

The non-profit organization Preserving A Picturesque America (PAPA) collaborates with artists, writers, historians, environmental organizations, and like-minded individuals to use the power of the arts to protect and preserve natural and historic landmarks across the country. PAPA strives to shift public perspective towards the importance of the natural landscape through art experiences and opportunities to reconnect with nature and use those opportunities to raise funding that will facilitate the protection and preservation of Picturesque America sites across the country.

Founder and Executive Director Scott Varn is an artist and longtime conservationist. While searching for prints depicting his home area of Western North Carolina, he found some classic engravings of the French Broad River at an online estate auction and ordered them. He discovered they were from the publication, *Picturesque America*. Created by Appleton Press between 1872 and 1874, *Picturesque America* was a serial released in 48 parts and eventually bound into two large volumes which included over 900 engravings of natural and historic landscapes.

Publishers asked celebrated writers and artists of the time who created "travelogue" style tales describing wondrous places across America. Their work raised public awareness of our country's bountiful beauty and has played an important role in the protection of natural lands and historic places. PAPA aims to follow in the footsteps and brushstrokes of the original writers and artists, to rediscover the same places and document their current state of existence, to bring awareness to others that places important to people from the past should be protected and preserved for those in the future.

City Gallery, located at Joe Riley Waterfront Park, is owned by the City of Charleston and operated by the City of Charleston Office of Cultural Affairs, presenting an annual program of exhibitions and events featuring the finest contemporary art from local, regional, national and international artists, with a focus on the Lowcountry. City Gallery is located on Prioleau Street in downtown Charleston. City Gallery remains open during the adjacent construction on Prioleau Street. The entrance to the gallery can be accessed via stairs from Waterfront Park, or by walking down the drive on the north side of the building. Elevator access can be found inside the construction fences, continued on Page 4

On Our Cover This Month

On our cover is a work by Patsy Tidwell-Painton, which is part of the exhibition, Ebb and Flow of Life's Journey, on view at the Lowcountry Artists Gallery in Charleston, SC, from July 1 - 31, 2024. A reception will be held on July 5, from 5-8pm. Read the article on Pages 6 & 7.

Patsy Tidwell-Painton represents an institution in Charleston for the visual art community having run and owned Tidwell Art Center and Gallery, located on King Street for many years, supplying the art needs of Charleston's artists. Patsy was an early and often supporter of Charleston Arts and then Carolina Arts. Her store was one of the best distribution sites for our publication when it was printed. I bet she has a lot of stories she could tell about the Charleston visual art community and its artists.

July 1987

It was the month of July 1987 when we published our first issue of Charleston Arts. We waited until after the Spoleto and Piccolo Spoleto Festivals were over to start our journey. Back then, Spoleto was doing major visual art exhibits and it would have been too much to handle in a first issue.

As we enter our 38th year with Carolina Arts, Spoleto doesn't include any visual arts - how things change. Eventually Piccolo Spoleto picked up the staff of offering major exhibits, but then that faded. Now, the City of Charleston's Office of Cultural Affairs can't even let us know what exhibits they might offer by the time our deadlines have passed.

In between, we published Berkeley County Arts, South Carolina Arts and eventually in 1997, we became Carolina Arts. We're now in our 28th year of publishing Carolina Arts. First, as a printed publication and then after

2010, as an online only publication

Some folks miss the printed version of the publication, some still claim to have seen it recently, but I don't miss the printed version at all. It was mostly in black & white, small in size (never more than 30 pages) and only covered the areas where we received advertising support. It was costly to print, costly to distribute, and was only offered in the areas we covered.

When we stopped printing Carolina Arts I thought it would be the end of our publication. We stopped because of the recession and rising gas prices. But I was wrong, producing an online publication had its benefits. We only had to produce one copy and launch it in cyberspace and anyone, anywhere, could download it for free. We could send out e-mails to followers letting them know a new issue is ready to download. They could send it to folks on their e-mail lists. Social media also offered a way to distribute the publication.

As an online publication, we are in full color, we have unlimited size, and anyone around the world can download a copy - as long as they know about us, and more folks find out about us every month.

I do miss the traveling around the Carolinas, although it was mostly at night to make it easier to distribute, but I did get to see some art galleries and some of the art centers and art museums. Today, most of my time is spent on computers. Most folks communicate with us by e-mail - post cards announcing exhibits is a thing of the past - they're too slow and carry little info compared to what can be sent by e-mail.

