City of Rocky Mount, NC, Offers Annual Handcrafted Juried Exhibition

The Maria V. Howard Arts Center located at the Imperial Centre for the Arts and Sciences of Rocky Mount, NC, is delighted to announce that our 26th Handcrafted Juried Art Exhibition is currently on exhibit now through May 4, 2025. The Handcrafted Juried Art Exhibition is a national juried art exhibition that includes fiber art, pottery, woodwork, jewelry, printmaking, and more. Both facilities are run by the City of Rocky Mount, NC.

This year, 225 pieces of art were submitted for consideration and eighty-four pieces were selected for the juried show. The *Handcrafted Show* boasts a variety of mediums and crafts from traditional to contemporary works celebrating the art of craft.

This year's juror, Jessica Dupuis who received her MFA from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and her BFA with a concentration in ceramics and print media from Alfred University. Dupuis exhibits her work regionally and nationally. She has been a resident artist at the Houston Center for Contemporary Craft and Women's Studio Workshop as well as a recipient of the International Sculpture Center's Outstanding Student Achievement in Contemporary Sculpture Award and an Ella Fountain Pratt Emerging Artists Grant from the Durham Arts Council. She is an Associate Professor of Art - Ceramics & A.D. Gallery Director at the University of North Carolina at Pembroke.

The best in show award is our acquisition award and that piece is later added to the Maria V. Howard Arts Center Permanent Collection. This year's award goes to the artist Patrizia Ferriera of Cary, NC. Her piece, Corrosive Beauty reflects her current work exploring the use of repurposed materials in fiber art. Patrizia Ferreira received a bachelor's degree in textile design from the Institute of Industrial Design in Montevideo, Uruguay, and a Master of Science degree in textile design for prints from Philadelphia University (now Thomas Jefferson University). She is an artist and educator working in Raleigh, NC.

In addition to Best in Show/Acquisition Award, the juror selected first place winner, Alison Pack Bova of Anaconda, MT, for *Incantation*; second place winner, Kenny Pieper of Burnsville, NC, for *Blue Narcissus Diva*; and third place winner, Holland Houdek of Rochester, NY, for *Tricuspid Valve Regurgitation*.

Seven Honorable Mentions were awarded to Cheryl Prisco of Boone, NC, for *Tabella*; Anne Willson of Raleigh, NC, for *Bird Woman*; Sharron Parker of Durham, NC, for *Old Door Lock/Belves France*; Ruourui Mu of Rochester, NY, for *Shifting Radiance*; Lisa Pearce of Raleigh, NC, for *One Day*; Caroline Woolard of Mooresville, NC, for *Graceful Resilience*; and Chieko Murasugi of Chapel Hill, NC, for *Soda Pop*.
