. B. Cole's Pottery, Auman Pottery, Royal Crown Pottery and Porcelain Co., Smithfield Art Pottery, and others, added it to their repertoire.

In addition to chrome red, Jugtown Pottery's Chinese Blue glaze was often highlighted by bold patches of red, as were wares made by North State Pottery and others. In the 1970s, lead-free glazes were used by Seagrove area potters, including red glazes produced by J. B. Cole's Pottery, A. R. Cole Pottery, and Owens Pottery.

BIG RED: Chrome Red and Other Red Glazes of the North Carolina Piedmont, an exhibit mounted and organized by

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
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the North Carolina Pottery Center, will display some of the finest examples of red glazed pottery produced in the state. Examples, dating from the 1920s and 1930s to the present day, come from more than a dozen private collections. Recently created chrome red glazed pottery, made for the first time in perhaps half a century, is included in the exhibit.

of each material in her sculptures. She is inspired by patterns and textures that she finds in nature and in built surroundings. She says she carries her sketchbook with her everywhere so that she can sketch an idea as soon as it comes to her, to later make the sketches into sculptural works. The term "tectour" is a combination of the syllables "TEC" which stand for "archiTECture and TECtonics. McAninch hopes viewers will travel through many different textural worlds when viewing this exhibition.

Garry Turpin's show, The Circle of Life, is a chronology of his art from the 1970s until the present day. His paintings show personal experiences throughout his life. The subject matter moves seamlessly from portrait studies to clouds. His paintings delight all viewers.

Rickis has studied art at the Hartford Art School - University of Hartford and Central Connecticut State University and is currently working with watercolor and oil collages, as well as mixed media. His exhibit demonstrates instinctive talent with abstract compositions and traditional landscapes made up of sharp contrasting colors. Rickis has several memberships in art organizations and relocated to Roebuck, SC, in 2011. His art work is in collections throughout the United States.

Rickis shows how to transform a traditional two dimensional painting surface into a visual three dimensional masterpiece. By layering 300 pound cold-press painted watercolor paper, he brings the paintings to life-like form. After 40 years of painting, watercolor is still Rickis's favorite medium. He states his most popular landscapes are of "barns in winter scenes as I like to contrast the warmth of barn board siding with the cool contrast of snow and its shadows. My objective creating art is to present visual interpretations

of objects I see and imagine based on my experiences and impressions." One of his more abstract paintings, Neapolitan, will be on display, inspired by the mixtures of colors from the classic chocolate, vanilla, and strawberry ice cream combination.

Roy McBee Smith, Jr. also joined the Guild's Board of Trustees this past year and serves as Chairperson of our Publicity Committee. He is a resident and artist in Spartanburg and works at USC Upstate in technologies while promoting his works both locally and throughout the southeastern United States. Having grown up in a family of artists, Smith began drawing at a very young age and has continued to make the creation and study of art an integral part of his life. He formally studied 2 dimensional and 3 dimensional arts in college, and currently attends workshops and continues to collaborate with and learn from other artists.

Smith has been commissioned for portraits, has donated works to various non-profits and charities within the community, painted murals, and has been invited to show in galleries throughout the southeast. Many of his current works are of the impressionistic style, and he enjoys presenting a variety of works using different painting techniques.





## **Arts Council of York County in Rock** Hill, SC, Offers Work by Matthew Allred

Rock Hill, SC, will present The Arc of Time, featuring photographs by Matthew Allred, on view in the Dalton Gallery at the Center for the Arts, from May 3 through June 16, 2013. A reception will be held on May 16, starting at 6pm.

The exhibition is an examination of the extended length of the photographic moment as well as the aesthetic possibilities of primitive cameras and chemical processes. perspective of the pinhole, the sun appears to arc across the sky and is reminiscent of the ancient geocentric model of the heavens. From this, one is able to begin to glean what a massive paradigm shift the heliocentric model was and why it once seemed to defy common sense for so

Allred holds his BFA in photography from Boise State University, and his MFA in photography from the University of Utah. He is currently the Artistic Director of "A" Gallery in Salt Lake City, UT, and is a professor in the Department of Art at the University of Utah. Allred's work has been exhibited across the United States in





edges of the pages he's interested in.

