Harriet Goode comments, "The women in my paintings are not people I know, but people I'd like to know, sort of like my spirit sisters. More often than not they are telling a story, sometimes in a language I don't even understand, as if an alien has hijacked my imagination.

"The titles are often inspired by lines in short stories or even from newspaper columns, which I manipulate to fit my own purposes," continues Goode. "The use of icons and metaphors helps deliver the story, often arcane, but I can usually figure out what the women are telling me; however, I don't share my interpretation with the viewer.