City of North Charleston, SC, **Features Works by Kelly Kopacka** and Flavia Lovatelli

The City of North Charleston, SC's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that concurrent solo exhibitions of painted illustrations by Kelly Kopacka (Johns Island, SC) and paper and wood sculptures Flavia Lovatelli (Columbia, SC) will be on display at Park Circle Gallery, from July 3 - 27, 2024. The artists will host a free public reception at the gallery on July 5, from 5-7pm. Admission is free.

Charleston, SC-based artist Kelly Kopacka presents Dogville, a joyful collection of mixed media works that imagines the infrastructure of a dog society. The exhibition will include both paintings of dog houses and wall-mounted dioramas created with thrifted and found materials. Kopacka has created everything one might expect to find in a vibrant, dog-led community, including a dog hospital, a dog art gallery, a haunted doghouse, and more. She describes her style as illustrative realism and identifies her influences as "in the vein of Joseph Cornell, with a dash of Louise Nevelson and Robert Rauschenberg, plus a whole lot of Richard Scarry."

Kopacka holds an MA in Art History from University of Memphis and a BA in Art History from Georgia State University. Although her natural love of visual art led her to these studies, at the time she could not see herself as a "real" artist.

"Pictures speak a thousand words, and artists skillfully wield their tools to articulate them," says Kopacka, "but what if I have nothing terribly important to say? What if I want to create for the sake of creation, for fun, for pleasure?"

Instead, she employed her understanding of visual art elements as a graphic designer for a corporation. When the pandemic hit, the sudden changes to her daily routine made something click. The time and solitude of the early shutdown days allowed her to pick up a paintbrush again and create art playfully and without judgement. Since then, she has followed her natural inclination to create whimsical, humorous art and eventually quit her corporate job to pursue freelance art and design

Flavia Lovatelli is a sculptor living in Columbia, SC. Her exhibition, A Sculptural Exploration of Coral in Nature, features a collection of paper and wood sculptures that echo the organic shapes of coral. Her artwork is inspired by her lifelong love of the natural world. She has fond childhood

memories of snorkeling in the Tyrrhenian, Mediterranean, and Adriatic Seas, and going on hikes with her family. Her relationship with nature heavily influences the materials she is drawn to using in her artwork.

Even as a child, Lovatelli was interested in creating artwork from sustainable materials. She recalls collecting things found on her expeditions and incorporating them into her crafts. As she matured as an artist, the primary material she found herself most attracted to was found paper, books, magazines, writing paper, notebooks, and so on.

"Paper, my chosen material, embodes the paradoxical qualities that we see in nature: its fragility and durability, its strength and delicacy," Lovatelli says. Her process creates sculptures that seem to grow organically, echoing the patterns of spirals and tendrils seen in coral, barnacles, and sea anemones





A Harriet Tubman Monument Has **Been Installed at Tabernacle Baptist Church in Beaufort, SC**

The Tabernacle Baptist Church has installed a Harriet Tubman Monument. created by sculptor Ed Dwight, located on the church grounds at 901 Craven Street in Beaufort. SC

"This has been a long time coming. I still remember telling the church on Sunday morning in June 2016, which was around the anniversary of the Combahee River Raid, that we were going to build a monument for Harriet Tubman," said Kenneth F. Hodges, pastor of Tabernacle Baptist Church. "Our church is no stranger to preserving history, as our members got together and drafted a resolution thanking Abraham Lincoln for freeing us after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation Jan. 1, 1863; that document is a part of the Abraham Lincoln papers. We also undertook the monument to Robert Smalls, and now we are preserving the history of Harriet Tubman right here in Beaufort."

Sculptor Ed Dwight's 14-foot-tall bronze sculpture will sit on church's grounds, where it is believed to be the church where Mrs. Tubman made a speech after the Combahee River Raid where contraband known as enslaved African men were inspired to become members of the colored regiment. The church raised nearly \$1,000,000 to complete the project, as they received donations from the faith community, individuals. and businesses. The project took 8 years to complete.

Pastor Hodges continued, "It took five Page 8 - Carolina Arts, July 2024

years to raise the funds and three years to complete the sculpture. It was a hard sell because most people never heard the story of Harriet Tubman being in Beaufort. Everywhere we went, we told the story overand-over again about her presence here and finally historians started to tell the story."