Once he's back in his Asheville, NC, studio, Hayes will cut up the book and experiment by bending it into different shapes. "The mass of pages is so appealing and flexible in a way I wish steel were," he says. Once he finds a shape he particularly likes, he uses metal to bind it into place.

Hayes has been exacting and perfecting his unique approach, working for a time as a welder - "I wanted to make sure metalworking abilities would not interfere with my concept," he says.

A 2007 fellowship at the Penland School of Crafts in North Carolina gave Hayes the freedom he needed to focus exclusively on his art.

There is so much that appeals to Hayes about books: the history, the smell, the tactile reaction of fingers to the pages. He wants his pieces to whisper, not scream. "I'm trying to accomplish quietness in my work," he says. "I hope to stop a person for a second."

Hayes's work is available at several galleries, including Blue Spiral in Asheville, NC, the Gallery at the Museum of Contemporary Craft in Portland, OR, Rebus Works in Raleigh, NC, and now here at MoNA Gallery in Charlotte.



In his art, Green draws upon his own intimate personal experiences, steeped in the traditions of family, community and life in the southern United States. Each of his paintings is a testament to the motivating power of place. This show is a retrospective of his vivid, colorful work. Through much of his career, Green has shared familiar images of his ancestral home and the Gullah culture. Each painting has served as a testament to the motivating power of place as he draws upon his own intimate personal experiences, steeped in the traditions of family; community; and life in the southern United States.

Celebrated for his vibrant depictions of rural life along the South Carolina coast, this retrospective confirms that Green's work offers far more. Rarely seen images from his early years include abstracts and paintings that allude to cubism as Green explored different styles. Once settled, Green employed his mastery of color and skillful use of the human figure to open the Gullah culture to the world.

There are multihued blankets hanging on a clothesline with a hint of a woman in a wide red skirt peeking through; turn and find men fishing from a canoe. Look closely and you will find a painting that is more than a woman-with-child in a canoe, it is Green's mother, Ruth, pregnant with the artist. Turn again and we find deep introspection.

Throughout this exhibition, Green reveals the universal path that we each travel as we seek to find our place and purpose. Ultimately, we walk away with a deep sense of community, believing that the challenges of love, work and belonging can be met.

Green was born and raised in the Low Country of South Carolina. He is an international professional artist who graduated from The School of the Art Institute of Chicago in 1982. Green is considered by many art critics and reviewers to be one of our nation's most outstanding African-American artists and a highly recognized visual master for capturing Southern culture and traditions. His high level of social interest and cultural commitments have brought him international recognition, along with his numerous exhibitions and travel throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, the West Indies, Switzerland, Germany, United Kingdom, France, Italy, and Japan.

While his work has ranged in styles, his best known approach to painting may be termed "narrative realism." It is through his narrative art style that Green captures and records his life experiences and the rich cultural heritage of the Gullah community in which he was raised. It is Green's mastery of color and skillful use of the human figure, which allows him to preserve and share with the viewer a deep sense of community, and how the challenges of love, work and belonging are met.

As a result of his tremendous and prolific talent, Green's work has been embraced by collectors and critics throughout the

world. His paintings can be found in major museum and cultural collections in California, Florida, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Vermont, Japan, Germany, Brussels, and Sierra Leone. Since 1982 Jonathan Green has received numerous honors and awards for art, social, civic, and cultural contributions. He has received Honorary Doctor of Art Degrees from the University of South Carolina, Columbia, SC and the Coastal Carolina University in Conway, SC for his capturing and recording Southern culture and history.

