is reflected in water and earth that are delicate, uncertain.

Flanders Gallery in Raleigh, NC, will present *Ashlynn Browning: Walls and Windows*, on view from June 3 - 29, 2016. A reception will be held on June 3, from 6-10pm.

This show will feature new oil on panel paintings by Browning from the last two years. The work ranges in scale from 12" x 12" to 44" x 40".

Browning states, "These new paintings feature chunky, squared off forms that play with weight and architecture. The views into the underlying layers are more closed off and opaque than in my earlier work. On a literal level, these new paintings bring to mind urban architecture, grids, windows, bricks and walls. Additionally, the many layers in each piece speak to the history of the painting's creation, as well as to the hidden parts of ourselves that we conceal and reveal in time. These are the walls and windows that I reference. "

"Experimenting with the idea of opposing forces continues to be an important part of my work. Bold color is set against muted color, geometric forms mix with organic ones, and graphic pattern and texture play off smooth color fields. These are variables that I mix and layer in multiple stages until a resonant image

appears.

"I know a painting is complete when it has become its own separate entity, one with a sense of dignity and self," adds Browning. "A sense of mystery remains. I look back and have no real grasp on how the finished painting came to be. It is distinct from me and has a life of its own now."

NC Museum of Natural Sciences in Raleigh, NC, will present *Nature in Colored Pencil*, featuring works by members of the Colored Pencil Society of America, on view in the museum's Nature Art Gallery, from June 3 through July 31, 2016. A reception will be held on June 4, from 2-4pm.

Fine art colored pencils are relatively new to the art world, having been introduced in the 1920s, considering that other art materials, such as oils and watercolors, have been used continually in Western art for centuries. Colored pencils are a semitransparent medium and luminous, vibrant colors can be created by layering. The pigments used in artist-grade pencils resist fading, so paintings and drawings done in colored pencil on archival papers or art boards can be handed down from generation to generation.

The nonprofit CPSA was founded in 1990 by Vera Curnow and represents almost 2,000 members worldwide who work with the versatile medium. It sup-

ports 20 district chapters throughout the United States. The Raleigh-Durham chapter, based in Cary, NC, meets bimonthly and serves its members by providing opportunities for education, workshops, networking, and art exhibitions showcasing the fine art of colored pencil. Many chapter members also teach regional classes in colored pencil to the public.