The monument commemorates the time Mrs. Tubman spent in Beaufort, SC, which is often left out of her story. History states Mrs. Tubman lived in Beaufort for approximately two years arriving in Spring 1862 based on orders from Massachusetts Gov. John Andrews, who thought she could be used as a spy, as she was a member of the New England Freedmen's Aid Society, an organization whose mission was to provide teachers and other aid for "the industrial, social, intellectual, moral, and religious improvement" of freedmen.


While in Beaufort, SC, she aided freed women teaching them how to run businesses such as selling food and doing the laundry of the Union soldiers, all while Mrs. Tubman held jobs as a nurse, scout, and cook. Her role in the Combahee River Raid in June 1863, under Col. James Montgomery, for which she freed 756 enslaved Africans is most notable.

A sculpture depicting Harriet Tubman's heroic ventures will sit next to the 156 year old church on Craven Street in downtown Beaufort. Tabernacle Baptist is also the burial place of Robert Smalls, who was






born a slave in Beaufort and became a Civil War hero and Congressman. A bust of Small is also on the church grounds.

Craven Street is steep in history. The old Beaufort Arsenal home of the Chamber of commerce's visitor's center and the Beaufort history Museum is a block east of the church. To the west is the Secession House, site of many informal discussions and formal meetings during the 1850's to discuss withdrawal from the Union.

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

Editor's Note: A few years ago we offered a look into a few artist's studios. It was interesting, but we got busy and I didn't have time to keep up with that feature. This month, Murray Sease of La Petite Gallerie in Bluffton, SC, sent us an article about one of her fellow gallery artists. And she plans to visit several more during 2024. Studio Visit: An Artist's Eden

The next artist studio visit in this series takes me past green pastures and sandy paddocks with lovely homes for horses and their owners. It is in the equestrian side of the Rose Hill community in Bluffton, and indeed an artist's paradise with peaceful scenery in every direction. There are expansive views of the Colleton River and wooded views of its estuaries tucked in here and there. The home studio I'm visiting today is on a quiet cul-de-sac with a long driveway. The artist I am visiting takes full advantage of her location, regularly painting the gorgeous marsh views behind her house.

There is an abundance of wildlife – deer and long legged wading birds visit often - providing even more inspiration for this talented person.

The artist is Lauren Arsenault, known for her colorful and impressionistic paintings in acrylic and watercolor. The local people, landscape, flora and fauna, marsh, ocean, and historic architecture are her subjects. Her loose and free brushstrokes are the goal of many aspiring painters which is fantastic because Lauren loves to teach! She offers art lessons in the garden at La Petite Gallerie or in her students' homes or studio spaces. In fact the whole lowcountry is really Lauren's studio - she is an avid plein air painter enjoying the great outdoors as her muse

When I arrived at Lauren's home studio, I was greeted enthusiastically by Milo the Boykin Spaniel. He is a delightful bundle of wagging, wiggling happiness. After lots of Milo pats, walking through the welcoming entry is almost like entering an elegant but friendly art gallery. The walls are filled with art with deep meaning for Lauren – some gifts from her parents, some work continued above on next column to the right by her daughters, but most collected more recently from local artists that she admires. There is a nude by Doug Corkern which she treasures. Stunning black and white photography and drawings related to our local fishing and oystering culture are in her dining room. It opens to her kitchen with a wonderful black and white mosaic fish over the doorway leading to the mudroom and back door. Paintings by artists she knows fit perfectly in spaces elsewhere throughout the house, and found objects and sculptures grace tables and outside walls.

Opening from the entry and dining room, the first studio space I see is in a corner of the huge windowed wall of the living room overlooking the backyard. Twice a day at high tide the creek comes right up to the lawn edge just a few feet from the decks.

The views are stunning and ever-changing with the tides and seasons. Lauren has an easel and a huge drafting desk here with brushes and paper at the ready for watercolor painting.

The other side of the entry opens to the main studio exclusively devoted to creating art. Facing a wooded view through windows, two large easels have works in progress on them. One is a lovely floral mixed media and the other a wading bird showing Lauren's energetic brush strokes in acrylic. It features one of her typical color schemes in subtle blues and grays. A cozy desk area in one corner is where the business side of art is done. Shelves and a tall rack hold canvases, frames, and art supplies of all sorts. Opening a closet door reveals huge continued on Page 11

He is enormously attached to Lauren and knows her painting habits well. When it's time to take a walk he knows to lie between her and her easel making it impossible to continue her work until they have that break.