Etched in the Eyes: The Spirit of a People Called Gullah Geechee is a traveling exhibition that is part of an ongoing initiative designed to document the African Diaspora of the Low Country and Sea Islands along the eastern coastline of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida. This ever expanding collection of narratives displayed through images and oral history provides an intimate experience with the culture that ebbs and flows along the Gullah

Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor. Herman extends artistic and cultural exploration through this traveling photography and educational exhibit. This presentation also allows viewers to cross a bridge that will never be destroyed, a bridge that although burned by the trades of time has stood because of deep roots in the spirit.

Returning home to his native Georgetown, SC, writer and photographer Herman, sets out to examine "the young, the old, and the lives in between" of the unique Gullah Geechee coastal culture. He relates his strong ties to his homeland, family, and ancestry through thought-provoking photographs, video and writing.

Herman offered the following statement, "The creator allows us to be a breathing vessel that can see, feel, and live. We can stretch to fit our imagination and then grow to imagine more. As an artist, I am inspired to create and recreate from the realities of life. My artistic endeavors are direct reflections of time, perception, and the living."

A son of the Gullah Geechee people, Herman has roots deeply embedded in the soil of South Carolina. Currently, he serves as Co-founder/Creative Director of Preservation LINK, Inc., an education agency that works to educate youth through media arts and technology. Herman extends artistic and cultural exploration through his traveling exhibits and works to advance the field of visual literacy, preservation, and education. Herman is currently working towards his PhD in Art Education.

In her signature style, Canadian photographer Julie Moos captures a generation of women who have been active citizens, church members, and civil rights activists in Birmingham, AL. I Got Freedom Up Over My Head: Portraits by Julie Moos, Photographs from the Bank of America Collection features a series of fourteen photographs of the senior sisters of Birmingham, Alabama's New Pilgrim Baptist Church.

These women are called the hat ladies in reference to the stunning crowns of fur, felt and straw. These special creations are customarily adorned with festoons of feathers, cascades of artificial flowers, or bold assemblies of sequins and rhinestones. The regal headdresses attest to the churchgoers' desire to glorify the heavenly Savior each Sunday by outfitting themselves in the most splendid possible raiment.

In addition to being steadfast supporters of their church, the hat ladies look after the sick and raise money for college scholarships. Many of them were involved in the registration of black voters during the 1960s, which ultimately helped lead to the passage of significant civil rights legislation. These photographs serve as a historical documentation of a powerful group of women whose contributions to their community will never be forgotten.

Moos uses a large-format camera, simple lighting and a mobile studio to create portraits of people in pairs. She works in series to explore specific social and historical issues, including high school

camaraderie and rivalries (*Friends and Enemies*, 2000), the legacy of racism in the Deep South (*Domestic*, 2001), the impact of genetically altered crops on American agriculture (*Monsanto*, 2002) and notions of allegiance and betrayal (*Loyalty*, 2007). The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middleand upper-class consumers.

American Glass showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Children draw the darndest things. What might lie within their deceptively simple depictions? Local artist Jill Eberle has vividly brought to life drawings of monsters created by children in a new series of paintings. In fall 2012 Eberle asked Melissa Giglio, then the art teacher at Arapahoe Charter School, to have her first grade students each draw a monster. Eberle then made a careful tracing of the child's drawing and interpreted it as a 3-dimensional realistic creature in an environment. Each piece uses classic oil painting techniques and some include imagery from well-known historical art works. The results are captivating creatures - cute, scary, charming or just odd - that glimpse into the minds of both the children and the artist. The child's drawing is displayed along with the painting it inspired which encourages a delightful game of comparison.

"The kids drawings are full of imagination," says Eberle. "As I began developing the tracings, they suddenly appeared rich with character and strong emotions. Creating these paintings has tapped into my own early memories and challenged my representational painting skills as I try to create a logical anatomy and scenario for each creature. It's a departure from my usual work and it's been pure fun."

