
NC Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, Features Exhibition of Quilts

The NC Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, is presenting Layered Legacies: Quilts from the Museum of Early Southern Decorative Arts at Old Salem, on view in the Museum's East Building, Level B, Joyce W. Pope Gallery, through July 21, 2024.

Quilts materialize the bonds of home, family, and community as they are passed down from generation to generation. Yet they are also records of our shared history, interwoven with broader social, cultural, and economic legacies that make up the complex fabric of the United States.

Layered Legacies invites audiences to consider the multilayered stories stitched into quilts made in the American South between the late eighteenth and mid-nineteenth centuries. Featured are more than 30 bed coverings and related objects from the collection of the Museum of Early Southern Decorative Arts and Old Salem collections. Foregrounding the masterful artistry of women, these bed coverings are expressions of love, objects of exquisite craftsmanship, and material documents containing hidden stories of long-forgotten women, both white and Black, wealthy and enslaved, whose hands created and cared for these important textiles.

North Carolina Museum of Art in Raleigh, NC, Celebrates 100 Years

This year the North Carolina Museum of Art (NCMA) in Raleigh, NC, celebrates the 100th anniversary of the founding of the North Carolina Art Society, a group of citizens who developed and led an ambitious plan to build a public art collection and museum for the people of North Carolina.

On April 5, 1947, their grassroots vision was supported by a public appropriation of \$1 million from the North Carolina General Assembly and later matched with a gift of 70+ works of art from the Samuel H. Kress Foundation. This philanthropic dynamic reflected one of the nation's early public-

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private museum partnerships, building the NCMA's People's Collection, a permanent collection of art that belongs to all North Carolina citizens, and establishing the North Carolina Museum of Art as one of the premier art museums in the South.

Since that time the Museum has expanded its collection from 158 paintings to 4,353 objects in multiple mediums, created one of the largest public art museum parks in the nation, delivered thousands of educational resources and public programs across all one hundred NC counties, added the



North Carolina Museum of Art, Winston-Salem (SECCA) to the NCMA family, and diversified its program to encompass the arts plural, all while continuing to provide free entry for all visitors to the People's Collection. In 2023 the Museum welcomed 1.1 million visitors to its Raleigh campus and offered 797 arts programs locally and throughout the state.

To commemorate this historic anniversarv, the Museum worked with NC Poet Laureate Jaki Shelton Green, Durhambased Two Dots Studio, and NC writer Courtney Napier to create a video celebrating the history of the NCMA. View the video at (https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=Sjli4L44OlA).

The North Carolina Museum of Art's collection spans more than 5,000 years, from antiquity to the present, making the institution one of the premier art museums in the South. CAM Raleigh in Raleigh, NC, **Features Works by Samantha Everette**

Contemporary Art Museum of Raleigh in Raleigh, NC, is presenting Crowning Glory, featuring works by Samantha Everette, on view in the CAM Main Gallery, through Sept. 8, 2024.

"One of the most intimate yet universal experiences of Black women is the braiding of our hair. Our African and Indigenous ancestry endows hair with significance beyond physical beauty; our long flowing braids are a conduit for spiritual anointing, a symbol of tribe and belonging, and a method for intergenerational bonding," says Samantha Everette. Inspired by her own experiences and by the Black women who make up her closest friends and family, Everette creates a scene that highlights their strength and beauty through the ritual of hair braiding.

A ritual experienced around the world, the women tightly encircle Zya - a deeply intimate expression of sisterhood and inter-generational connection. Dressed in white, reminiscent of those worn by Orisha and Houdoun priestesses throughout the Diaspora. As the braiders slowly, patiently create this elaborate East African braided style and Zya and the braids extend out in their splendor, she rises higher on a pedestal in strength and confidence. Taking hours or even days to complete, braiding is a labor of love, patience, and artistic precision resulting in a breathtaking headdress.

ried by Black women, atop our heads and within our beings.

Samantha Everette is a lifelong artist, designer, world traveler and photographer. She is a Durham, NC, native and graduated Summa Cum Laude from North Carolina State with a BA in Industrial Design. After graduating she spent ten years as a shoe designer. As a designer, Everette spent half of the year living in China and traveling throughout Asia. She was inspired to capture the world around

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