Artists Collective | Spartanburg, SC, will present Archetypes: Hand Built Clay featuring works by Glenda Guion, on view in the Solomon Gallery, from July 2 through Aug. 24, 2024. A reception will be held on July 18, until 8pm, during Spartanburg ArtWalk and an artist's talk will be offered at 6pm, as part of Spartanburg ArtWalk on Aug, 15, till 8pm.

Glenda Guion says the artwork in her upcoming exhibition is intended to reflect the world around her in her life right now.

"I have been hand building with red earthenware clay for over 40 years. For the past 11 years, I have been living on two acres of land that includes 16 magnolia trees, pines, seed pods, blueberry bushes, gravel paths, owls and the occasional snake," Guion says. "I am currently making work that attempts to reflect where I am in the world, influenced by the beauty found in my own backyard."

Guion's inspiration for the exhibit was using paper patterns to create sculptural forms, vases and patterns, influenced by archetypes and the cut outs of the artist Matisse. Visitors will see a variety of hand-built clay sculptures, tiles and vases. "I hope that people make connections between modern abstract forms and universal archetypes," she says.

Through her art, Guion says she hopes "to communicate that which surrounds me, both physically and mystically - from earth, gardens and manmade forms to archetypal symbols and theories."

Many of the over 65 new pieces in the upcoming exhibition are inspired by mandorlas, Italian for almond, she adds. "The form refers to a shape used in religious art as the large oval that contains the representation of a single sacred figure. It is the shape created by overlapping two circles and is seen in spiritual terms as the overlap between heaven and earth, or dark and light. It is the space that contains the conflict of opposites.

"The abstract figures in my work are represented as shadows," Guion continues. "They are at times the sculptural form itself, and at other times the portal where the figure has been transformed within the mandorla. For years I have been interested in psychoanalyst Carl Jung's notion of the 'Shadow.' He describes the shadow as the place between the conscience and subconscious, or good and evil. Jung also believed that for humans 'the shadow is the seat of creativity."

The art in the exhibition will be available for purchase, with prices ranging from \$55 to \$800.

Guion, a native of Nashville, earned her BFA in clay from Middle Tennessee State University and her MFA from Clemson University. She taught clay at the Fine Arts Center Magnet School for the Arts in Greenville for 25 years and served as the art department chair for 13 years. She was also the chairperson for the Open Studios event in Greenville for four years and is currently co-chair of the Open Doors Studio Tour Spartanburg.

Her work has been widely exhibited both regionally and nationally, receiving 13 (<u>artistscollectivespartanburg.org</u>).



Most of the photographs feature heartshaped cereal interacting with Hiltabidel's hand-built miniatures, "telling a story of growth, resilience and the transformative power of love," he says. "Part of the exhibit compares my first whimsical piece against my most recent one.

Hiltabidel hopes visitors to "feel' more than 'see'" when they enter the exhibit, and he wants their first reaction to be "happiness and joy. Also, I hope they feel a spark to create something or to evolve a part of their own life."

"I want people to find what makes them happy and chase it until the very end," he adds. "You have one life, and it is too fleeting to settle for unhappiness.

Hiltabidel says he previously photographed "traditional landscapes," focusing on mountains and waterfalls. After his cereal dream and creating the first photo inspired by it, "I had so much fun creating the piece and seeing people's reaction to it that I abandoned my interest in landscape photography to pursue a style of photography that makes me happy instead of trying to create artwork for others. Chasing this path gave me personal joy and I quickly realized this unusual body of work resonates with others who shared my style of imagination or who appreciated a 'less is more' approach to photography. What started as a dream involving cereal has evolved into the entire whimsical body of work you see here today

"I consider some of these pieces to be the 'ultimate conversation starters," he adds. His works include props he builds, often using common household items such as matchsticks, pieces of jewelry or fiber to build miniatures and create staged scenes in a cube flooded with light.

