residencies (The Bascom & Starworks), Furman University in Greenville, SC, Offers Works by Derek Reese

The Furman University Department of Art, at Furman University in Greenville, SC, will present, Daily Bread, featuring works by Artist-in-Residence, Derek Reese, on view in the Thompson Gallery, located in Furman's Roe Art Building, from Feb. 17 through Mar. 28, 2025.

The Furman University Department of Art has selected Derek Reese as its 2025 True Inspiration Artist-in-Residence. The residency was inaugurated in 2016 as part of The Furman Advantage and is awarded each spring to an artist or designer interested in developing a body of work alongside Furman students, faculty and the surrounding community. Reese will run an open studio in throughout the spring semester.

Reese's project explores food insecurity in the Upstate and the impact of consumer capitalism on the region's low-income communities. Using data drawn from the Greenville County Food Insecurity Index, local partnerships and in-person community engagement, Reese



will develop innovative artworks that depict the ways discount chain stores exacerbate food insecurity, restrict access to healthy food options and compromise communities' resilience to other social factors beyond food alone.
