Hillsborough Arts Council in Hillsborough, NC, is presenting Upbeat Interpretations of Natural Southern Living, featuring watercolor painting by Kenny Glenn, on view through Aug. 22, 2015.

Glenn is a post WWII Baby boomer who grew up in rural Durham County, NC, where farming was a way of life. A healthy work ethic instilled by this traditional culture is evident in his work. Glenn loves the outdoors; the movement of birds, the smell of the early morning mist, the rustling breezes, and the sound of pounding surf. He represents these feelings with a facility for technique that is inspiring.

The Hillsborough Arts Council has been active in developing and supporting the arts locally for more than 20 years. The Hillsborough Arts Council in Hillsborough, NC, will present Hillsborough, featuring textile collage works by Elaine O'Neil, on view from Aug. 28 through Sept. 19, 2015. A reception will be held on Aug. 28, from 6-9pm.

O'Neil says of her work, "My artistic process begins with the simple, pure memories of my childhood. I strive to conjure up the essence of those good times and capture them through whimsy and color, stitching them together with a sense of humor and

delight. My process begins by approaching each textile collage with a simple sketch. Then through snips and cuts, my scissors, like a painter's brush, slowly reveal the image. Layer upon layer of fabric, stitched into place using a variety of colors and textures, brings the piece to life. In each piece I hope to evoke the kind of pleasure and delight of childhood, when life is simple, sweet, and full of endless possibilities.'

O'Neil grew up in rural Maine, the

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great-granddaughter of a lighthouse keeper, granddaughter of a farmer, and daughter of an ardent seamstress. She received a degree in textile design from the Philadelphia College of Textiles and Science, and has shown her work in galleries up and down the East Coast as well as in the mountains of North Carolina. O'Neil regularly does commissions and has created pieces for clients in Russia, England, Greece, Italy, and France, as well as in many states in the US. Her work is also in the collections of many colleges, businesses, and hospitals, on the cover of several books and publications. She has illustrated two children's books.

## Hillsborough Gallery of Arts Features Works by Linda Carmel, Chris Graebner and Pringle Teetor

The Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, will present The Present Tense, featuring works by painters Lind Carmel and Chris Graebner and glassblower Pringle Teetor, on view from Aug. 24 through Sept. 20, 2015. A reception will be held on Aug. 28, from 6-9pm.

While each of these three artists has a very different style, for this exhibit they produced work focused on the "present tense."

For painter Linda Carmel working in the present tense meant rediscovering and revising a theme that has been at the core of her work for some time. Over the last few years Carmel's work focused on women. For Present Tense she originally planned to move her attention to other subjects that interested her, but every painting she tried was a struggle - and time was ticking by. She finally gave in and started to "play" on a blank canvas without worrying about direction or outcome. Women re-emerged as subjects but they emerged in their "present tense" as queens. Most of the women in this series are single figures who are at the "top of their game." Although regal, some of the titles and figures have a playful element.

Carmel's paintings are sculptural, threecontinued above on next column to the right | dimensional works that she encourages the