Raised in a beach town in southern Connecticut, Eberle began modeling for noted artist and teacher Robert Brackman as a teenager. Like many others on a journey in the arts, Eberle found herself engaged in a remarkable number of occupations including illustrator, prop

builder, architectural draftsman, counselor and sailmaker. Over decade of work in New York City was followed by a six-year stint in the Caribbean living on a sailboat. While there, she began using the skills gathered over the years to start painting.

Eventually returning to the United States and settling in North Carolina, Eberle attended East Carolina University where she earned her MFA in 2003. The university hired her upon graduation. Eberle has taught drawing, painting, illustration and artistic anatomy at ECU since 2003. In addition, this summer she will be teaching at Penland School of Crafts.

Eberle maintains in a studio above New Bern Artworks and exhibits her work throughout the region. Venues for recent solo and small group shows include the Imperial Centre in Rocky Mount, Greenville Museum of Art, Theatre Art Gallery in High Point and the Green Hill Center for NC Art in Greensboro, NC. 

13 years. In 2009 she traveled to Cochin, India to create a dedication mural for the Home of Hope orphanage located there. She is also active in the film community as a specialty prop maker.

Huber's fascination with the interaction of water and land is the subject of her new series "Where the Water Meets the Land." As she notes, this has always been a place of transition, and handmade paper seems an ideal medium to express this

"In its formation it is liquid. Once formed it always contains a percentage of water," says Huber. "Anything floating in the vat becomes part of the sheet. Anything the new sheet comes into direct contact with during the drying process becomes part of the sheet, either in the leaving of an impression, or in being included in the final surface. Sometimes these inclusions will partially emerge as would shells in the sand, or leaves through

Scott James was born and raised in Columbia, SC. His roots, however, are less artistic than academic. He received his Ph.D. in Philosophy from the University of Maryland in 2005; in 2007, he joined the Philosophy and Religion Department at the University of North Carolina, Wilmington, where he is currently Associate Professor of Philosophy.

James' photography career, on the other hand, began in 2006 with a trip to New Zealand (where he was scheduled to speak at a philosophy conference). As it happened, most of his time was spent traveling the countryside in pursuit of perfect lighting rather than philosophical insight. Such a background may encourage some

to see his photographs as especially fraught with philosophical significance. That, according to James, would be "a happy coincidence."

James states, "Photography tends to encourage a kind of complacency in the viewer. We tend to assume that the camera functions as little more than a window onto the world: what we see is what is." James uses composite photography to force a new awareness of his subject, exploiting this complacency most viewers experience with classic photography. His process involves the use of traditional portraits combined with a series of foliage photos. Using digital post-processing techniques, two or three images are fused. When two or three objects occupy the same image, the mind reflexively positions these in the same represented space, but almost instantaneously the mind balks at this visual confusion, and inevitably fills in the gaps. Sometimes the artist's choice of who was fused with what is deliberate, sometimes it is not.

When Ali Givens travels, she is constantly looking for ways to convey what she sees within her fabric art. Viewers may discover her interpretation of mountains in China, or the intensity of Costa Rica's foliage. Inspiration can come by the way other artists have broken things down into lines and shapes. Givens likes to further simplify things into brightly colored shapes, and create fun new compositions. Working with batiks, the patterns in these fabrics creto Givens. The energy in these patterns often emerges as new forms in her quilts. She creates art quilts that celebrate color. Layering fabrics and threads, the end result is sometimes a surprise for both artist and

Eric Saunders' subject matter is outdoor landscapes - both natural and urban. He

utilizes both color and black and white photography. Sometimes he experiments with other subjects like architecture and artifacts, and the digital manipulation of his images. There is no particular story line to his work. Saunders tries to communicate the beauty of abstract art, and the whimsy or intrigue of transient moments in nature and life.

