Davidson College in Davidson, NC, will present Warp Weft Water Weeds, featuring works by Elizabeth Bradford, on view in the Van Every/Smith Galleries, in the Belk Visual Arts Center, from Feb. 13 through Apr. 9, 2025. A reception will be held on Feb. 13, from 5:30-7:30pm. Kindly RSVP by Feb. 7, 2025

The exhibition highlights the talent of an artist who has spent fifty years diligently working within our own community, capturing the evolving landscapes she holds dear. Bradford draws inspiration from a profound connection to nature through direct observations while hiking or kayaking primarily in the Southeastern United States where she resides. While her works are predominantly representational, they also maintain a relationship with abstraction.

The exhibition's accompanying catalogue includes essays by Dr. Emily Stamey, Curator of Academic Programming & Head of Exhibitions at Weatherspoon Art Museum; Dr. Leo Mazow, Louise B. and J. Harwood Cochrane Curator of American Art, Virginia Museum of Fine Arts; and an interview between Bradford and Tyler Green, award-winning historian and critic who has produced and hosted The Modern Art Notes Podcast since 2011.

Elizabeth Bradford is a native Carolinian, with deep roots in the rural landscape. Her work often centers on images drawn from her rural community and her family's century farm in north Mecklenburg County. In recent years she has used her passion for backpacking as inspiration for large scale paintings of the wild.

Bradford studied art at Randolph Macon Woman's College, the Universities of North Carolina, and at Davidson College, and has

had residencies at the Virginia Center for the Creative Art; Moulin à Nef in Auvillar, France; Skopart Foundation in Skopelos, Greece; and, The School of the Art Institute of Chicago.

Bradford is represented in museum, corporate and private collections all over the United States. She was included in the US State Department's Art in Embassies Program, which places representative work by American artists in embassies around the world.

Bradford has had many solo exhibitions, including shows at the Cameron Museum, the Blowing Rock Museum, The University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Davidson College and Hood College. Her work focuses on intricate formal patterns found in nature, and on the experience of color. Though representational, her paintings have a strong connection to the traditions of abstraction, Pop Art, and the Pattern and Decoration Movement. Bradford's paintings reveal a continuing investigation of landscape and the notion of place.

# NC, Features Works by YoYo Lander

The Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture in Charlotte, NC, is presenting YoYo Lander: Between the Quiet, Selected Works from 2019-2024, on view through May 11, 2025.

Known for her portraits of solitary African diasporic subjects, contemporary artist YoYo Lander captures visual form via a psychological and emp athetic drive to understand her subjects, not only through the features of their physical bodies but also through moments in which introspection prompts them to most fully reveal themselves. As a self-taught painter and collagist, Lander highlights the multifacetedness of Black identity while also exploring the expressive aspects of the human figure through which gesture, line, posture, and color convey meaning.

Her first mid-career retrospective, YoYo Lander: Between the Quiet, Selected Works from 2019-2024, presents a curated selection of figurative and experimental abstract collages from private and public collections around the country. The exhibition invites viewers to reflect on vulnerability and the concept of presence while showcasing the ideological depth with which Lander approaches image-making.

Lander is a Los Angeles-based artist whose work explores the complexity of the human body, exploring its beauty, strength, and vulnerability through intricately crafted collages. Her art is a dynamic meditation on movement and form, where she captures the subtle details of posture and expression with a keen sense of observation.

Lander's signature technique combines layers of hand-cut stained watercolor paper on top of stained watercolor backgrounds, creating rich, textural "bodyscapes" that convey both emotional depth and visual energy. The result is a striking series of multi-

hued compositions that evoke a profound sense of presence and resilience. Through her evocative and layered approach to collage, she creates a compelling dialogue about identity, the body, and the human experience, captivating viewers worldwide with her distinctive visual language.

Lander's work has garnered both national and international acclaim, with exhibitions in New York, Los Angeles, Miami, Stockholm, Brussels, Singapore, Paris, Switzerland, South Africa, and Dubai. Her works are part of prestigious public collections, including the Museum of Fine Arts Houston, the International African American Museum in Charleston, SC, the Artistic Museum of Contemporary Art in Wales, the California African American Museum, and the Raclin Murphy Museum of Art at the University of Notre Dame. Additionally, her work is held in private collections, including DeWoody's Bunker Art Space and the Petrucci Art Foundation.

The Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts + Culture in Charlotte, NC, is presenting Cherry, Khalif Tahir Thompson, on view through Aug. 17, 2025.

This is the first institutional solo exhibition in the United States, features eight large-scale paintings that explore themes related to identity, memory, and emotion. Imbued with a sense of nostalgia yet charged with a contemporary energy that bridges the tangible and the imagined, Thompson creates layered compositions that invite viewers into intimate spaces, drawing from the artist's personal experiences, family archives, and broader cultural narratives.

Cherry invites viewers to explore how identity is remembered, shared, and reimagined, celebrating the complex layers of human experience.

ship at the EFA Robert Blackburn Printmaking Workshop in NYC, the Vermont Studio Center, and the Jerome Emerging Artist residency at The Anderson Center. He is a 2022 resident of Black Rock Senegal, founded by Kehinde Wiley.

Thompson is represented by Zidoun-Bossuyt Gallery, where he presented his first solo exhibition in Europe at Zidoun-Bossuyt Luxembourg in September 2023, a solo exhibition in Dubai in 2023, and Paris in 2024. His work is on view at Saint Louis Art Museum, Pérez Art Museum Miami, Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art (Kansas City), The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, Kalamazoo Institute of Arts, Virginia Museum of Fine Arts (Richmond), and Indianapolis Museum of Art at Newfields. After participating at The Royal Drawing School at Dumfries House, Scotland, Thompson joined the AAF/Seebacher Prize for Fine Arts, Austria (2023). In 2024, the Zidoun-Bossuyt Gallery edited the artist's first monograph with Skira editions. As part of his gallery's participation at The Armory Show 2024, Khalif Tahir Thompson presented his first solo exhibition in New York City. This exhibition was organized by Harvey B.