Hiltabidel, a native of northeast Ohio, has lived in the Upstate for 30 years. At age 36, he began attending Furman University, graduating in 2015 after eight years of night school. A course there taught by photographer Bryan Hiott led to his love of photography and the purchase of his first camera. Later, after seeing another former professor at an event selling her jewelry, he was inspired to begin selling his photos; he and Shelly have attended more than 100 art events in 10 states since the first in 2016, selling thousands of his photos.

that weave in and out of my work include women's ideals of beauty and various social perceptions of public versus private spaces, popular culture, ancient mythology and fantasv."

"My canvases feature women dressed in carefully coordinated fashions lounging in alluring and iconic poses while presenting themselves in a manner that is hyper aware of the gaze of the world that is focused upon them. They are often surrounded by objects of desire that display their eclectic tastes and interests. These women are on a personal quest to find a balance in life between sensual pleasures and intellectual and spiritual pursuits. Wide-eyed cherublike fairies with Afro hair float through the scenes seeking to capture the attention of the women and the viewer. They serve as celestial messengers, and at times, impish pests with an omniscient view of the women's situations as well as a pragmatic plan aimed at reinforcing the subject's authenticity," adds Gregg.

"The cherubs' wisdom suggests finding a version of the good life that can both integrate and transcend the material trappings. The colors, shapes and patterns of these objects of desire unify the compositions while forwarding the narratives."

"I paint on linen because of its symbolic and historical associations with Egyptian royalty attire, as well as its connection with Dutch masters' painting surfaces. The muted warm gray of the linen surface allows the saturated colors of the women's bodies, fashions and accoutrements to express the vibrancy of their many-sided worlds. Ultimately, the elements are integrated and contrasted with one another to allow complex and often oppositional ideas about the characters and the environments they inhabit," says Gregg.

tion of relief sculpture, an artform dating back some 20 thousand years. Creating the impression of feathers was an intricate, lengthy and experimental process, which resulted in marvelous two-dimensional works.

MunKittrick begins what she calls "a real interesting process of cutting and shaping," which at first begins by forming one half of a whole sculpture. "I start by making the general form of the animal with paper and then it's a layering process of adding the feathers," MunKittrick explains. "When I look where I need to start adding, I think what is the undermost layer? So, for a bird, I look at how the feathers are laying on top of each other and I search for the feather that is the undermost. And that's the first to go on so that I can start laying other feathers on top of that so that it looks like it's natural





cinated with glamour magazines, comic books, traditional African motifs and narrative historical paintings. These are the main sources of inspiration for my episodic paintings that comment on race, class, sexuality, and consumption among women of color. The personal and social narratives depict women navigating the shifting cultural influences and paradoxical worlds of contemporary life in their endeavor to embrace their own personhood. Broad themes



culminating at the 2024 Chapin Labor Day Festival. The art consists of 15 locally designed and crafted fiberglass turtles. All of the





The Hickory Museum of Art's newest exhibition features work by college basketball MVP turned textile artist Michael C Thorpe. 





Burroughs - Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC, Offers **Exhibition Focused on Money**

The Franklin G. Burroughs-Simeon B. Chapin Art Museum in Myrtle Beach, SC. is presenting Cultural Currency: Contemporary Art from the Riemer Collection, featuring works by 38 artists exploring the many aspects and conceptions of money, on view through Sept. 22, 2024.

Depending on one's perspective, money is either the thing that makes the world go 'round, or the root of all evil. It can bring power, status, security, comfort or misery - or something completely different. In a new exhibition 38 artists explore the many aspects and conceptions of money by fashioning actual items of currency into 65 works of art - some whimsical, some cynical, all thought-provoking.

The constant exchange of money for goods and services is an essential part of life, whether for luxury purchases like entertainment and travel or for essential items like food and shelter. Yet while we all are intimately aware of the exchange value of money, we rarely think about the actual, physical forms of currency. Here, the artists make use of globally sourced paper and coin currency combined with mixed media to create intricate, often exquisite, and visually arresting works of art that offer new and unexpected impressions of this medium of exchange.

The collection is the passion of Davis Riemer and Louise Rothman-Riemer, investment advisers from Oakland, CA, who began collecting money-themed art in 1995 to encourage new attitudes toward money's intrinsic value. As collector Davis Riemer states, "The point of it all is to provoke thought about why people want and use money and why they want more. Our hope is that people will see these works of art and walk away with questions about themselves Page 26 - Carolina Arts, July 2024

and money."

