**Turchin Center for the Visual Arts**, Appalachian State University, 423 West King Street, Boone. **Mayer Gallery, Through May 4** - "Revelation: Michael O'Neill". "Revelation" supports the mission of the Turchin Center to showcase creative responses to local, regional, and global climate change. All of O'Neill's ethereal landscapes were made in the South. The land bears the ongoing scarification of a deeply troubled history at the same time the photographs reveal the beauty of what yet may be lost if we do not find a more equitable way to care for the lands of which we are the current stewards. **Community Galleries, Through June 8** - "The Anti-Uranium Mapping Project: Shayla Blatchford". The project is an interactive audio/visual storytelling exhibition and website designed to create an efficient way to educate audiences about the environmental issues of uranium mining on the Navajo Nation and surrounding lands. The various components of the project provide an immersive multimodal learning experience. This project serves as both historical documentation of the uranium mining era as well as a platform for storytelling and community building. **Bickers Family Gallery, Through June 1** - "Roots. Ground. Water. Seeds." featuring the 21st Annual Appalachian Mountain Photography Competition., juried by E. Gale Greenlee, Ph.D. "Roots, Ground, Water, Seeds" is an effort to amplify visual artists whose photography considers our many and intertwining ancestral roots; our connection and relationship to the land, the ground we walk on, the lives these lands have supported and the way Appalachian earth demands and years for our conscious care. Here, you dip into the waterways and communities that sustain and repair us and witness the seeds that birth new life/futures, rejuvenate our soil and spirits, and spark necessary political change. Here in this place, you/we/I bear witness to a personal and collective archive. Come in. Listen. See. **Hodges Gallery, Through June 1** - "Trophic Cascade: April Flanders". The web of life under the surface of aquatic ecosystems is exceedingly complex and devastatingly beautiful. In a place where species interactions begin at a

microscopic level, small changes have huge impacts and huge changes wreak havoc. Remove a key predator, and prey takes over; add another predator, and the first one declines. With the rise of globalization, human mediated transfer mechanisms give rise to invasive species, overwhelming the delicate balance of aquatic ecosystems. These unintended ecological interventions cause Trophic Cascades, revealing nature's fragility. Invasion biology in marine environments is especially fraught. The eradication or management of invasive species on land, while economically and environmentally challenging, is possible. The successful management of these species underwater is nearly impossible. This exhibition addresses the causes and impacts of marine bio-invasaders on a global scale, conferring visibility to species normally unseen. **Gallery A and Petti/Peiser Galleries, Through May 4** - "Considering Carbon: Kathleen Thum". "The exhibition, Considering Carbon, consists of a series of drawings and cut-paper wall installations which explore the theme of fossil fuels, specifically oil and coal. In the exhibition, I use different visual and conceptual approaches to examine the physical, material qualities of coal and oil, as I aim to heighten an awareness of our disconnection and dependence on fossil fuels. Oil and coal are an integral part of our contemporary existence, yet remain mysterious, unknown substances, contained and controlled by the industry," says Thum. "Large-scale wall installation artworks in the exhibition consider the infrastructure of the pipeline system through a visual language of abstraction to communicate the vastness of the petroleum infrastructure. In these large cut-paper pieces, I evoke the visceral, sensory quality of the petroleum landscape by using scale, texture, surface, color and the non-traditional presentation of drawings to engage the body of the viewer," adds Thum. **Cary Arts Center**, 101 Dry Avenue, Cary. **Cary Arts Center Gallery, Through May 24** - "Slater Mapp & Trish Klenow: Tarot and Midnight Garden". The vision for "Tarot Garden" is to evoke a private, mysterious, wild and unkept "garden" started by witches in the American south. Combining the paintings of Trish Klenow from her "Midnight Garden" series and the photographs of Slater Mapp from his "Tarot" series, this gallery space as garden will share the traits of exploration found in Renaissance gardens, and the traits of solace and reflection found in a Cloister garden as well as Klenow's own wild garden in Apex, NC. The viewer will experience the wonder of local flora and fauna in the darkest of North Carolina forests through Klenow's paintings and participate in the wonders of personal systems of belief and spirituality like Tarot, tea reading, Laramonde and the Oracle through the various mediums of Mapp. Photographic illustrations of unseen forces will hang like vines from the walls of the space and move with the wind. Archetypal images like the Empress, the Fool and the Devil will guide the viewers to reflect on their personal journeys. Assemblages, and sculptures will serve as tokens and reminders of the Past. **May 30 - July 14** - "Laurie Hoen: Our Storied Journey." A reception will be held on May 31, from 6-8pm. This exhibit of oil paintings, combines elements of still life and allegory, challenging viewers with questions about social and environmental issues facing America. Visual allegories are puzzles to be solved. They depend on both insight and suggestion. The traditions of still life offer us quiet ways to pause--to peer into a setting of familiar objects that reflect our own experience. The elements of allegory ask us to consider our experience in the context of the social commentary that animates the objects. Are the birds or animals in the paintings disconcertingly oblivious to us, or do they turn and invite us in, asking us to play a role? Some art challenges the viewer to figure out what they're looking at. Laurie's art asks you to figure out not what it is, but what it means. **Cary Arts Center Principal's Hall, Through May 22** - "Lyudmila Tomova Clark: Fluid Impressions". Movement and mood are at the core of Lyudmila's artistic style. She merges both abstract and traditional painting in a loose painterly way to create energetic and impactful artwork. Her themes mainly involve figures and portraits of people captured in their private moments of contemplation, everyday scenes, playing music or dancing. Her painting philosophy is to interpret reality and not copy it. She paints quickly with large gestural strokes free of preconceived logical steps, infusing passion and excitement. A fleeting moment is captured and transformed by means of rules and omissions, acceptance and refusal, luring the viewer round and round in circles. The brush strokes are moving, pushing, emerging and overwhelming, but never still and quiet. **Cary**

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
