
When Arlene Linder, 76, moved from California to the Southern Lowcountry in late 2011, her new surroundings offered a fresh world of colors, textures, temperatures, landscapes and characters inspiring the featured eye-catching series "Lowcountry Expressions".

Revealing bright, vibrant colors combined with her bold, expressionistic painting style, Linder transformed her perception of local details into an original series of acrylics and oils paintings.

The new setting, coupled with an exceptional studio in her home, has inspired this San Francisco native to expand her awardwinning style that has transformed throughout the past several decades into fearless expression. Whereas her former studio was situated in her California garage, now she has walls of glass and can watch the day's changing colors and passing wildlife including an alligator in her backyard lake.

"It's incredibly different here from California; the landscape, the people, the trees. Everything is so green and lush. I was intrigued by the people, their kindness and sculptured hairdos," Linder explained. "The light here appears brighter because of the humidity and the intense exposure from the Southern sun. I've rarely seen such vibrant colors in the landscape, and I'm thrilled to express those new visions in my paintings."

An avid traveler, Linder said, "The only other place I've visited with such amazing colors was in Antarctica." Throughout the years, not only has Linder's art been

influenced by her travels, but she also draws from a composite of experiences, dreams, questions, feelings and visualizations.

In addition to studying art at schools such as Academy of Art in San Francisco and Oakland's California College of Arts and Crafts, Linder earned her BFA from the San Francisco Art Institute, graduating with honors. Ending her formal art education with her degree in 1985, she went on to win numerous juried competitions including the Marin Society of Artists, Bay Arts, and University of California at Santa Barbara. Moreover, she was chosen to be an artistin-residence for a year-long program with artist David Ireland at the Marin Headlands.

Linder's artwork has been featured in numerous shows, galleries and museums such as the Crocker Museum, Humboldt State University and the Frank Lloyd Wright Marin Civic Center Gallery. Aside from her paintings being part of permanent collections such as the Riverside Art Museum, her drawings were published in the book Art. Rage.Us. The book was produced to accompany the "Art.Rage.Us" show that traveled

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throughout the United States and abroad to raise breast cancer awareness.

Prior to her formal art training, Linder founded, owned and operated the multinational business MopTops. The children's designs and room accessories company was featured in Ladies Home Journal and American Home Magazine. As well, her designs were sold in high-end stores including Neiman Marcus, Macy's, Marshall Field's, Bloomingdale's, and Bonwit Teller in New

Additionally, Linder has taught art enrichment to disadvantaged children in Richmond, CA, and to severely disabled students at the National Institute for Art and Disabilities.

Hilton Head Island has a rich history that revolves around the production of indigo. Eliza Lucas Pinckney (1722-1793) was a woman of sixteen when she managed her fathers 10 plantations and pioneered large-scale cultivation of indigo in the Lowcounty of South Carolina and locally on Pinckney Island. With this exhibit, Picture This Gallery wants to honor the history and elevate the art-form that surrounds this globally sought after dye, "the color that seduced the world".

Mary Hark, one of the contributing artists offering this comment, "Indigo is a color that is valued by cultures all over the world. It is a dye that offers a remarkable range - from a chalky sky blue to a deep, ruddy, blue-black. It is a medium that can

sing with crisp pattern, carry rivers of fluid marks, or produce a stunning, field of thick, rich, darkness. I have used this color for more than 20 years in my studio practice - its emotional range, its connection to textile traditions from all over the world, and its profound beauty continues to engage my imagination".
