Cameron Art Museum in Wilmington, NC, Features Site Specific Installations by Willie Cole

In observation of the 50th anniversary of the signing of the Civil Rights Act (July 2, 1964) Cameron Art Museum, in Wilmington, NC, in collaboration with Countywide Community Development Corporation of Navassa, NC, is presenting the exhibition School Pride: The Eastern NC Story, featuring a site specific installation by nationally renowned Willie Cole, on view through Nov. 2, 2014.

Cole is creating new installations investigating the closing of sixteen Cape Fear area schools and other aspects of desegregation in southeastern NC and its impact statewide.

Cole states that the visual intent of this exhibition is to create "a multi-gallery installation that reflects the real or physical history of desegregation in North Carolina through the use of conceptual or emotional triggers and historical documents.'

Cole will look deeply into historical and found objects – from students who attended these schools, from regional museums, and from area families. Together, the juxtaposition of these objects will demonstrate a powerful narrative of the struggle of a community for equality in education. In their search for source mate-

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
