from The University of Kentucky. He developed it further as he created illustrations for a design/build company he started with his brother in 1983 focusing on serving the entertainment industry. In his time with their company, he prepared several illustrated designs for Paramount, Nickelodeon, Warner Brothers, NASA, SeaWorld, Crayola and KSL Resorts. His connection and dedication to excellent work is undeniable as he has continued to develop his own work and memorable experiences for the viewers.

During a recent interview Donald Weber said that "there are several points of innovation and inspiration throughout the collection, I have introduced ivory black to my palette as well as have started using walnut oil as a medium." He talks about the environments he wants to capture and share with the viewer. "I have two favorite places to paint. One is New Mexico and the other is Charleston and the Lowcountry. Both areas have dramatic color and light, romantic architecture, and culture. It's hard not to be inspired by that."

For those unable to be there, Weber would like to share this with those interested in his work and process, "One thing I would like people to know is that I love to paint. That said, like anyone else or any other line of work, I have good days and I have bad days. I think for me to start what may turn out to be a great painting, I must first be inspired by a feeling or idea of a subject that my soul wants to capture on canvas. What is the essence of what each painting is about? Is it a color strategy, a composition of interesting forms, or strong lights and dark contrast? I like to get a painting to where I call

it almost finished. From that point, I give it a few days to let me view things that I may not have originally seen when in the throes of painting. Sometimes the paintings yell