Lynn Wartski's sculpture incorporates unexpected and wildly varied materials in representational forms that possess a playful steampunk style. Recent concentration on figure pieces and a themed group show based on the wonders of childhood, lead her to a truly whimsical combination - figure sculpture turned art doll. Intrigued by the vast array of possibilities, Wartski's sketchbook soon was populated with fantastical inhabitants. These sketches have now been rendered three dimensionally in surprising combinations of materials. Torch-fired enamel-clad copper nails form eyes that peer from hammered copper faces. Dolls dressed in rich textiles, hardware, leather, and metal sit quietly lacing a shoe, swing from a trapeze, or atop an antique bicycle.



Salazar deploy seemingly passé artistic interests - craft, realism, and the countryside - to re-animate familiar visual languages. Sculpture by Julia Gootzeit and video by Michael Lauch strategically mine our alienation from nature, creating possible avenues through which to reestablish a close connection.

Together, these artists engage timely topics including but not limited to social prejudice, sexual confinement, capitalist hegemony, and outmoded forms of expression, as well as people's estrangement from their cultural roots and the natural environment. While tackling such critical concerns, they use sincere inquiry as a means of reorienting artistic practice, illuminating overlooked perspectives, and imagining new ones. In the face of cultural indifference, the works in Sincerely Yours, challenge assumptions through earnest and sophisticated approaches to both individual and collective identity.

this to say about Boggess, "Boggess compels the viewer to contemplate each scene in turn, and finally the cycle of scenes: the lapse of hours; the alternating character of the rocks, of the trees and of the land; the turn of the season. The paintings themselves become the spaces they portray."

"In many large and small ways, Lynn Boggess's paintings reflect the entire tradition of landscape painting... Yet, the artist does not set out to make his works conform to a preconceived style; rather, he melds the tradition and his own experiences into a way of seeing and a style in landscape painting which is uniquely his own."

"Taking to the open in, quite literally, all kinds of weather, Boggess paints his subject as he stands in its midst," adds Hollinger. "If the snow seems to fly across the picture plane, it is because Boggess stood there, working against time and the elements. When viewers say to him, 'I feel as if I really am in the picture,' it is surely because Boggess was there when he painted it."

in Greensboro, NC, Fine received her undergraduate degrees in psychology and English and an MFA in creative writing from UNC-Greensboro. She studied with Fred Chappell, Robert Watson and Lee Zacharias. She studied printmaking with Beth Grabowski at UNC-Chapel Hill and attended two years of graduate school at the School of Design, NCSU, Raleigh. Fine taught graphic design and typography as a professor of art at Meredith College from 1997 to 2008. Juried into Artspace in 2003, Fine occupied Studio 208 from 2008 until 2012.

Joomi Chung's *Surfaces* is a 30 by 50-foot floor installation made of recycled rubber. She created the shapes by abstracting found images, with a process that begins by tracing images from various sources onto clear acetate rolls and then reworking the two-dimensional shapes into three dimensions. She composes the hundreds of rubber forms onto the ground in an ever-changing installation. Each individual shape is lightweight, and as it accrues in a floor installation, it becomes very heavy. A form of radical mapping, she translates memories into lived experiences or, as the artist puts it, the "topographical landscape of memory." Chung is interested in the physical relationship

of her work with viewers, and in creating a simultaneous visual and physical space, "interpreted as a map and contemplated as a landscape."

Born in South Korea, Chung moved to the US in 2001. She earned a BFA in painting and an MFA Research Certificate at Hong IK University in Seoul, South Korea. She went on to obtain an MFA degree from the University of Massachusetts Amherst. Her work is a part of several permanent collections, including the Dayton Art Institute and the Cincinnati Art Museum. Recent exhibitions include the December Artists Group Exhibition, SÍM Gallery, Reykjavik, Iceland and *The* 12th Alpan International 2010, Alpan Gallery, Huntington, NY, at which she was awarded Best in Show by juror Hitomi Iwasaki, Director of Exhibitions at the Queens Museum of Arts in New York.



