The exhibition also includes an interactive element with talking portraits that come to life through QR codes. Tyger Tyger Gallery in Asheville, NC, Offers Works by Navi Naisang

Tyger Tyger Gallery in Asheville, NC, will present Phantom Limb, featuring works by Navi Naisang, on view from Oct. 4 - 20, 2024. A reception will be held on Oct. 4, from 6-8pm, with an Artist Talk at 6:30pm.

Steeped in games of visual symmetry and heady symbolism, Navi Naisang's paintings are a playful deep dive into the shadow self, drawing on references ranging from Jung, continued above on next column to the right

insect mythology, and the Dark Feminine. Her figures move through pulsating, hypersaturated landscapes infiltrated by botanicals and insects that arrange themselves in vivid, neon-infused patterns. Unseen forms of other people positioned just out of the picture plane cast shadows that play across the skin of her subjects, creating uneasy repetitions.

Naisang's velvety surfaces and marks of paint are uncanny in their uniformity while being undeniably handmade. They vibrate with the cadences of digital screens, dreams, and otherworldliness.

Navi Naisang is an emerging artist who received her BFA from Western Carolina University. Her work has been exhibited throughout North Carolina, as well as in exhibitions in New York and Arizona. She has been awarded with artist residencies at the New York Academy of Art and the Vermont Studio Center. Naisang lives and works in Asheville, NC.

77th Fall Craft Fair of the Southern Highlands Takes Place in Asheville, NC -Oct. 17 - 20, 2024

The 77th Fall Edition Craft Fair of the Southern Highlands will take place at Harrah's Cherokee Center, in downtown Asheville, NC, on Oct. 17 - 20, 2024, from 10am-5pm. Admission is: Adults \$12, children under 12 free.

For four days in October, Harrah's Cherokee Center-Asheville comes to life with functional and decorative crafts made in the Southern Highland region. Over one hundred artists, makers, and craftspeople will fill the two-level building to sell their works of pottery, sculpture, furniture, tapestry, apparel, mixed media, jewelry, and more

Unlike other fairs, the Craft Fair of the Southern Highlands is an experience, a place to show off the talent and innovation of regional makers. It is diverse: crafts rooted in Appalachian traditions are featured alongside contemporary works. Walking through the Craft Fair, visitors witness the evolution of American craft objects, learning how traditional processes can capture the modern world through the artist's medium.

The focus of the fairs is on the process of craft, often lost in a highly mechanized and digital world; the work of the hand–iron is hammered to become a fireplace tool, and

splints of white oak are harvested to become a basket. This theme is reflected throughout the fair with live interactive demonstrations where visitors can learn processes from highly-trained craftspeople.

Over the weekend, regional musicians perform on the downstairs stage. Visitors to the fair will have the opportunity to win a piece of fine craft from one of the exhibitors by entering to win the raffle; all proceeds go towards the Southern Highland Craft Guild's educational mission.

Since 1948, the Craft Fair of the Southern Highlands has showcased work by members of the Southern Highland Craft Guild, (SHCG) a non-profit organization dedicated to keeping crafts alive and rel-

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
