It has been said that the topography of the human face is like a road map of life itself. We see hints of long past relatives in the features of our children; read signs of hardships and strife in the wrinkles and texture of the skin; see the enduring hope for a better tomorrow in the light of a person's eyes. As humans we instinctively connect with portraits, often projecting our own experiences on the person featured in the work.

Clayton Joe Young is the Program Director and Lead Instructor for the Photographic Technology program at Catawba Valley Community College in Hickory, NC. Young is an award-winning photographer with a background in photojournalism whose work has been exhibited throughout the United States in solo and juried exhibitions.

While a photojournalist Young won numerous awards with the North Carolina Press Association and North Carolina Press Photographers Association. In 2011, Young won Best In Show at the *Appalachian Mountain Photography Competition*. In 2014, Young earned the Certified Professional Photographers (CPP) designation from Professional Photographers of America. In May 2015, Young earned a MFA in





Artist Dan Smith earned BFA and MFA degrees in Painting from East Carolina Uni-

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

## Southern Arts Society in Kings Mountain, NC, Features Works by Lucy Warlick

The Southern Arts Society in Kings Mountain, NC, will present *Walking in Their Shoes: A Look at America 1937-44 Through the Paintings of Lucy Warlick*, on view from Sept. 5 - 30, 2017. A reception will be held on Sept. 23 from 6-8pm.

Lucy Warlick has traveled many paths to becoming a full time artist. She vacillated between image and word, frustrated early on with her attempts as an art major, and returned to college a year later an English major. After teaching English for 16 years, raising a child, becoming and unbecoming an illustrator, a paper salesman, a poet, and a potter of sorts, she came back to art. In 2008 she painted what she felt was her first successful painting.

For the painting series "Walking in Their Shoes" featured in this exhibition, Warlick takes inspiration from the Library of Congress Farm Security Administration photo and negatives archives, consisting of 175,000 black and white, copyright-free images that document the lives of American people living between the Great Depression and the years leading up to WWII. These intimate portraits of individuals, families, and their communities depict a nation's daily life struggle in the wake of natural and man-made disasters. Her paintings pay homage to the talented photographers employed by the FSA who include John Vachon, Arthur Rothstein, Ben Shahn and Russell Lee, among others. Warlick is most drawn to pictures of the South where cotton was still produced on small rural farms and where parades were the rule rather than the exception.

Inviting viewers to step into her paintings, Warlick says "I want to present a situation, and pose to viewers a question they can solve by engaging their story-telling imaginations. I want to invite viewers into

the picture through design, value, and texture. I hope they will engage in a conversation with the painting, but more importantly, I hope they engage in a conversation with themselves."

Warlick's main goal in this series is to entice people to exercise their "empathy muscles" by putting themselves into the shoes of the subjects of her paintings. "I hope they will remember or imagine the lives of their grandparents and even great-grandparents. I hope they will be curious and seek out the photos from the FSA, research the photographers, and familiarize themselves with this era culturally, politically, and artistically."