Join us for the world premiere of Dinosaurs in Motion, where visitors engage with - and learn from - 14 magnificent, life-size metal dinosaur sculptures inspired by actual fossils. The new exhibition runs May 18 through Sept. 8, 2013, at the North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences in downtown Raleigh, NC.

Dinosaurs in Motion sculptures take interactivity to a whole new dimension. Visitors can manipulate each dinosaur via lever-and-pulley systems or remote controls in a brand new exhibit that fuses Art with traditional STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) for STEAM. Visitors are also taken along an apprentice's path that ends at Innovation Stations, where they can test their creativity and newfound technological inspiration with hands-on activities that include creating their own sculptures out of recycled material scraps.

The story of the artist, North Carolina sculptor John Payne, runs through the heart of *Dinosaurs in Motion*. Payne was a trained metalsmith with a passion for learning and discovery. In art, he found the infinite world of expression. Payne devoted his life to creating metal

kinetic dinosaurs, inspired by the universally enchanting effect dinosaurs have on people and the many hours he spent with his children admiring the dinosaurs at The Field Museum in Chicago. to human experience. Jessica Dupuis alters mundane but personally meaningful childhood objects into stunning ceramic sculptures through the application of thousands of shards of slip-coated, kiln-fired paper. Julie Anne Greenberg unearths the alchemical power of water in the subtly reflective and texturally complex surfaces of her mixed-media prints.

In her new series of works, Dupuis creates elaborate sculptures by coating paper in colored clay slip, firing it, then breaking it into small pieces that she adheres to the surface of dismantled pieces of furniture. She is interested in stripping away function as a means of exploring the essence of things, but inserts herself into each piece by utilizing furniture from her childhood. While these objects contain personal significance for the artist, her primary concern is the metamorphic act of changing a discarded item into an object of beauty.

Julie Anne Greenberg has long been captivated by the transformative power of water and its parallels to human experience. This fascination, informed by time spent on the Mississippi Delta, results in a body of work that captures the nuanced, ephemeral beauty of this most basic substance and forms the core of her artistic subject. Greenberg's process is an attempt to mimic the natural processes that create the environments she studies. She employs experimental techniques to recreate the effect of water on her subjects. From falling rain to thawing ice, this textural application imbues her initial, often abstracted subject with a hyper-realistic effect that pushes beyond representation.

away from her earlier references to pop and youth culture. Schiff's recent work is rooted in the tradition of photographers in the American West, such as Robert Adams, who ventured out into the landscape to look. Her prolonged engagement with specific locations and her precise sensitivity to the particularities of light yield quiet, almost mystical, revelations brimming with the residue of other lives.

Schiff has said that she speaks not from an individual's perspective about an individual experience, but more collectively about how people feel connected to certain spaces. Her photographs often invite a slowed-down viewing of an idyllic space, whether indoor or outdoor. The artist is especially interested in sites that make one aware of time, such as unpopulated graffiti-covered canals that simultaneously reference the past and suggest a sciencefiction version of the future. For example, in Handball Double (2012), multiple exposures of a black and white image of a concrete handball court wreak havoc on our architectural understanding of a space. In Hellroom (2009), layers of graffiti in an abandoned concrete drainage canal form a vibrant palimpsest that implicates each of the lives that have traversed this hallmark of urban infrastructure. Schiff engages a dialogue about painting and mark making, exploring how people signify their presence and claim their own bit of territory.

Schiff's work was featured in the 2008 Whitney Biennial, and has also been exhibited at MoMA PS1, Long Island City, NY; Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago; The Print Center, Philadelphia; Seattle Museum of Art; Indianapolis Museum of Art; Smart Museum of Art, Chicago;

and Museum of Contemporary Art, North Miami. Her work is included in the collections of Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago; Dallas Museum of Art, Dallas; and the Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art, Kansas City. She has received a Chinati Foundation artist residency and an Artadia Award grant.

