Jewelry artist, Nell Chandler describes her thoughts about the show: "When we first settled on the title Colorful Language for our show I felt an immediate connection. Even way back before I ever thought of making jewelry I had been telling stories through painting and printmaking. Now I paint and etch on my jewelry and I'm still telling little narratives."

This year Chandler is exploring the melding of techniques from her past. She is creating "story bracelets" with brand new messages by using visual images to tell the story. Chandler is presently working on a Matriarch Bracelet that she sees as a contemplation of heritage and ancestors. She adds, "My new work feels playful yet intense."



Work by Michele Yellin

Painter and assemblage artist, Michele Yellin, often begins her work by placing a quote in the underpainting as a way to start the process. Color is the language she uses with great boldness to say the things that cannot be expressed in words. As she layers the canvas with color she finds that figures and shapes begin to emerge. Much like a writer developing a cast of characters, she lets these shapes and figures tell her who they are. Yellin moves from the sublime to the whimsical with deftness and a strong sense of her own artistic voice.

Fabric artist Ali Givens, who creates quilted textile collages, is exploring an entirely different pallet of colors following a year of work and study in a small town in the Italian piedmont. Her first work, Ivrea Windows, was inspired by the views from her apartment, but she soon realized that a view from one window could not express the essence of the town. She began taking photographs and marrying their elements to create more holistic representations.

Givens says, "As I was combining these photographs, I had something of an epiphany and realized that my photographs of home (Hillsborough) contained much of the richness and culture that I was finding in Ivrea. It is my hope that I can bring these observations to the Colorful Language show."

The Hillsborough Gallery of Arts (HGA) is owned and operated by 22 local artists and represents these established artists exhibiting contemporary fine art and fine craft. HGA's offerings include acrylic and oil paintings, sculpture, ceramics, photography, textiles, jewelry, glass, metals, encaustic, enamel, and wood.

ENO Gallery in Hillsborough, NC, is presenting a 46 year Retrospective of Photo Essays, by Donn Young, on view through July 24, 2016. This exhibition pays tribute to Young's upcoming permanent installation in The Power of Place Gallery at the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture.

As an assignment photographer, his work has appeared in over 100 national publications including Time, Newsweek, USA Today, The New York Times, The New Yorker, Paris Match, Mother Jones, The Los Angeles Times, Village Voice and The Washington Post.


Young's work has been exhibited in 59 museums and galleries. The list of honors and awards are too numerous to list in a brief newsletter.

The gallery knows Young from their mutual New Orleans backgrounds. In 2005, Hurricane Katrina ravaged his studio in New Orleans. For nearly four and half weeks the body of work Young created over more than 35 years was submerged 10 feet below the muddy waters of the Mississippi river that inundated New Orleans. 1,350,000 images were lost to failed levees – a life's work. There are many tragic stories - most importantly the loss of homes and life. How could one complain of losing a life's work when others lost their lives and loved ones? However, the loss was significant and life changing.

Although he lost his home, his possesions and his life's work, Young pushed on. In July of 2008 with the endorsement

Additionally, the Louisiana State Archives established the Donn Young Collection, as a reference of images for future generations to study. Donn Young is the only living photographer of his generation to be so honored.
