Peggy DeBell explains her artistic approach: "I enjoy creating the unexpected from familiar scenes and everyday objects. A simple pasture or an old building can become a canvas of colors and textures, printed onto fabric, stitched, and embellished. I combine recycled items like aluminum pull-off lids with handdyed threads to create something new and meaningful.