Schiff attended Goldsmiths College, London and received her BFA from New York University (1999), and her MFA from University of Illinois-Chicago (2002). She lives and works in Los Angeles. Schiff is represented by Kavi Gupta, CHICAGO |

series of images in the 1930s. The Harlem Document remains his best known body of work from this period. Through June 9 - "The Philadelphia Story: Contemporary Figurative Work Drawn from the Academy". In addition to its fine museums, the city of Philadelphia, PA, is home to no less than five major art schools. The Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts is the oldest art school and museum in the country, founded 1805. Like the Asheville Art Museum, the Academy's focus is on American art. The Academy also focuses on teaching traditional methods of working from life, such as classes in cast drawing and the use of live models for classes in drawing. Painting and sculpture dominate the school's curriculum, both in past and present. Academy faculty were most often Academy students first, affording many artists the ability to trace their artistic lineage back to noteworthy faculty and students such as Thomas Eakins, Mary Cassatt, Cecilia Beaux, Henry O. Tanner, Robert Henri, Alexander Calder and others. Through July 21 - "The Well-Made World". The Asheville Art Museum has an expansive Permanent Collection that includes fine craft objects representing key themes from the history of craft in the United States during the 20th and 21st centuries. This selection from the Museum's craft collection reveals the genre's consistent commentary on the world around us. Craft exists as an integral aspect of our ability to create and interpret objects of meaning. By considering key pieces from the Permanent Collection, such as Walter B. Stephen's "Creamer (Blue)" (1950) featured in the exhibition, we see a variety of ways in which craft responds to tradition in light of advances in technology and shifts in culture, both in a historic context as well as more contemporary examples. This exhibition explores the ongoing story of craft and its particular significance to Western North Carolina. This exhibition is curated by Karen Peltier, the Asheville Art Museum's Windgate Intern of the Center for Craft, Creativity and Design. Many potters adjusted to this lower demand by creating wares that were more aesthetically appealing - objects that consumers would want to live with in their homes. Numerous factories from Vermont to Ohio to South Carolina produced "fancy" wares: objects that might still have practical functions-such as pitchers, vases, or flasks-but were notable primarily for their attractive shapes. Porcelain factories also began to proliferate during this period, producing highquality wares that catered to the tastes of more affluent consumers. In the late 1940s, Dior's "New Look" fashions presented small, nipped-in waistlines above full skirts which emphasized the bust and hips in these silhouettes. He selected extravagant fabrics for his dresses and gowns, and his designs soon captured the attention of prominent clients from around the world. His innovations and designs, for decades thereafter, influenced women's fashions and the designers who created them. Known for the elegance and movement of his formal designs, Pierre Balmain (1914-1982) created fine, slim silhouettes for his tailored suits. Even today, Balmain's vintage gowns are highly sought after by fashionistas across the globe. Yves Saint Laurent (1936-2008) is recognized as one of the greatest names in fashion history, called "the most consistently celebrated and influential designer of the past twenty years" by fashion historian Caroline Rennolds Milbank. He was among the first to present ready-towear designs, including his famous tuxedo suits for women that became a symbol of fashionable ease. His formal and evening fashions as well as tailored suits display his talent and ability to create impressive directions in the world of haute couture and luxury fashion. a brief lecture will be given by co-curator and potter, Fred Johnston, of Johnston and Gentithes Studio. The exhibit is co-curated by Fred Johnston and Tommy and Cindy Edwards. From the earliest days of North Carolina's traditional art pottery production, potters sought to achieve a vibrant red glaze. The most successful red glazes fashioned in the 1930s are today referred to by the name, "chrome red." Their reddish-orange color was created by the addition of chromium oxide to the potters' usual lead glaze, a coating that was used by area potters for centuries before on utilitarian wares. The red glaze was a hit with customers, and essentially every art pottery shop, including J. B. Cole's Pottery, Auman Pottery, Royal Crown Pottery and Porcelain Co., Smithfield Art Pottery, and others, added it to their repertoire.