Artworks range from exquisitely crafted items to those that elicit outright belly laughs - like a mock-up of a designer highheeled shoe fashioned entirely from cash or a sculpture of a hamburger featuring dollar bills as the "lettuce" in the burger. Or consider a portrait in which the subjects are clothed in currency, or an item of jewelr forged from multiple coins welded together.

While inspiring reactions from amusement to philosophical thought, the exhibition offers a perfect jumping-off point for discussions between parents and children about their perhaps already-formed ideas about the importance of money in their lives.

As collector Louise Rothman-Riemer reminds us, while money is really just paper and coins, "It is what people want . . . and it becomes what people bring to it."

Cultural Currency: Contemporary Art from the Riemer Collection was organized by Bedford Gallery at the Lesher Center for the Arts, Walnut Creek, CA.





Gibbes Museum of Art, 135 Meeting Street, Charleston. Gallery 2 & 3, Through Aug. 18 -"Artist Spotlight: Merton D. Simpson and William M. Halsey". Focusing intently on small groups of works, the artist spotlight series features engaging profiles of artists held in the Gibbes permanent collection. The rotating series launched with Abstract Expressionist painters, Merton D. Simpson and William M. Halsey. Both artists born and raised in South Carolina had long and successful careers in the arts - Simpson in New York and Halsey in Charleston. Galleries 8 & 9, Through Sept. 15 - "Reynier Llanes: Passages" The exhibition presents the vibrant narrative paintings of Reynier Llanes an established Cuban artist (Pinar del Rio, 1985) now based in the United States. Llanes combines and contrasts scenes from nature and daily life with a mystical and imaginative elegance. Drawing from his own memories and experience as an artist, an émigré, and an immigrant as well as his studies of literature, history, and science, Llanes's invites viewers into unique dreamworlds. His explorations of personal and societal passages, both physical and spiritual, sensitively communicate common threads in humanity. Currently living in Miami, Llanes spent 6 years working in Charleston. This exhibition pulls from the artist's recent series of large-scale oil paintings, as well as his unique coffee watercolor paintings - a style he has dubbed Espressionism.

Galleries 1, 4, and 5, Permanent Exhibition -"18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. Gallery 5, Permanent Exhibition - "Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones n the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works in this gallery were

