I do this because the second I commit to the work, the beginning touches the end and the end becomes the beginning, a circle, and in my finite mind, I am briefly in a spot where the concept of eternity is excitingly tangible," says Thornton.

"If I rush to the table too soon, the beginning is premature and lacking," adds Thornton. "The end is weak and wanting.

If I wait too long, the beginning is old and half forgotten. The end is tiresome and confusing. This is such a transitory place of creative opportunity that I feel a fantastic 'rush' as I align myself to be in the right place and on time!"


Many American cities have preserved the character of their original - or at least earlier - architectural structures in historic districts. This movement, alas, has yet to appear in the Grand Strand area. But many of its historic structures have been preserved in the paintings of artist and longtime Myrtle Beach resident Steve Jameson. Jameson, who paints under the pseudonym Cedar, receives his first solo exhibition titled *Steve Jameson: Ode to the Grand Strand* at his hometown museum, the Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum.

Perhaps better known to some as the "Sign Man" for his business painting custom-carved, sandblasted or gilded wooden signs for beach homes, Jameson has forged a second career creating colorful paintings of coastal scenes, often depicting abandoned or ram shackled structures, most of which have since disappeared.

The exhibition consists of 45 paintings in a range of media from oil applied on canvas