created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. Johnson (1901 - 1970) was a man between worlds: raised in the rural South, but educated in New York; black, but his unknown father was white; American-born, but lived much of his adult life in Europe. This diverse heritage gave Johnson a unique perspective and insight, but at times it vas also a difficult snadow which followed him as he traveled the world in search of his true artistic voice. Eventually, after many years away from his hometown of Florence, SC, Johnson returned to the United States. Although living in New York, his art began to focus almost entirely on the lives and experiences of African Americans in the rural South. "My travels taught me that an artist must live and paint in his own environment... This development shall continue for the rest of my life, and it is the painting of my people," said Johnson in 1941. burg community. Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1920, Krisel's interest in art and design started at a young age. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. While gauzy glazes and sheer fabrics shroud her characters in a fog that reinforces an almost mythological interpretation of them. Working in both ceramic and textile, Hobaica's compositions prioritize the inexplicability of the human experience. Fort. Atwell, & Rankin East Galleries, Through Jan 5, 2025 - "The Hard Edge & The Soft Line: A Retrospective of Maud Gatewood". Maud Gatewood (1934–2004) is an exceptional figure in the art history of North Carolina and the American Southeast. A painter of exacting technique with a keen eye for composition and cultural commentary, her pictures capture the Carolinas (and the expanding world beyond) across much of the 20th Century. A native of Yanceyville in Caswell County, NC, Gatewood's paintings reveal rural landscapes and their denizens in the midst of transformation while also cleverly framing the experience of modern life with acerbic wit and a surprising wealth of empathy. "The Hard Edge & The Soft Line: A Retrospective of Maud Gatewood" is naior undertaking by BRAHM. This retrospective project provides a comprehensive narrative of Gatewood's career, considering the evolution of her oeuvre and her significant contributions, as an artist and an educator, to the field of contemporary representational painting in North Carolina and the region. A recuperative exercise, the exhibition and its accompanying scholarship will feature a broad range of her works, including paintings, works on paper, and archival material, excavating Gatewood's rigorous technical experimentation, coded but no less rich explorations of gender and sexuality, and reverence for depicting the built and natural landscapes of her native state and elsewhere. This exhibiton commemorates the centenary of the influential Spanish sculptor Eduardo Chillida (1924–2002). Presenting a selection of sculptures and works on paper from the Bechtler Museum's permanent collection, this intimate exhibition offers a focused look at the artist's pioneering and varied practice. Renowned for his monumental sculptures. Chillida also created domestically-scaled sculptures, drawings, collages, and prints, examples of which will be on view. Together these works illustrate the great influence that Chillida's upbringing in the Basque region of Spain and his early training in architecture had on his unique artistic vision, and demonstrate his enduring exploration of space, light, form, and material. Through Aug. 9 - "Alyson Shotz: Coalescence". Blurring the boundaries between art and science, American artist Alyson Shotz (born 1964) is widely acclaimed for her sculptures and installations that use synthetic materials such as glass, mirrors, plastic, and stainless steel to harness intangible forces of the natural world like gravity, space, and light. On loan from the Bank of America Collection, this single-work installation is a dazzling sculpture made of glass beads and wire that hangs from the ceiling, "Coalescence" (2006) resembles a hovering cloud, a massive spider web glistening with morning dew, or a cluster of atoms magnified to monumental scale. Its open form challenges traditional notions of sculpture as grounded, solid, or weighty, and reveals Shotz's abiding interest in perception: calling attention to the relationship between an artwork, the viewer, and the space they share. Ongoing - The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art is named after the family of Andreas Bechtler. a Charlotte resident and native of Switzerland who assembled and inherited a collection of more than 1.400 artworks created by major figures of 20th-century modernism and donated it to the public trust. The Bechtler collection comprises artworks by seminal figures such as Alberto Giacometti, Joan Miro, Jean Tinguely, iviax Ernst, Andy Warnol, Alexander Galder, Le Corbusier, Sol LeWitt, Edgar Degas, Nicolas de Stael, Barbara Hepworth and Picasso. Only a handful of the artworks in the Bechtler collection have been on public view in the United States. Admission: Yes. Portraits are often taken at face value - as accurate representations of a person's appearance, sometimes removed by decades or centuries. But portraits are often the products of delicate negotiations between artist and subject. Sometimes they flatter, exaggerating the sitter's beauty or rich attire. Sometimes they capture the subject engaged in his or her occupation, whether pausing during study or painting in his or her studio. Sometimes they celebrate an auspicious occasion, such as a recent engagement or the imminent birth of a child. This exhibition features three centuries of portraits of men and women, Black and White, solitary and companionate, classic and modern. "Good Impressions" was mounted to mark the recent conservation treatment of John Singleton Copley's 1762 Portrait of "Mrs. Daniel Rogers" (Elizabeth Gorham Rogers) in the collection of Wake Forest University, and Reynolda House's recent acquisition of Kwame Brathwaite's 1973 photograph "Changing Times". Master Bedroom Gallery, Through Dec. 31 - "Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda". "Into a daybreak that's wondrously clear / I rise." Maya Angelou's poem "Still I Rise," published in 1978, was an assertion of dignity and resilience in the face of oppression. In the 1980s, Angelou used Revnolda as her stage, sharing words of humanity, survival, and triumph. But before her, numerous Black lives impacted and intersected with the story of Reynolda. "Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Revnolda" examines the lives of the Black women and men who helped shape Revnolda as it evolved from a Jim Crow era working estate into a museum for American art. East Bedroom Sleeping Porch, Ongoing - Featuring a condensed version of the fall 2023 exhibition "Smith & Libby: Two Rings, Seven Months, One Bullet". This semi-permanent exhibition presents a fascinating look at an unsolved shooting that rocked the Reynolda estate and made national headlines in 1932. Like most family homes. Reynolda House witnessed its share of tragedies, none more shocking than the death by gunshot of Zachary Smith ("Smith") Reynolds, youngest child of R.J. and Katharine Smith Reynolds. Soon after midnight on July 6, 1932, Smith was shot on a sleeping porch at the family's country estate. Smith died later that morning. Smith's wife Libby Holman and Smith's childhood friend and secretary Albert "Ab" Walker wre ultimately charged with first-degree murder. In a stunning reversal, the case was dropped before coming to trial. To this day, it is not known whether Smith Revnolds. 20-year-old heir and renowned aviator, died by suicide, accident or murder.
